



The Emergency
Management
Planning Committee
applied for and received

grants to improve security in the Collaborative's buildings. At this time, we would like to update our parishioners on these projects and how these improvements will impact all of us.

Security assessments at all three churches showed the need for better safety procedures and building management to protect our congregations. To address this need, the Emergency Management Planning Committee chose to move from hard keys to key fobs and timers on doors for a few reasons:

Overall security of the three parishes

Updating the locking and key system allows more safety and accountability for parishioners and staff, and better security for our facilities.

Remote door access

Door locks can be managed automatically and without the need to have staff present. Physical keys can be lost or stolen and re-keying a door or building is costly. This upgrade provides the ability to reprogram a door with little cost and risk but maintains high security.

Identification

Key fobs and timers provide the Collaborative with the ability to know who is in the various buildings, should the need ever arise.

Please be patient during this early time. The facilities team is still determining who should receive a key fob and what times doors should be unlocked and locked in events scheduled through the Collaborative. These times may be adjusted as we become aware of opportunities for improvements, including learning about the specific needs for certain events for the automatic timers. For example: some timers may be set to unlock the doors 30 minutes before an event. If you were to arrive 35 minutes before, the door would be locked. We ask for your continued patience as we make adjustments.

TRIDUUM

God gathers us together to remember the events that constitute the Paschal Mystery—the death, resurrection and ascension—of Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We who are Christian, remember that in Baptism we entered into the Paschal Mystery: we died to sin and rose to new life with Christ. Those who are preparing for Baptism, enter these days surrounded by signs and symbols that will plunge us into the Paschal Mystery.

As we begin this Sacred Triduum, the Holy Oils were blessed by Cardinal Seán O'Malley at this week's Chrism Mass. These oils—The Oil of the Catechumens, Oil of the Sick and Sacred Chrism—are brought into the Church in solemn procession and presented to the congregation at the beginning of Holy Thursday Mass. These oils will be used throughout the year to anoint the sick, those preparing for Baptism, the newly baptized, and those being confirmed.

The three days—Triduum—are actually one liturgy or celebration. We begin with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, leading to the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday. On Holy Saturday, we celebrate the Easter Vigil on the Holy Night which begins in darkness. We kindle a new fire, in anticipation that we will be inflamed with new hope. Christ our Light is proclaimed, and as the Easter light spreads throughout the assembly, we marvel at the power of the Resurrection of Christ. We then attune our ears to the power of God's Word. We hear the central stories of salvation that lead us to embrace the story of Christ's triumph over death.

"He is not here. He is risen!"

This is the night when, having shared in the Paschal Mystery once again, we renew our commitment to go forth in peace to love and serve the Lord.

Alleluias are on our lips, with the fragrance of chrism filling our heads, with fresh baptismal waters covering us, with the taste of the Body and Blood of Christ on our tongues, we go forth renewed in spirit to bring the message of the Risen Savior to a world hungry for salvation.

Last week we looked at where illness and suffering come from and how people respond to it in their lives. As we struggle with this issue—which can be overwhelming—we are called to make

an appointment with the Divine Physician. What does this appointment look like? What *is* the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and where does its power come from?

In the sacrament we come to meet Christ who is the Divine Physician. The power of the sacrament comes from Christ himself who is the true minister of the sacrament. The sacrament finds its source of healing power in Christ. As an individual confronts illness through the sacrament, he or she experiences Christ's Paschal Mystery (passion, death resurrection, and ascension), which is our very salvation both at death and in the life we are called to live. Hence, the heart of the sacrament is Christ's salvific actions. As the person encounters their own brokenness, Christ meets them through brokenness and unites with them as one, in the power of the resurrection. Reaching out to the sick and the burdened was an important part of Jesus' ministry. The Good News is that in our sickness, we are not forgotten-we are not alone-Jesus is with us. He walks with us on our journey of illness. He understands our suffering, our burden, and our brokenness because He endured them himself through his passion and death. Christ desires us, therefore, to unite ourselves to Him. In this unifying action we will find the source of hope and strength that we need. In his own ministry we see that Christ dealt in a physical way with the sick. He used mud, spittle, water, and touch. He sent his disciples forth to minister to the ill and burdened. Connecting with those who were consumed by their suffering was an important element of Christ's mission, and it continues today through the ministry of the Church. The Church is part of this experience to help us realize that we are not alone. Rather, Jesus-with the whole Church-is here to help us in our time of trouble and turmoil. The Church is here to pray with the person and help them know that the whole community is concerned for their wellbeing. As such, the priest who is called upon to anoint the person is not really the minister of what is happening. It is Christ who is acting through the priest (in persona Christi); He is there as well as the whole Church, and the priest also acts as an instrument of the Church (in persona ecclesia). As the sacrament is administered, it is not about the priest; it is about meeting with the Divine Physician.

