It is our hope and desire to bring these events to you at a future date. Stay tuned...



The Night Jesus Went Missing

Several years ago, when I was at another parish, a young woman came to the rectory door. She was very upset, almost in tears. She had gone over to the chapel adjacent to the church, which had 24 hours perpetual adoration, and was distraught to find that the tabernacle was missing!

At first, we thought that someone had gained access to the chapel and taken the tabernacle. One of the priests made a phone call to the business manager asking if there was an explanation for the disappearance. She did have an explanation. The tabernacle had been moved to another room because the carpets in the chapel were being cleaned. There was no theft, everything was fine.

But during that moment of uncertainty, I felt a combination of emotions, fear, anger, emptiness. Yet as I reflected, those emotions made perfect sense. What that young woman was reacting to, what the priest and I were reacting to wasn't the fear of having lost a thing or an object, but the fear of having lost a PERSON—our Lord Jesus.

A tabernacle—as beautiful as it is—is simply an object made of metal which can be replaced. It is, in the end, simply a thing. But that which the tabernacle holds is an inexhaustible treasure—the person of Jesus Christ—Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. At every Mass we celebrate that at the Last Supper, Jesus left us His very self. Not a memorial, not a symbol, but His very person.

More than anything else, the Eucharistic Lord wants a relationship with us, person-to-person. And the intimacy of that relationship is meant to be felt especially when we receive Him under the appearance of bread and wine. The challenge for each of us is to value this gift. It can be easy to feel distant from our Lord, to receive communion mechanically and out of habit. The next time you receive communion, allow it to be an opportunity to rekindle your love and devotion to our Eucharistic Lord. Receive Him not as a thing, but as a person—a person who sacrificed His very life to have a relationship with you!

The Lord gave us this enduring sacrament because He wants to feed us, nourish us, and grow closer to each one of us. But we must have our eyes, hearts, and minds open to receive Him.

Consider spending time with Him in Adoration. It starts at Mass with the celebration of the living action of the Eucharist, then overflows in the devotion of adoration. Adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament takes no special skill—just a willingness to spend time with Him.

If you feel overwhelmed, sad, or discouraged; if things are not right in your life; then DON'T hesitate, don't think twice, just go! You will have an encounter with the living Lord that CAN change your life.

Bringing about a Revival of a Misunderstood Prayer Practice

With the Liturgical Season of Advent right around the corner—beginning Sunday, December 3rd—we thought it the PERFECT time to reignite a passion and longing for this often misunderstood and under-appreciated prayer practice.

But hang in there... you will soon find that the quiet is exactly what you need to carry with you into the world, to rely on, and to share. Plus, we have some prayer guides at each of our adoration sites to assist you. We promise... in time, you will come to love your "alone time" with the Lord.

You can see from the below schedule that there are numerous opportunities to take part in Eucharistic Adoration across our three churches. He longs for and patiently awaits for us to come and sit quietly with Him.

SUMMARY

As you can see, the Offertory is the primary source of our income and is needed to sustain our parish and it's ministries. Our proposed Offertory will remain at \$10,300/week. For those unable to attend Mass and for whom WeShare online giving is not an option, please consider dropping off your donation at one of the secure drop boxes located outside the parish office here at St. John's. These locked boxes are emptied daily by staff.

Expenses are budgeted with some expected increases in items such as health insurance and property insurance. Our clergy and staff work extremely hard to ensure that we only spend what is truly necessary for the work of our community. We currently have a full staff and are blessed to have three full-time priests within our collaborative, thus the increase in lay compensation and clergy & related expenses. We thank you for your continued, consistent generosity and please know that you and your families are in our prayers.



Two weeks ago we began looking at how God builds us home through the laid the sacraments. We foundation-that all the sacraments come from God and thev open us to experience **Paschal** the Mystery (Jesus' death,

resurrection, ascension, and its consummation in Pentecost). We then framed our house which led us to recognize that God uses the very elements of creation to speak to us through the sacraments.

