

Weekly challenge from your Faith Formation Team (2/21/2021)

Justice is the second ranked of the natural virtues. We tend to think of justice in very juridical terms so this can be a challenging concept. What does "justice" mean as a virtue, a character trail that inclines a person to act righteously? And how is "just?" sometimes different from "fair"?

Answer to last week's question (2/14/2021)

In common English to be "prudent" generally means "not impulsive," weighing all known facts before making a decision. In the tradition of the Church it is described as the use of our human ability to reason in order to discern the good/best in every situation and determine the best means of achieving it. The catechism says we exercise prudence when we apply moral principles to individual situations – it is how our "conscience" is formed.

Lent: baptism's pledge to renewed discipleship

In the season of Lenten, the believing community follows Jesus as he is tested, transfigured, cleanses the temple, explains how God loves, and announces his hour has come. This week's readings ask us how our discipleship aligns with Jesus' proclamation.

Mark's gospel has two parts: the story of Jesus' *testing* in the wilderness and *Jesus' proclamation of "change of minds/hearts"* (*metanoia*). These stories call every disciple to reflect on the Lenten themes of testing, faithfulness, *metanoia*, and renewed action.

A time of testing. The Spirit who descended on Jesus at his baptism now drives him into the *wilderness*, a place of revelation and testing. Jesus encounters Satan, who attempts to *frustrate God's saving work*. The "wild beasts" reveal the wilderness as the place inhabited by demons. The ministering angels recall the angel who guided the Israelites in the wilderness (Ex 14:19; Ex 23:20). Jesus relives Israel's wilderness testing, but, unlike Israel, he *remains faithful to God*. This story invites every disciple to examine his or her own *testing and faithfulness*.

Jesus' proclamation. Jesus tells his hearers that "the time is *now*; God's kingdom is *near*." God's promised *messianic age starts now*. God's kingdom is *near* in Jesus' *physical presence*, and God's reign is already beginning in Jesus' *preaching*, which *announces and describes* God's kingdom. Hearers must *turn their hearts and minds* (*metanoia*) toward God and away from everything else, and *trust in God's good news* of salvation. Jesus' proclamation invites every disciple to examine his or her *personal commitment to change* and how every disciple is *fulfilling his or her commitment*.

Lent's readings call us to walk with Jesus as he prepares for his transformative death. Today's readings ask how our discipleship tests us every day. Genesis reminds us that God continually calls us to covenant. The author of Peter compares Noah's salvation through water with a disciple's salvation though baptism. Mark shows Jesus tested in his mission, and calling all to change. Lent is a reminder and opportunity to grow into discipleship. Do we see and recognize God's constant invitations to deeper relationship? Do we hear in our baptismal promises our pledge to ongoing *metanoia*? Do we respond faithfully to discipleship's daily tests? Are we open to Jesus' call change our minds and hearts?

1st Sunday of Lent

Every year on the 1st Sunday of Lent, the gospel proclaimed is the desert temptation of Jesus. Mark's account takes place shortly after Jesus' Baptism. The "Spirit drove" Jesus into the wilderness, says Mark. We often describe people as "driven"—by ambition, power, lust, desperation—but what drives Jesus—is the Holy Spirit. He is tossed into the physical and spiritual space where, before he begins his public ministry, before he proclaims one word of

the Good News, he must struggle with two consequences of his baptism: his naming as Son of the Father and his taking to himself sinful humanity represented by the crowds on the Jordan's banks who were called by John to a baptism of repentance. In the desert there are no crowds; Jesus is alone with the Spirit of God and the spirit of evil, with the wild beasts and the angels, with communion and conflict, with the struggle—that will persist throughout his life and death—to be the faithful Son. He is alone with the memory of his ancestors and their wilderness wandering in what for them was not only a place of God's revelation and promises, but also a place of their temptations and failures. Jesus will show himself to be the most faithful man. The temptation between good and evil, between the "angelic" and the "beastly," was starkly exposed in Jesus' own soul. And if we are honest and mindful, we know them in ourselves and in our own struggles to be faithful sons and daughters of God.

The English artist Stanley Spencer (1891–1959) painted a "wilderness series" about the life of Christ. In one of these paintings, he depicts Jesus sitting on the desert sands with a "wild beast." But the beast is not a roaring lion or tiger. In his cupped hands, he holds a small but deadly scorpion. Jesus is no holy ghost, but very much a flesh and blood man. Spencer may be suggesting that the really dangerous beasts are those small ones that can slither unexpectedly into our lives; the persistent sins and small infidelities that, almost unnoticed, can sting and poison our discipleship. And so, we might interpret Spencer's painting, and Mark's account, positively: as a vision of peace and harmony in a restored creation in the hands of the "New Adam" on whom angels wait in service.

Jesus comes out from his desert experience strengthened for praise and pain and mission. The arrest of John the Baptist is the first storm that breaks over Mark's gospel, but over it rises a rainbow of hope as Jesus proclaims his first words: *"This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel."* On Ash Wednesday, the last words of that proclamation were pronounced as we (who are dust) were signed with ashes and called to Lenten mindfulness of the struggle between sin and grace, success and failure.

The desert sand is not under our feet but in our hearts. Our desert is experienced in the daily irritations and nagging loneliness we often feel. We need these Lenten weeks of heightened awareness of the importance of uncluttered spiritual and physical space where we can come to grips with our pain, where we can discover the beauty of God and our sisters and brothers under the surface of our busy lives, and where we can allow our ears to be more opened to the word of God in our Sunday liturgy and acts of daily prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. We may then become much wiser about the spiritual baggage that we, as daily desert travelers, need to keep or discard on the journey toward Easter.
