WHY NO MUSIC DURING LENT? by Mike Stack, Music Director, St. Mary Church

As Catholics, we are called to sacrifice for Lent, engaging in self-control and self-reflection through fasting and abstaining. A lot of us "give up" something we love for Lent. It turns out, this is true of our music as well.

In Lent, we give up the Gloria and the Alleluia. Both expressions of deep joy in praising God, in this more solemn time, we put them aside, the Gloria omitted completely, the Alleluia replaced. It is through this that we create one of my favorite musical moments in the church—the Gloria and the Alleluia triumphant at the Easter Vigil in the midst of the story of Salvation History.

But there's more to it than just those two hymns—instrumental music is not allowed at Mass during Lent—you'll notice that we do away with long hymn introductions and instrumental verses during Lent. Our instruments only support singing. And likewise, we only sing the songs that are our response during the Mass like the Psalm and Holy or during the Entrance, Offertory and Communion processions. We do not sing at other times—including before and after Mass, after Communion, and perhaps most starkly, as we leave the church after the Dismissal, we depart in silence.

The Church in its wisdom does grant us a reprieve from this: Laetare Sunday—the fourth Sunday of Lent. A day of joyful anticipation of the coming Resurrection, akin to Gaudete Sunday in Advent with it's pink candle, we don't sing Alleluias or Glorias, but we do embrace all our other hymns and traditions. But other than that, it gets a little quieter in our churches until we get to Easter, when we can shout our Alleluias with joy: I expect to hear every one of you singing it with us!

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

FASTING: Catholics age 18 and up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent, are

defined as the days of fasting. On these days, only 1 full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and fruit juices, are allowed.

ABSTINENCE: Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to the obligations of abstinence. Abstinence (no meat) is to be observed on Ash Wednesday, Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Our Collaborative Social Justice Committee has again, for its International Initiative, committed to support our Sister Parish, Our Lady Star of the Sea, in Sierra Leone, West Africa.



Both evening's exercises will be accompanied by live prayerful music performed by her husband, Pawel.





Last week we closed our conversation with how the message of Christ is intended to be embodied in our lives now, and that the sacrament of Confirmation strengthens and orients our lives to this reality.

So, how do we make that happen? It is about planting the right seeds in our baptismal soil. The full outpouring of the Holy Spirit gives us those seeds, which are the gifts of the Holy Spirit: knowledge, understanding, wisdom, counsel, piety, fortitude, and fear of the Lord. These seeds must be planted in our garden in order to grow true virtues. From these seeds will grow the fruits of the Holy Spirit, which are: love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These seeds and fruits, empowered by the Holy Spirit, will help us reap the virtues that enable us to grow in a proper relationship with Christ.

It is not possible to go through all the virtues, but we can examine some of them to see how they work. Faith is a theological virtue which is only possible through the grace of the Holy Spirit. But it requires our cooperation, or participation, and so we need to embrace the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit. The first gift of the Spirit that we should examine is fear of the Lord. Fear of the Lord is not about being afraid of God. Rather, it is recognizing that God is God and we are *not*. It is also about coming to fall in love with God for no other reason than He is God. It ultimately opens us to the potential of entering into a true and deep relationship with Him. This is the first step in growing in true faith. It is understanding our dependence on God, understanding his promises, and putting our trust in them. Wisdom is connected to understanding, for as we grow in knowledge and understanding we grow in wisdom. So, faith and wisdom go hand in hand: true wisdom is only possible with faith, and faith can only deepen and grow through wisdom. Another seed that is planted and blossoms is piety. Piety is about coming to worship God as He desires to be worshipped. We cannot self-determine how to worship God. God knows what is best for us, and we dependent on Him for all things including how we should worship Him. However, our worship of God does nothing for God. Rather, our praise and worship helps us grow in proper relationship with God. The only one who can give God perfect worship is Jesus. Our worship then should be about uniting ourselves to the worship of Christ. As we grow in piety, our faith should deepen and help us grow closer and closer to Christ.

We next look at how these seeds and fruits can help us reap the virtue of hope. We begin by looking at fortitude. Fortitude is essentially not allowing fear to determine how we are going to act. Fortitude, or courage, is the ability to do what is right in the face of fear. It gives us the strength to know what is right and how God desires us to act. We also recognize that our God is with us in order to give us the gifts and strength to "accomplish what our faith teaches us, regardless of earthly concerns. We become more focused on what we

must do to be a true Christian. We can find hope even in the most difficult moments of our lives: we know that we have what we need to accomplish what God desires of us. Hope is connected in certain ways to the gift of understanding. As a Christian we know that the world is not the way God wants it to be: God has other plans. With the gift of understanding we recognize that our God is with us and will give us what we need to fulfill his promises and plans. This sense of understanding allows us to recognize that no one situation defines what life means or where we will end up. God has *only* our good in his heart; we simply need to trust, and true understanding helps us to do that. Furthermore, with the fruit of peace—no matter the situation—we know that God is greater than what is occurring. Things may not turn out exactly the way we want but, ultimately, all situations can be transformed into something good for us. God is greater than whatever is happening. And with that fruit of peace, our hearts can focus on the presence of God; He can give us a sense of hope even in the most daunting situations.

