



We usually think of the Mass as beginning with the procession or maybe the Sign of the Cross or the opening dialogue, but the first rubric, the first liturgical instruction of the Mass is actually further back than any of that. The rubric begins "When the people are gathered ...," so the first liturgical action of the Church when we celebrate the Eucharist is our gathering into the church.

We don't usually think of how we simply come through the doors of the church as something liturgical, but that's precisely why the Church wants to remind us of this in her

Christ Remains Present

Powerful thread of truth runs through each of today's Easter season readings: Jesus resurrected. "God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses," (Acts 2:32). The Apostles testified to this raising of Jesus, but also, and maybe even more powerful is the testimony of those who did not want this truth to be known. Scholars often refer to the latter as "hostile witnesses." People, who could not deny what they saw but did not wish to perpetuate the following of Christ, become witnesses to the majesty of God. Fascinating how differently the world perceives the history of secular nature from that of religion. We possess many history books filled with events, teachings and speeches; we do not doubt nor question; we trust what was seen and recorded has been done so accurately. And it is taught from generation to generation.

Yet, how few believe "God raised this Jesus." The Resurrection opened Heaven to those "who through him believe in God who raised him from the dead and gave him glory so that your faith and hope are in God." St. Peter reminds us to hold fast to this truth so that our hope and faith remain with God. The testimony of those who saw, spoke, and ate with the Risen Lord, provides us a confident hope in the Good News. No one, but One, has ever claimed "[In the Mass,] the most sacred truths of the faith are given full material reality, leading up to that moment when Christ himself becomes present at the altar."

instructions. Subconsciously we do act this way — we plan ahead, we choose to go, we get dressed, we gather the family, we leave knowing the amount of time it will take to arrive. All of these acts of the will are directed towards the Mass, are pointed towards the Lord.

But we do all this because we have been invited to come here. The Lord has set aside a particular day with a particular group of people for us to join with and offer worship and thanksgiving. We do not just 'gather' like iron filings around a magnet or as a group or club of our own making, but we 'gather' at the invitation of the Lord, at the Word of the God Who desires us to spend time with Him.

Sometimes our gathering is more prayerful or more hurried than other times, but it is good ... to stop and consider: "How do I enter into the house of the Lord?" "Do I 'gather' at His invitation or out of my own wants?"

to be the Son of God and then rose from the dead. Two thousand years later, we are still speaking of his salvific work upon the cross, still re-presenting those moments upon altars across the world, still worshiping and singing praises.

The 24th chapter of Luke's Gospel includes the Walk to Emmaus. Jesus journeyed alongside these disciples, but they did not recognize him. He is still with us today, a true and ever-present companion. How often do we fail to recognize Jesus in our midst? In the Emmaus encounter, in the breaking of bread, "their eyes were opened and they recognized him," (Luke 24:31). Jesus offers the faithful that same wondrous opportunity at each and every Mass to be present at the blessing and breaking of the bread. To experience the burning of our hearts as the Scriptures are opened, and Jesus is made truly present – Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity – in the Eucharist.

When the disciples encountered Jesus on the road, they urged him to stay with them. Through God's mystical, remarkable workings, which we will never comprehend this side of Heaven, Jesus remains with us still at every consecration, in every tabernacle, and within the heart of those who receive him in the Eucharist.



Prayer of the Penitent

Toward the end of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation (commonly known as confession) we pray the Prayer of the Penitent also known as the Act of Contrition. Did you know there are different options for this prayer? Over the next few weeks, we'll feature the different options so you can find one that helps you better understand and receive the forgiveness that reconciles your relationship with God.

Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin. I acknowledge my offense; my sin is before me always.






