Other than Christmas or the Immaculate Conception, if a Holy Day of Obligation falls on a Saturday or a Monday, one is not obliged

to attend Mass. Therefore, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God celebrated on Monday, January 1st, is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation this year. Our Mass schedule will be as it normally is on weekdays.

On this day, we are reminded of the role that the Blessed Virgin played in the plan of our salvation. Christ's Birth was made possible by Mary's fiat: "Be it done unto me according to Thy word."

It is a customary practice in the Roman Catholic Church Africa to celebrate New Year's **Eve Crossover Mass of the** Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God during the night of December 31 into January 1 of

the following new year. This is always a great festival of thanksgiving, prayer, singing and dancing. The crossover night will usually begin at 10 pm with a solemn Eucharistic adoration, confessions and prayers. Then, there will be the New Year's Eve Crossover Mass during the night that begins at 11 pm and closes any time after 12 midnight.

Usually, the celebration of Christmas extends into the New Year such that the New Year Mass and celebrations are considered the climax of the festive season. This New Year Eve celebration is a time of reflection on the passing year, of gratitude to God for seeing the end of the year, of making new year resolutions, and of commending the new year into God's hands. Africans believe that beginning the new year with the Lord in Church is the best thing to do at the turn of the year. Families, friends and relatives look forward to it. In Africa, both Christians and Muslims, Catholics and non-Catholics and even African Traditional Worshippers come into the Church on New Year's Eve to participate in the prayers, praises and the Holy Mass. There are usually highlights of praises, singing, dancing, and exchange of happy new year greetings with joy, hugs and happiness. The joyful mood is like what the Psalmist says in Psalm 149 and 150:

"Praise the Lord. Sing to the Lord a new song, his praise in the assembly of his faithful people. Let Israel rejoice in their maker; let the people of Zion be glad in their King. Let them praise his name with dancing and make music to him with timbrel and harp. Praise the Lord. Praise God in his sanctuary."

Please join the African Catholic Community for this Holy and Blessed event! It will conclude as we enter the new year with smiles and with the joy and happiness of entering the new year in God's house.





with an IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) before December 31, 2023

People who are 72 or older and have traditional IRAs may use them to make charitable gifts in 2023. Both convenient and tax-advantaged, a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from an IRA allows a donor to direct pre-tax assets to charitable organizations, like St. Mary's, St. John's or St. Margaret's, without incurring any tax. The QCD is not recognized as income, so donors receive a tax benefit and could possibly decrease the amount of your taxable social security benefits. Gifts of any amount, up to a maximum of \$100,000 per IRA plan owner per calendar year, may be made this way.

As we need to keep the finances separate, when making a gift, please be sure to indicate to which parish—St. Mary, St. Margaret of Scotland or St. John the Evangelist—you would like your gift processed.

Your generosity will help our parishes to continue building the programs and ministries for the present and future growth of our faith communities. Please feel free to contact your financial advisor for additional information about using your IRA to make a gift to your parish.






What's Christmas all about?

All About That Baby!

On Saturday, December 9th, in St. John's Hall, about 150 guests were transported to Bethlehem around the time of Jesus' birth. Thirty children and youth—4 to 18 years of age—became, townspeople, jazz angels, wisemen, Mary, Joseph, young worshippers, and a flock of very smart and clever sheep, in our Collaborative's Second Annual Christmas Musical, "All About That Baby".





It was a fantastic production with great performances and wonderful songs and dances, some lively and some lovely. We got an idea what it must have been like for the folks in the actual Bible stories to recognize that the baby Jesus truly was the Messiah—and we learned it in a most delightful way!

It's not only the cast who deserves applause, but kudos to the Production Crew as well. The costumes, sound track, lighting, set, props, and refreshments were all very well done.

Everything about the show came together to honor, praise, and glorify Jesus, celebrating His birth then, and His Holy Reign now.













A few weeks ago, I was watching a program that involved two people dancing, and it somehow brought me back to my childhood, watching my parents dance. When we went to social events and dancing was involved,

you would see my parents on the dance floor. It always amazed me how much they danced in sync; it seemed like they almost flowed as one body, and it did not matter what type of dancing they did. Their movement was graceful and had a beautiful sense of harmony. It was clear that they sensed the direction the other wanted to go in and responded with almost no effort. I honestly loved to watch my parents dance: it really symbolized their relationship.

As we are about to celebrate the wondrous season of Christmas, it is a reminder to us that God wants to be our dance partner. Christmas is a celebration of the Incarnation. As Christians we must believe that at Jesus' conception, his two natures-human and divine—came into union. In the one person of Jesus, each nature remains separate and unique to itself. In Jesus we see the dance partnership that God has always wanted with us, but the reality is what we learn from the story of Adam and Eve. Humanity from its inception decided to dance to a different tune, and with a different partner than God, and that choice made sin, suffering and evil a reality in the world. But the wonderful thing about our God is that He did not want us to remain in this state. Even as we rejected his offer to dance, He came up with an alternative plan—to write a new invitation to dance.

Christmas, in a real sense, is God's invitation to dance with Him. He gave us the gift of the Infant Jesus who was born to die for us: his unconditional love truly has no limits. He knew that only through his direct intervention would we be able to truly dance the dance of salvation. Only by his actions could we be God's dance partner once again. Each year we are reminded of this wondrous opportunity.

What does it mean to be God's dance partner? It is about seeking to live out a life of faith. It is about making use of God's great gifts. It is about embracing our relationship with God.