Once we have met with the Divine Physician, He will diagnose our needs. The purpose of the sacrament is not to *necessarily* bring about a physical healing, but the healing that the person truly needs. Christ understands what is truly best for us. Just think about the story of the paralytic. "The people brought to Him a paralytic lying on a stretcher. When Jesus saw their faith, He said to the paralytic, 'Courage, child, your sins are forgiven.' At that, some of the scribes said to themselves, 'This man is blaspheming.' Jesus knew what they were thinking, and said, 'Why do you harbor evil thoughts? Which is easier, to say: Your sins are forgiven, or to say, Rise and walk? But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins'—He then said to the paralytic, 'Rise, pick up your stretcher, and go home.' He rose and went home. When the crowd saw this they were struck with awe and glorified God who had given such authority to human beings." (Matt. 9:2-8) We may ask ourselves, then, who should be anointed? And how often should we be anointed? The answers to these questions are found in the General Introduction for the Pastoral Care of the Sick: "A sick person may be anointed before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present. Sick children may be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be strengthened by this sacrament. The sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed but falls ill again, or if during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious. A prudent or reasonably sure judgment, without scruples, is sufficient for deciding the seriousness of an illness." Ultimately, Christ meets people where they're at, to strengthen them with his presence and grace, uniting them to the Paschal Mystery. Jesus provides new meaning to suffering-He shows us that the cross always leads to the resurrection. Therefore, we always have hope.

Two weeks from now, we will continue our examination of this sacrament. We will learn what treatment Christ will give us based on his diagnosis of what we truly need.

Make Time to See 'Mercying' Love

For me, one of the most moving of the Good Friday services is the Veneration of the Cross. I use the word "moving" because it stirs within me deep feelings and an acknowledgement of the personal love that Jesus has for me, simply because I am his. He is God, the Father's gift to me. Jesus is my Savior.

And because this personal love has a strong integral communal dimension, this personal love is naturally—by nature of coming from God—felt and shared with and by my sisters and brothers of all ages, races, and ethnicities who silently move forward in procession, acknowledging Jesus as our Savior and God. Veneration of the Cross—this public and reverent witness to the God whose Mercying Love makes real his infinite faithfulness to the Covenant, roots in me the belief that God is with me and within me always. "His mercy and love endures forever." (Psalm 136)

Jesus calls and asks me to live the commandment to Love God with my whole heart, mind, and soul. And to love my neighbor, as I love myself. (Mark 12:30-31) Yes, when I look to Jesus on the Cross, I see the suffering and pain He endured for me. I see my sinfulness and need for the redemption and healing that Jesus' obedience to humiliation and agonizing death bring to me. In Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross, I hear the words: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) Jesus is speaking this to each of us who venerate the Cross today.

And, yes, when I look to Jesus on the Cross, I see Love—a Mercying Love. Mercying Love because there is nothing I can ever do to deserve it. It is Love freely unconditionally given. I intentionally use the word mercy with an "ing" ending because I want to emphasize mercy as an active quality of the Love I see (and hope you see) when looking at Jesus on the Cross and pray for a deeper understanding and acceptance of the Incarnation—Jesus coming to live with us to teach us how to Love. To teach us Compassion.

"Yes, God so loved the world that He gave his only Son, ... that the world might be saved through Him." (John 3:16-17)

From our Permanent Deacon

Working with the RCIA team, we get the opportunity to experience our faith in a new way—through their experiences. They learn the "why" before the "how" and we find ourselves really looking at the things we do and say in a new light. As we walk with them on their journey to the sacraments, it's impossible not to appreciate the beauty and grandeur of our faith. We have the privilege of walking with them as they connect the stirrings of their hearts with the truth of the Gospels.

When I was little, Palm Sunday Mass was confusing to me. We started with this joyous entrance, waving palms and singing, but then in the Gospel things seem to go sideways. I knew Holy Week was a big deal, and coming from a Latin household, I wasn't allowed to go swimming (Holy Week often coincided with April vacation in Florida) and I wasn't allowed to watch TV or listen to the radio on Good Friday. Obviously I didn't have the maturity to understand Holy Week; I didn't have the ability to appreciate what it was really about. I understood it was important because my family took it very seriously, but it didn't "fit" into my understanding of the faith. I was too young to understand the connection between the triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the triumph of the cross.

Cradle Catholics like me tend to learn the faith by imitating our parents. They teach us the words, the movements, the rhythm of the Church, and we do what they do even if we don't understand the reason for it. Long before our First Communion we know how to genuflect, when to kneel, when to stand, and how to pray. We learn over time what these things mean, and at some point, we begin to get an idea of the real meaning of all the things that are muscle-memory to us. As we mature, we begin to understand the meaning of a relationship with God and the meaning of worship. In effect, we learn our faith backwards: we first learn the external elements, and then we connect those to the internal movement of the Spirit. The awakening of our spiritual selves can be sudden or it can be gradual, but it is the moment when we connect movements to meaning. It's hard to imagine what it would be like to feel the movement of the Holy Spirit, calling you to a relationship with God and not having the framework to understand it.

This Holy Week will be an eventful one for the RCIA Elect and Confirmandi. It's also an opportunity for us to experience Holy Week through them, to experience it as if it were our first one. For them, every liturgy is new, every action—from the washing of feet on Thursday to the lighting of the fire on Saturday night—is special, as it should be for us. On Saturday night, they will join the Body of Christ, coming into full communion with the Church—with us. It's an amazing time for them and for us, as we welcome them to the family; it's a time to pause and take it all in.