Last week we saw the exterior walls go up and the roof put on. We learned that God bestows on us his great gift of grace through using the sacraments as his instrument. But we must be properly disposed to receive that grace for it to impact our lives. Also, in some of the sacraments we receive a change to our soul, called a character; we are marked for all eternity through this gift. We ended by looking at our role both as minister and participants of the sacraments. The role of the minister is simply to be an instrument of Christ who is the true minister of all the sacraments. Christ works through the minister in order for his ministry to be seen.

Now that we have put the roof on, we can look at the plumbing and electrical work. What does that entail? We know what the gifts of the sacraments are and our role in the sacraments, but that raises the question, what exactly do we experience in the sacraments? The heart of the sacraments is, of course, to help us live out the salvation Christ won for us in the Paschal Mystery. The sacraments help us to do that because through them we encounter the divine. God uses the sacraments to really engage with his people; in its own way, each sacrament reveals God and makes Him present to us. God makes this possible by allowing us to actually experience the Paschal Mystery. As we celebrate the sacraments, we do not simply remember Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension: God makes it possible for us to encounter these events, and we come to experience God's compassion, mercy, and unconditional love. In this moment, then, the very presence of Christ is made real to us. As Christ and the Paschal Mystery are our salvation, we come to better understand what our life is truly about.

As we seek to live out a life as a people saved in Christ, we might wonder—how do the sacraments help us do that? In a way, the sacraments act as windows and doors to the Paschal Mystery. Each sacrament helps us to experience something about the Paschal Mystery that is unique and purposeful, to help us grow in our lives with Christ. For example, when we sin (post-baptism) we need a remedy that will help us

back to living our relationship with God. Confession is not about making us look bad—we are all sinners. We are all in need of God's healing grace. The sacrament of Penance is about helping us encounter God's mercy, compassion, and unconditional love. We come to Him contrite for what we have done. As Jesus acts through the ministry of the priest and we confess our sins, He heals us. He, and not the priest, forgives our sins and pours out on us his fruits of the Paschal Mystery which is God's forgiveness. We are washed clean by his blood and now we can start our lives anew. Penance is a doorway to experiencing God's mercy and unconditional love, reminding us that no matter what we do our God will never forsake or abandon us. The Eucharist feeds and nourishes us to help us stay on the road to salvation. In the Eucharist, it is not something, but someone we encounter-JESUS CHRIST! The Eucharist is a doorway to Christ's continuing presence in our lives. He feeds and nourishes us in order to strengthen us to stay faithful to Him.

The sacraments, then, open a window to teach us about the life we are called to live, and also to give us the strength to live that life. As we encounter God's grace in multiple ways through the sacraments, they become the true source of helping us see what life is truly about. The world lies to us about the reality of life. Christ shows us through the sacraments how life is intended to be ordered and lived. It is about a life that is truly centered in Christ and in Christ alone. Only when we focus on Christ can we truly understand how to be in relationship with others. Only when we get this right can we grow as human beings. The sacraments are, again, not about what we are doing but about what *God* is doing for us. We are called through the sacraments to cooperate with and participate in Christ's saving works. A heart truly open to God will discover—in the only way possible what it means to be truly human.

Our ultimate understanding of the sacraments, then, comes down to this: they are God's gracious gift to us. This gift is intended for one purpose: to encourage and strengthen us through God's grace to live as a people saved in Jesus Christ. Our God loves us so much that He will communicate his grace and mercy through whatever means available so that we can recognize fully his presence in our lives. God has truly built us an amazing home!

From our Asst Dir of Faith Formation

"What's she singing?" my mother asks. I lean over and listen for a moment before replying with a chuckle. "She's singing about dragons." Lest anyone think little ones are never paying attention at church, the imagery in Revelations (1st Reading on the Feast of the Assumption) had prompted a sing-song-y refrain from my 2½ year-old niece of "Dragons, dragons, dragons..."

