

Trinity: revealed, experienced, lived

On the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, the Lectionary readings trace the human experience of the mystery of God, and how God's self-revealing words and actions lead us to explore God's three-fold nature and the mystery of salvation.

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus commissions his disciples to baptize all nations "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Scripture scholars believe that when Matthew wrote his gospel in the 80s AD, his community was already using this Trinitarian baptismal formula to initiate new members. Their lived experience led them to know God as a caring *Father*, Jesus as the Father's teaching and saving *Son*, and the *Spirit* as their community's binding force.

When somebody mentions "the Trinity," our eyes can glaze over. Explanations are usually full of technical theological words like "person" or "hypostasis," or strange math where 3=1. But theology (the study of God) came centuries after God's own self-revelation and humans own lived experience of God.

We know God though the way God acted in history, through the incarnate Word we personally encounter, and through the renewing Spirit that permeates our believing communities. Paul greets his ekklesiais with "the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit" because he personally experienced the grace, love, and community of the saving God. Matthew's ekklesia initiates its new members "in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit" because they personally experienced God in this threefold distinction. Unfortunately, theology's technical words about the Trinity fail to capture the living God of personal experience.

The Trinity Sunday readings invite us to consider our own personal experience of the Father, Son, and Spirit, a God who reveals an ever-deepening mystery of God-in-relationship. As disciples, do we continue to encounter God by listening to Jesus, by learning from Jesus' actions how to live, by learning how to pray with the Spirit, and by doing what is pleasing to the Father? Or do we know all we need to about the God who created, saves, and connects us?

The Most Holy Trinity 2018

Today's Gospel, the last lines of the Gospel of Matthew, portrays the post-resurrection group of disciples as a broken community who waver between worship and doubt, a description that also describes many in our own day. The disciples had followed the instructions of their companions, the women who had been told by both the angel at the tomb and by Jesus where the Lord wanted to meet them. When they met the risen Christ, he explained what his resurrection meant by saying that all power in heaven and earth was his. He was victorious and if they believed



in him and in his promise to remain with them, they would also believe that no evil can overcome him — or them.

Little wonder that disciples both worship and doubt! Believing in Christ implies that they must also believe in themselves as his disciples. The risen Lord believes in his disciples enough to hand on his mission, telling them to make their faith contagious, to spread the good news not as dogma, but in the form of vibrant and attractive love and hope — the only powers capable of transforming ordinary people into other Christs.

The wavering disciples who gathered on that mountain did go out to preach and that made it possible for their faith to overpower their doubts. They had to invent how to carry forth Jesus' message when he was no longer with them as a living prophet, a faithful son of Israel. It was only through that process that they could discover how he was with them in other, more universal ways.

The first disciples had to do in their day what the bishops at Aparecida are calling the church to do in our day. Like them, we need rethink our mission. As heirs to Moses, we are called to renew and confirm the faith we have received. Knowing that the Spirit is ever with us, we need to take the time necessary to hear the Spirit's urgings, to allow ourselves to be lured toward the God who made us and calls us into an unknown but marvelous future. As people chosen and loved by God, we are called to fulfill our vocation as disciples and missionaries, followers of Christ who spread his message and love. Like the early disciples, we must be willing to rethink our mission and revitalize our Gospel message. Moses tells us that we begin by gratefully remembering God's works of creation and liberation. Paul assures us that the Spirit will urge us toward our goal. Most of all, the risen Lord promises to remain with us. Although we may not explain it as such, the process of being disciples and missionaries is what allows our triune God to live in us and work through us.

Today's Gospel tells us that all power in heaven and Earth, all the power of love, has been given to Jesus. The Trinity is all about how God's powers of creation, compassion and love relate to our lives, our societies and cultures. God labors to save all God loves. God gives us power now, through those we love and through those who love us. Sacraments empower us now to live as Jesus lived, inspired and guided by the Holy Spirit. We go forth from this Mass to join justice, foster faith and live love. Love is relational and love usually unites more than two. Families are sets of trinities. Husband, wife, children. Nuclear family, extended family, the family of humankind. Ancestors, present family members, future family members. The sacrament of marriage and family are as much a sign of God's presence as ordained ministry. Parents loving one another; parents loving children, and children loving parents and siblings. If you ever want to really see the love of God, watch parents at the side of their child's hospital bed. God loves us the way parents love children. That's really good news.
