


Please note that ALL Handicap Parking spaces are meant for those who need them. Vehicles



Support Dismas Ministry From Fr. Richard Deshaies, Catholic Chaplain Middlesex Jail & House of Correction



Dismas Ministry (DM) is a national Catholic mailing outreach, located in the Milwaukee area that has been supporting Catholic prison and jail chaplains, parish volunteers and

Catholic prisoners for 25 years through the distribution of free Catholic print materials to supplement their ministry and to give to prisoners for their private spiritual use. These resources are often unavailable through prison budgets, but they play a crucial role in helping prisoners grow in faith. These materials include Catholic Bibles, a unique Dismas Ministry-developed prayer book, and study programs, as well as other materials used to train chaplains in the various aspects of prison ministry. As a prison chaplain since 2011, I've been a grateful recipient of DM's materials and have served on its Board for a decade.

Although Dismas Ministry applies to foundations and granting agencies, they need to rely on individual donors for 50% of the funding needed to cover costs for these life-changing materials. Many of our original donors from our founding 25 years ago have passed on or are no longer able to assist us financially.

With the evolving reality left behind by the coronavirus pandemic, and ever-changing criminal justice reforms in the courts and in the practice of bail, most county jails and state prisons at this time are housing less inmates than just 4 years ago. But the current inmate population has much higher rates of more serious crime, more pronounced mental health diagnoses and disorders, and other chronic illnesses—up to 70% of inmates! Furthermore, among both the inmate population and facility correctional officers and staff, there is an increasingly less literate and less religiously-formed population. With ongoing generational changes, prisoners are therefore more uninformed, marginalized, segregated and resourceless than usual with regards to their attempts to practice some kind of faith or spirituality while behind bars.



Save Chilic HEART WORKCAMP JULY 20 - 25, 2025



I truly love going to the gym. It's a time for me to decompress, and to let go of stress. I am able to focus simply on the workout and not ponder the countless issues I need to address. People often ask me why I work out, and my answer is that it is essentially

about good health. I want to take good care of the body that God has given me. And exercising does help me to feel healthier—physically, emotionally and mentally. I really do believe that the time I put in at the gym is an investment with a good return. I do know that an important part of my recovery from my motorcycle accident in 2023 came about as a result of the work I previously did at the gym. I would recommend to everyone to exercise—whatever form that might be.

However, something that fascinates me at this time of the year is what happens at the gym. In the month of January there is an explosion of people at the gym, but that tends to taper off during February. It is of course the New Year's resolution crowd. They realize they want to make a change in their life. They know they need to take better care of their bodies and so they go to the nearest gym and sign up. They enter the gym and just start doing something—anything! And then, over a period of time (usually brief), they see no changes or differences and so they get discouraged. Then they slowly, or sometimes quickly, stop going to the gym while continuing to pay the gym fees. And even worse, they feel bad about themselves, thinking they are failures.

The reality is *not* that they have failed, but that they did not have a plan for the change they wanted to make. I love going to the gym, but the gym is not necessarily the best place for everyone to exercise. I admit I can be somewhat cheap, and so if I am paying for something I am going to use it. When I used to buy equipment that I planned to use, I would use it for a while and then, over time, it would simply sit and gather dust. Going to the gym is what works best for me but that is not true for everyone. And even if the gym is the right thing, many times people will go in and sort of flounder about, not knowing really where to start. You need to know the best plan for what you want to achieve. I would recommend actually sitting with a personal trainer, at least for a couple of sessions, to understand what it is you want to accomplish. I believe most people "fail" because they do not understand what their goals should be. And if you do not understand what you want to achieve, it is impossible to develop a plan that will work for you. Also it is essential in this process not to compare yourself to others. At the gym I am not trying to maximize what my body will look like but, rather, to have a healthy body. As such, my goal is specific to me; what others are doing or how they may look has no impact on what I am trying to achieve.

What is true in our physical life is also true in our spiritual life. We all must have a prayer life and we must all be praying every day. It is impossible to have a relationship with God when we are not communicating with Him on a daily basis. Prayer is not one option or one priority in the Christian life; it must be *the priority* because everything in life derives from it. However, what that pray life will look like is going to be different for every person.

Like exercise, we must understand what the goal of prayer is, in order to create a plan for prayer. The first truth is that prayer is not about telling God things He already knows as if He somehow doesn't know about them. It is also *not* about changing God's mind or his plan in a given situation. Rather, prayer is about changing the one who prays. We must also realize that human beings *never* begin the process of prayer. We pray when we are empowered by the Holy Spirit and strengthened by grace. Prayer then is founded first and foremost on what God is doing in our lives. Our 'job' is really to discern how God is calling us to pray. We need not compare our prayer life to the prayer life of another; in fact that can be counterproductive. Your prayer life is your prayer life. You and God will communicate in the way that God calls you to communicate with Him. God knows better than you do how you can best hear Him. And if you are open, God will lead you to how you should properly pray.

