

From Our Pastor

How does one put a well-formed conscience into practice? Obviously, it

begins with prayer. Only by allowing God to begin to direct our hearts can we discern the right way to act. As I said in last week's column, it also means seeking to understand the scriptures, the teaching of the Church, and oneself. The process of developing a well-formed conscience takes time and patience. I remember having a conversation one day with someone about this issue. When I detailed all that we have spoken about and what it takes to develop a real conscience, they responded, "That's way too hard. There's no way I would do that." I believe this is *not* an unusual response. Most people simply want an easy way to decide. They are looking for the cliff notes version for their answers. But to live life to the full takes dedication, persistence, and determination to know the truth.

Actually, I think most people have a more difficult time trying to know themselves than trying to understand the scriptures and Church teaching. Why you believe what you believe is essential to determining why you might disagree with Church teaching. It is not enough to simply say, I do not agree. We must also realize that if we cannot agree with a teaching, we may still be acting in accord with our conscience; but we cannot publicly disagree with the Church and lead another into error. The importance of growing in self-understanding and an understanding of our faith is essential to any choices we make.

So, when it comes to voting for an individual, what do we need to do? One must first realize it is essential to know the person's stances on the most important issues. It is necessary to know what they say about themselves and not what others say. Fortunately, in this day and age—with the internet—it is easy to find out. You simply need to go to the person's website and look at their position on the issues. There are also non-partisan guides that will help you know where each candidate stands on particular issues. Then, it is necessary to prioritize the issues.

As Catholics we believe that not *all* issues have equal value. Some issues are so fundamental that they take precedence over all others. We cannot

weigh them and place them on a scale and say that because there are so many issues I can ignore the most fundamental ones. Obviously, for human beings, issues concerning the very basics of life are our most fundamental choices. It is impossible to overstate this truth. Now, that does not mean you must vote for a particular candidate based on one issue. In the past, if I found both major candidates morally problematic, I wrote in a different person's name. Of course, people have told me that I wasted my vote. I, of course, disagree—I prayed about it. I looked to the teachings of the Church and the scriptures, and determined that neither candidate was consistent with the Gospel, to such a degree that I could not in good conscience vote for either candidate. I take my conscience very seriously and will not act in a way that violates it.

I am not here to tell you who to vote for, or to advocate for a particular person or political party. Rather, I hope I have helped you understand how to make good choices, by voting with a well-formed conscience and allowing God to help guide your choice. And the truth is, for Catholics, what is true of voting is true of every moral decision a person must make.

My column over the last few weeks was not simply about the moment we are in, but rather, about a well-lived life. We simply need to hold fast to what the scriptures teach us:

then, by loving the LORD, your God, heeding his voice, and holding fast to him."

Follow-Up to Fr. Brian's October 19th Eucharist Talk

It is impossible to say all that can be said about the Eucharist in a short exposition about the subject. To be honest, it would take an eternity to speak fully about the mystery, and still we would never comprehend completely the totality of its



meaning. The word Eucharist comes from the Greek eucharistia, which means thanksgiving. That simple definition begins to touch upon the reality that the Eucharist is not simply about the presence of Christ, but speaks also to an attitude we are called to have in regard to God's saving mission in our lives. The very idea of thanksgiving, which this great sacrament calls forth from us, is to lead us away from self-centeredness to a desire to center our lives into communion with God. It seeks to drive from us sinful desires and unthankfulness to a desire for true love of God. Therefore, the Eucharist is at the heart of God's plan of salvation.

The Eucharist is centered in the Hebraic Passover theme. God seeks to liberate us from slavery which, in the Christian context, is freedom from sin and death through our Passover, and Jesus' death and resurrection. Formed through our baptism, we are called into communion, to be united in thanking our God for his saving mercy that finds its consummation in Christ. We are called then to join together with Christ to express our gratitude to the Father. The Eucharist is at the heart of a life that is centered in an attitude of complete gratitude. It will be helpful then to unpack how we can grow in this attitude, by looking at certain themes or paradigms. These paradigms do not, in anyway, exhaust all that we could say about the Eucharist, but they will help us understand how we can grow in that attitude of gratitude and deepen our communion in Christ, leading us to the Father.