Living a life of faith is simple enough. It means that as we live out our life, we must make choices that are in line with God's will for us. As Christians we do not get to determine what our life is about or how we should live it. Rather, we recognize that God is our creator and has endowed our life with meaning, purpose and order, and has given us specific gifts according to his plan for us. It is our responsibility to discern what those gifts are and to live out our lives accordingly.

What are those gifts? There are many, but most

importantly: the Church, the scriptures, the sacraments and prayer. The Church gives us the ability to know definitively how God views the world and his expectations of us. The role of the Church is ultimately to continue the mission of Christ. It is to open the world to Christ's saving actions and bring the world to Christ. The Holy Spirit ensures that when it comes to faith and morals, the Church can never go into error. We have in the Church a certainty of understanding of how we are called to live out our life as a Christian. The scriptures are the very word of God: God is speaking his directions to us and we are called to apply them to our particular and unique circumstances. To discern what the scriptures are telling us, we need to have an open ear and ready heart. They have as much meaning today as when they were first written. They are a living word intended to be a powerful guide in understanding how our God desires to lead us in the dance of life. Prayer, whether using scripture or other means of prayer, is our way to truly communicate with God, and there is no right or wrong way to pray. Prayer is simply responding to God's conversation with us. God always begins the conversation and we simply respond. He determines the best way to have his conversation with us: He knows best how we will hear Him. But to help strengthen us in this conversation He has given us the sacraments. Starting with baptism which begins the dance, He strengthens us on the journey with the Eucharist which is his very Body and Blood-not a sign or symbol but really, truly, substantially, the Body and Blood of Christ. Christ is present to us in this gracious gift. And He feeds and strengthens us with his presence to help us live the life we are called to live. And when we falter, He gives us the ability to repent and move forward with his gift of confession.

God wants to be our dance partner and will give us all the help we need to make this happen. Christmas is not simply about remembering what God did for us over 2,000 years ago. It reminds us of what God is doing for us in the here and now. It reminds us that our God wants to have a personal and intimate relationship with us. May we be willing to take up the dance and truly dance with our God.

From our Faith Formation Associate Shaun Bradley

The Twelve Days of Christmas and The Twelve Pains of Christmas two of my favorite Christmas songs that, when taken together, have an important message to teach us.

Many of us have likely seen the viral social media posts that claim to explain all the religious symbolism in *The Twelve Days of Christmas*: how each gift and the quantity of it has some spiritual or Biblical significance. While I do not doubt that there are subtle religious references in the song, I am skeptical that every verse has the precise meaning that someone on the internet has proposed. As for the *Twelve Pains of Christmas*, I find it ironic that the song about pain is exclusively about secular Christmas. Now, I am not poo-pooing secular Christmas; I do think there is joy to be found in "rigging up the lights and finding a Christmas tree." However, I think it is important to reflect on how the pain comes—both when we make Christmas purely secular and when we change it from "12 days" to just one day.

Ultimately, that's all secular Christmas is: all the hustle and bustle, shopping, bills, cooking, traveling; it's all just for one day. We try to cram too much into one day. It is no wonder we are trying to extend the "holiday season" as much as possible, trying to stretch it from Halloween to Christmas and completely skipping Thanksgiving. This is where the pains come from. And yet, the alternate, and original, version of the song is *not* about the pains of one day but about the joy of many days. This is how Christmas was always intended to be and how we as a Church still celebrate it today.

For us, our Christmas season is not the buildup to just one day, but the celebration over many days afterwards. For Catholics, the Christmas season doesn't start until December 25th, and lasts roughly two weeks until the Feast of the Epiphany in January (hence, the 12 days). Rather than trying to cram all the joy and excitement into 24 hours or less, the Church gives Christmas (and us) time to breathe over a period of two weeks.

This year, don't give up the holiday cheer at 11:59 pm on Christmas night. Don't take down your decorations and throw out your tree on December 26th. In the week that follows, don't just focus on the gifts, but continue to remember the people who gave them to you. Don't just sit down together for Christmas dinner, but continue to share time together as family afterwards. And don't just pray to Him for one hour on the day of His birth but remember Him each day. Allow Him to be born again in your life, nourishing and cherishing the precious, young life of our baby Lord and Savior.

Embracing the Cross

The more you love, the more you suffer. I will repeat it again—the more you love, the more you suffer. Love by its very nature seeks to give of itself to the other. There is a certain sense of self-emptying loving. For in centuries, the world has tried to offer relief from this reality but it has failed. If we love, we will suffer. There is no real love that does not bring some sort of self-emptying or some sort sacrifice. Think, for instance, about Him who is Love Himself. Love Himself loved so much that He suffered the greatest of sufferings for our sake. He suffered death itself. He took the devil's weapon of death against humanity and turned it around to point against the devil himself. He took the cross-a symbol of suffering and death—and made it into a sign of joy and life. Our Lord embraced the cross for sake. He embraced His death and His suffering and transformed it into a reason to hope—hope in eternal life.

The world has tried and continues to try to offer a sort of love sacrifice or a love without suffering, but it has continuously failed in doing so. We Christians we Catholics—embrace that Cross. We embrace that which used to be a symbol of death and turn it into a symbol of hope. We do not ask for our cross to be taken away if that is not His will, but we ask that we are able to carry it until the end. If this season brings us some memories that cause us sadness or reminds us of some suffering, remember that it is just a sign of how much you loved. So, let us embrace that cross and use it as fuel to bring us hope.

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
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