We must also realize that our pray life is fluid and will change over time. As you change, grow and develop as a person, so will your prayer life change. It is natural and necessary for that to happen. Hence, the best way to discern how your prayer life should unfold is by trial and error. Try to pray at different times during the day. Try to pray for different lengths of time. Try different styles of prayer. Remember that it is *not* about 'one size fits all', but what works best for you. Yes, there are certain aspects of prayer that are essential for all Catholics: e.i.,

Sunday Mass and Confession. But, beyond that, in your devotional life you need to create a plan that is flexible and workable for you. And, to create that plan it is necessary to truly understand the goal of every prayer life.

The goal is simple: you are called to seek God—not simply to love Him, but to fall in love with God as He has fallen in love with you. That is the challenge and the ultimate gift of prayer.

"What are you doing?" "Nothing."

How many of us reply this way when we are, in fact, doing something, usually during a period of rest or recreation? How many of us say "nothing" because we think what we are doing is insignificant or unimportant, as compared to things like working, cleaning, cooking, or any number of other chores and responsibilities? And yet, the things we tend do during these times of "nothing" are, in fact, important. As much as our restless society tells us we should always be doing something rather than nothing, doing "nothing" is actually good; in fact as science tells us, it is vital. Things happen to our body while we sleep. We may call this nothing, but the healing, the growing, and the energy we gain from sleep are vital to our survival. Doing nothing while we sleep is what ultimately allows us to do anything while we are awake. Likewise, recreation and leisure are vital for reducing stress and anxiety. So, even though we appear to be doing nothing and may even claim to be doing nothing, we are actually doing something.

The same might be said about the Church season we are about to enter—Ordinary Time. Seemingly, nothing goes on in Ordinary Time. There are no big celebrations like Christmas or Easter, nor are we actively preparing for those big celebrations as we do in Advent and Lent. There are no specific themes that we have to pay attention to, and there is nothing out of the ordinary that we have to do. And yet, this period of "nothing" is just as important as the nothings we do in the rest of life. This side of Heaven, we can't stay in a state of hyper-vigilance at all times. On this side of Heaven, we can't constantly celebrate the Incarnation or Resurrection to the fullest. We can't constantly prepare for the Second Coming or for Judgment. We can't stay vigilant to that extent at all times, and Our Lord knows it.

So many things in our faith parallel earthly life. Just as we need to do "nothing" to properly take care of ourselves, we also need a Church season to do "nothing." We need time where there is no special theme, where we don't need to go above and beyond. As easily as we can burn out in life if we are constantly at our limit, spiritual burnout is even easier. So, Ordinary Time has "nothing" going on for our sake. All of the Liturgical Seasons are ultimately for our sake, and Ordinary Time is for the sake of avoiding burnout in the spiritual life. We need moments of rest between the moments of intensity; we need rest between the reps of our spiritual workout; we need time for the lessons of the other seasons to take root.

So, as we do "nothing" during this first stretch of Ordinary Time, remember that we are in fact doing something—something vital to our spiritual well-being and growth.

Come To Me

Jesus calls us to respond to him. He speaks of this response initially as coming to him. To come to Jesus is the first step on the way to faith. In the first chapter of John's gospel when Jesus meets the disciples of John the Baptist for the first time, he says to them, "Come and see." They came, they saw, and eventually they went on to believe in him. Jesus' call to come to him is given even to those who already believe. He calls those who believe to come closer to him in order to believe more fully, more deeply. As followers of Jesus, we spend our whole lives coming to him. We never fully come to him in this life: we will never fully grasp him, either with our minds or with our hearts. We are always on the way towards him. No matter where we are on our faith journey, the Lord keeps calling us to come. "Come to me and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11: 28). And "Come follow me." (Matthew 19:21).

Jesus declares in the gospel that nobody can come to him unless drawn by the Father. We cannot come to Jesus on our own—we need God's help. The good news is that God the Father is always drawing us to his Son. When Jesus says to us, "Come", we are not left to our own devices at that point. God the Father will be working in our lives helping us to come to his Son Jesus. He will draw us to Jesus. There is always more going on in our relationship with Jesus than just our own human efforts, and that should give us great encouragement; we know from experience that our own efforts can fail us in the area of our faith as in other areas. Coming to Jesus, growing in our relationship with him, is not all up to us. God the Father is at work in our lives moving us towards his Son, drawing us towards Jesus. There is a momentum within us that is from God, a momentum that will lead us to Jesus if we are in any way open to it.