Since that day I have found myself wondering on occasion, "What does she know of dragons?" Chances are very little, her media consumption being limited to begin with and consisting entirely of Daniel Tiger and Blue-y, neither of which so far as I am aware features dragons. Nor do I think they appear particularly often, in her many, *many* books. Still I like to think that at this tender young age, her familiarity with actual dragons (in so far as mythical creatures can be literal) outpaces her awareness of what dragons have symbolized in art and literature for centuries: violence motivated by hatred and greed. I cannot help but mourn the day when such innocence will be lost, a day that is inevitable, not because anyone will have intentionally taught her this but simply because she lives in a fallen world.

When that day comes I hope she will find strength and comfort in the things that she will have been intentionally taught. That, yes, there may be evil in the world, but there is good too and good in the end will be the victor. Returning to dragons for a moment, G.K. Chesterton summed up this idea beautifully when he wrote, "Fairy tales do not tell children that dragons exist. Children already know dragons exist. Fairy tales tell children that dragons can be defeated." No doubt Chesterton, a devout Christian, would have pointed out that the greatest story of all, the story of salvation in Christ Jesus, has much the same effect with the added power of being true.

In fact there is growing evidence that having the hope and surety faith provides is one of the strongest protections we can offer our children against the dragons of today's world. Erica Komisar LCSW, a clinical social worker, psychoanalyst, and parent guidance expert, lays this out boldly in her article for the Wall Street Journal *Don't Believe in God? Lie to Your Children*. To quote the article:

A 2018 study in the American Journal of Epidemiology examined how being raised in a family with religious or spiritual beliefs affects mental health. Harvard researchers had examined religious involvement within a longitudinal data set of approximately 5,000 people, with controls for socio-demographic characteristics and maternal health. The result? Children or teens who reported attending a religious service at least once per week scored higher on psychological well-being measurements and had lower risks of mental illness. Weekly attendance was associated with higher rates of volunteering, a sense of mission, forgiveness, and lower probabilities of drug use and early sexual initiation.

Obviously we know that there are other reasons to believe in and teach your children about God, ones of an eternal nature. However, I think it is important to know that in addition to offering our children Heaven in the next life by bringing them up in the faith, we can also make them less afraid of dragons in this one.

Driving was one of the activities I loved doing in the initial years of passing my driving test and securing my driver's license. With over twenty years of driving experience (only thirteen of them recognized in the US due to my inability to show my first driver's license from Nigeria), I see many patient drivers as well as some impatient drivers. They remind me that patience at all times while driving is one of the ways of practicing humility and Christian charity.

Jesus, in the Gospel, teaches us humility and service when he says, "The greatest among you must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but whoever humbles himself will be exalted." Whenever we learn humility and offer loving service to other people, we are living out our practical Christian life in discipleship of Christ. Humility is very important for our spiritual growth because it helps us to love our neighbors in a deeply Christ-like way and opens the door of our lives to more of God's grace. Whenever we want to practice humility, God gives us patience, peace, and gentleness alongside. The fruits of the Holy Spirit grow in the soil of humility. Humility is key to growing in holiness.

Christian service is one of the noble goals of true religion. When religion is all about keeping the letters of the law, it ends up with the burden of religious legalism that is devoid of love. An act of Christian service offers us the opportunity to serve others, modeling the attitude of Jesus in God's creation without thinking of its reward. Today, Christian service is lacking because people's livelihoods are modeled around economy, and those who sacrifice their lives and time in Christian service are seen as wasting precious time. Nevertheless, services for the sake of Christ's kingdom are geared towards building up the body of Christ and making our world a more loving, joyful, secure, and peaceful place.

We are therefore called to holiness, greatness, and heroic witnessing to Christ through humility and service. Like the psalmist in Psalm 131:1-3, let us denounce pride and arrogance by praying, "O Lord, my heart is not proud, my eyes are not haughty; I do not concern myself with great matters or things too wonderful for me. But I have calmed and quieted my soul, like a weaned child with its mother; my soul is like the weaned child that is with me. O Israel, hope in the Lord from this time on and forevermore." Finally, we need to renew our commitments to God and God's people. Like St. Paul in the letter to the Thessalonians, let us be determined to share with others not only the gospel of God, but our very selves as well in Christian service.