Love is both a fruit of the Holy Spirit and a theological virtue, which is strengthened as a virtue through the fruit of forbearance. Forbearance is not simply putting up with a difficult situation. Rather, it is about putting the needs of others before our needs. As Saint Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians: "Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, love is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests. It is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things." True love does not look to see what I can get out of a relationship. It is about the willingness to always choose what is best for the other, no matter the consequences. This does not mean that you put up with abusive behavior, but simply that we are not seeking our own interests. And at times we may need to be patient with the other as they discern who God has created them to be. We are there to help that to happen. We are also called to be truly kind which is *not* doing nice things for people. Kindness sometimes calls us to challenge the person to change. That is the true mark of love. But to do this well we must exhibit the fruit of self-control. It must be the Holy Spirit that leads us to act in the loving manner that God desires. Self-control is not me controlling myself: rather, it is giving control of my life to the Holy Spirit who determines how we should act in accord with God's will. When we do that, it will ultimately lead us to loving in the manner God desires us to love.

The final virtue we will explore is patience. And the one fruit that helps us grow in patience is gentleness. It is about meeting the other where they're at. We cannot treat everyone the same way because we are all different. So, how we come to encounter a person is based on their needs and struggles, and we cannot predetermine what a person needs or how they should act. It is about reflecting on the situation and being God's instrument in the way God wants us to interact with this person. Through prayer and openness to the Spirit, we react in accord with

the Spirit's direction. In other words, we show restraint or, better put, the fruit of self-control. Patience then is not about putting up with things. Rather, it is about being proactive in the sense that we allow the Holy Spirit to direct our actions.

The great gift of Confirmation gives us the opportunity to develop a true garden of virtues. God makes this possible by helping us prepare the garden: giving us rich soil, the proper water, sun and fertilizer, and the seeds that will produce good fruit. Our role as the farmer of this great garden is simply to cooperate with God's grace which will ultimately enable us to live the life of virtue that He calls us to.

Make Time to Touch Him

Have you ever, like me, wanting to get "in touch with" someone, dialed a phone number to hear the voice message response, "You have reached . I am not available now ." When this happens, I say to myself—sometimes aloud, "Obviously I have not reached you."

Touch is the basic sense that not only allows us to receive and to give information about both our external and internal environments, but it also fosters the development of an intimate relationship that nurtures a community-minded consciousness of belonging.

There are many ways we *touch* one another: physical presence and closeness, frequent visits, engaging conversations, shared participation in the same activities, and praying together—revealing our inner identity to one another.

Conversion is a process of turning to *touch* Jesus, our Savior, and believing in the Good News of the Gospel. Our loving Creator, God, is the initiator of the interior and exterior wanting to get "in touch with" calls we receive, inviting us to awareness of His presence, listening and sharing conversations, companionship on the day's journey, and time in solitude to deepen the roots of belonging that our Baptismal consecration indelibly marked in our being.

We have faith in and feel safe with the people we *touch* and who *touch* us. We recognize and accept our communion as brothers and sisters in the family of God.

Let us look at our relationship with Jesus, our God and our brother. Where do we feel the need to reach out to be "in touch with" Him. Where do we open to allow Him to be "in touch with" us?

As we prepare to enter the season of Lent, may we pray for the grace to *touch* Jesus and to be open to His healing *touch* in whatever way(s) and whenever He calls.

The Leper's Prayer of Faith

On Sunday, January 21, 2024 (Word of God Sunday), the Holy Father, Pope Francis, announced that 2024 be marked as a Year of Prayer. Pope Francis proclaimed: "2024 will be dedicated to a great 'symphony' of prayer." For him, this will help us "to recover the desire to be in the presence of the Lord, to listen to him and adore him" (Pope Francis' Letter on the Jubilee Year 2025). In line with the Holy Father's pronouncement, our Lenten retreat this year, 2024, will focus on prayer and other spiritual exercises in Lent. Today's Gospel presents to us the individual prayer of a Leper. He knelt before Jesus and begged him saying, "If you wish, you can make me clean."

At the time of Jesus, leprosy was considered so infectious that those with it were discriminated against and, in fact, excluded from the community. Anyone who touched a leper became unclean. The leper, as a sign of great desperation, broke all Jewish laws to come near Jesus. Out of fear, the people around Jesus most likely ran away from him. But what was Jesus' reaction to this man on his knees before him? In reply to the leper's prayer of faith, Jesus, moved with pity, stretched out his hand and touched him. By this, Jesus identifies with him and answers his prayer by saying: "I do will it. Be made clean!" The man was healed instantly.

This Gospel coalesces nicely as we start the Season of Lent in this Year of Prayer. During this time, every one of us is invited to intensify prayer and approach Jesus with faith, with our personal and community needs, and with all our sins that are like leprosy, and say, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Jesus says to each of us in return, "I do will it. Be made clean." Lent is a time of cleansing. Prayer helps us to submit to God's will and overcome the leprosy of self-centeredness. Almsgiving helps us to triumph over the leprosy of selfishness and offer support to the poor. Fasting helps us to overcome the leprosy of seeking vain pleasure so that we can learn how to hunger for God's righteousness. We all need the humility to acknowledge our needs and come to God in Jesus so that he, moved with pity, can stretch out his hand, touch us and heal us.




ADDITION OF NEW STONE PILLARS IS PLANNED