Ultimately, as we seek to understand the meaning of the Eucharist, we will come to understand the purpose of the Eucharist. Its purpose is—as all Christian life is—about salvation. We are called to be a people united and saved in Christ. We recognize the truth that salvation is only possible through Christ. And since we encounter Christ himself in the Eucharist, we encounter the reality of our salvation. With each encounter, when we are truly open, we grow in the reality of our salvation. This leads to the second purpose which is growing in our relationship with Christ. Christ gives us his very self, not simply for us to know things about Him, but to know Him personally and deeply. As we get to know Christ, we will discover more deeply who we are as a person, and we will come to know more fully the person God created us to be. The third purpose is to know God's plan for my life, both in the general sense of the universal call to holiness and salvation, and how He calls me to accomplish his plan for my life. If I am truly living out God's plan for my life, it will create in me a desire to give Him true praise and thanksgiving. It will not be a one-time thing, but rather, a constant, lived reality. It will prepare me for heaven with the desire to praise and thank the Lord for all eternity.

FROM OUR PAROCHIAL VICAR Fr. Corey Bassett-Tirrell

The month of October is annually observed by the Catholic Church in the United States as Respect Life Month. We are called to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, from conception until natural death and at every point in between.

As we are in the midst of Respect Life Month, our hearts are heavy with revelations of how those who should be most trustworthy have not only failed in this regard but have inflicted immense evil. As USCCB President Cardinal Daniel DiNardo expressed, "The Body of Christ is lacerated."

At such a time as this, we become even more aware of the need for messengers of God's love and instruments of His healing. We realize again, with renewed urgency, our personal call to help others encounter God's transforming, life-giving love and to defend the sanctity of every person's life, at every stage and in every circumstance.

All of our rights come from the first and primary right, which is the right to life. We have nothing else if we have not the primary right to life. But as Catholics we don't stop there. We care for all from conception to natural death. To truly be a people of life and understand more fully Catholic social teaching, we protect life in the womb, clothe the naked, feed the hungry, care for the imprisoned and take care of the ill. We care for each other at all stages of life. This is the very essence of our social concern as Catholics.

But, primary to all of these things, we can never be complicit with the abomination of euthanasia and abortion either directly or tacitly. Saint Mother Teresa once said: "It is a poverty to decide that a child must die so we may live as we wish." She was right to call it a poverty. When sin and evil are being done, everyone—the child, the parents, and society as a whole—suffers.

In his first letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul tells us, "As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. ...If [one] part suffers, all the parts suffer with it" (1 Cor 12:12,26).

It was once said that all that is required for evil to triumph is for good people to do nothing. Our Catholic faith compels us to continue to strive to build a culture of life, in our homes, in our communities, in our government and in the world.

We are called and sent to be messengers of God's love, treating one another as cherished and chosen by Him. In doing so, we help build a culture that respects all human life. The Body of Christ needs you. The world needs you. Do not be afraid to speak up for what is right, good, and true. God bless you all.

In July 1943, the #1 song on the Billboard was "Comin' in on a Wing and a Prayer". That is how I had arrived a few years earlier - perhaps on angel's wings but certainly on prayer. I was born the 5th child of six children. As my mother told the story, she believed she knew just when "the" baby would arrive and would be delivered at home by the doctor. I guess I was anxious to get here and decided to arrive early. My father called the doctor, and my mother's best friend who lived upstairs on the second floor to come down and help. My mother said she and Mae were really scared and concerned that the birth would go well since her last delivery did not. My brother who was 3 years older than me had been born with birth trauma (the cord was around his neck several times). She said that it was all up to God and the Blessed Mother. She and Mae decided the best solution would be to pray the Memorare' over and over and they did. Everything went well, my birth was easy, and the doctor was pleased when he arrived. Thus, I learned this prayer and a great devotion to our Blessed Mother as a young child.

The Memorare 'is my "Go-To" Prayer. I always call upon Mary's intercession through this prayer when I am confused, frightened, worried, sad, and need to make an important decision. I especially pray it before I need to speak with someone about an important or difficult matter. I pray for the guidance to choose the right words to be understood and not hurt or upset the other person. It is a prayer that gives me strength, peace, and trust.


