Seminarian, Jacob Stinnett's Column

This weekend, one of my classmates at the Josephinum, now Deacon Brian Smith of the Diocese of Youngstown, was ordained a deacon. His original date for ordination was at the beginning of June, but due to COVID-19, his ordination date was pushed back to Saturday, September 12. His ordination took place exactly three months after mine. Watching the ordination rites from the outside has given me a little bit of reflection on what a powerful moment it is for the man being ordained and for the life of the Church Universal. The Church now has a new deacon, a new servant for the Lord and for His people. The Church will be stronger through all the lives Deacon Smith will impact, through all the graces that will come through the sacraments he celebrates, and through all the people he will assist on their path to Heaven. Please keep Deacon Brian Smith and his ministry in your prayers.

Before the Laying on of Hands and Prayer of Ordination, the candidate makes seven solemn promises. The response to six of the seven is "I do," just as a couple says at their wedding. The deacon is, in a way, marrying the Church; he is entering into a loving relationship with the Church, the Bride of Christ, in order to help the People of God walk the road of life towards Heaven. Like a marriage, ordination is permanent. Once a deacon, always a deacon, even if the man is ordained a priest or even a bishop. He will always have the character of a deacon, and his diaconate will always be a source of grace for him. He never loses the call to serve. Like a marriage, ordination is ordered to the procreation of children: in this case, spiritual children. The deacon baptizes children (which I have done twice!), bringing them into the family of God. The child now knows God not only as his or her Creator, but more intimately as his or her Father, through Jesus Christ. The love of the family that finds its source in marriage is a model of the perfect love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in which all the baptized live.

There is one promise that has a longer answer than "I do." The bishop asks the candidate: "Do you resolve to conform your way of life always to the example of Christ, of whose Body and Blood you are a minister at the altar?" This is a daunting question. As Christians, conforming our way of life to Christ is something that we all should be striving for and growing in throughout our lifetime. But it takes on a new significance in the life of a deacon, priest or bishop. They are now ministers of the Body and Blood of Christ, which means that they are set aside in service to Christ in His Eucharistic Presence. Not only does the deacon have to assist at Mass and bring Holy Communion to the people, but he has a special calling to live out daily the perfect love of the sacrifice of Christ in the Eucharist. To this promise, the candidate responds "I do, with the help of God." This great promise can only come to fruition with grace. It is not something that any of us can do alone.

This is the final solemn promise before committing to respect and obey, to the bishop, and it really sums up all the other promises that the deacon makes: being set aside for ministry, doing so with humble charity, proclaiming the faith by word and deed, celibacy (in the case of transitional deacons), and praying the Liturgy of the Hours daily for the Church. All of them are different aspects of living a Eucharistic life. The deacon's ministry is one of service: Christ, in His own diaconate, says of Himself: "the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mt 20:28). All Christians are called to imitate Christ in giving of themselves in service to God and to their neighbor. I and all the other deacons around the world have received a special calling and responded to it with these seven promises in a unique way. By God's grace, we live out the Eucharist, which we serve, for our own salvation and for the salvation of all God's people. We do this through a life of service dedicated to the People of God, giving of ourselves in a sacrificial way, "giving our lives as a ransom for many." Please remember all deacons, priests, and bishops in your daily prayers.

The Art of Listening

As Catholics, we are familiar with the word "hope." We read it in the Bible and hear it from the pulpit. We know how it feels to live in a broken world, while at the same time, believe in God's love and promises. Yet what do we do when life throws us several curve balls, storms come crashing down, and all seems hopeless?

Right now, during such an unprecedented and challenging time, it is easy to lose hope. Many people are experiencing very real losses and there are numerous questions about what the future holds. Many may feel very unsettled and be experiencing stress or even despair.

Yet, this is when as disciples of Jesus Christ, we can offer what Pope Francis calls the "therapy of hope" to the suffering. Speaking about Jesus' encounter with the two individuals on the road to Emmaus, Pope Francis explained that Jesus offered the "therapy of hope" by first "asking and listening."

Asking and listening to how others are doing and feeling is a ministry of love and accompaniment. It allows others to be heard, share their experience, and feel cared for. It invites dialogue, aids in healing, and opens the door for others to feel the love of Christ through us.

"The Church listens to everyone's stories as they emerge from the treasure chest of personal conscience, in order to then offer the Word of Life, the witness of love, a love that is faithful until the end. And this, the hearts of people reignite with hope."

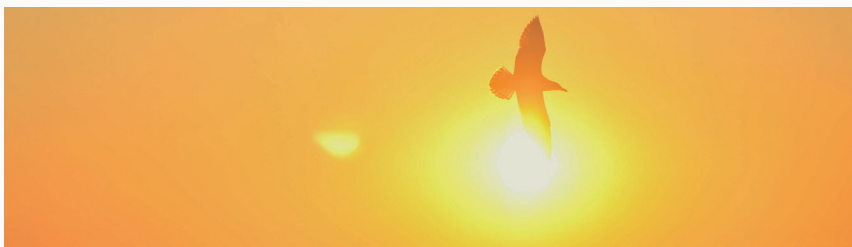
Although listening is a critical skill, it does not always come naturally. Fortunately, there are several simple ways to become a better listener, including:

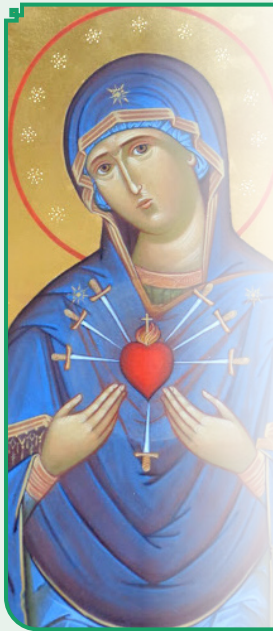

SAINT OF THE DAY FOR SEPTEMBER 15



Our Lady of Sorrows

The Story of Our Lady of Sorrows:

For a while there were two feasts in honor of the Sorrowful Mother: one going back to the 15th century, the other to the 17th century. For a while both were celebrated by the universal Church: one on the Friday before Palm Sunday, the other in September.

The principal biblical references to Mary's sorrows are in Luke 2:35 and John 19:26-27. The Lucan passage is Simeon's prediction about a sword piercing Mary's soul; the Johannine passage relates Jesus' words from the cross to Mary and to the beloved disciple.

Many early Church writers interpret the sword as Mary's sorrows, especially as she saw Jesus die on the cross. Thus, the two passages are brought together as prediction and fulfillment.

Saint Ambrose in particular sees Mary as a sorrowful yet powerful figure at the cross. Mary stood fearlessly at the cross while others fled. Mary looked on her Son's wounds with pity but saw in them the salvation of the world. As Jesus hung on the cross, Mary did not fear to be killed, but offered herself to her persecutors. John's account of Jesus' death is highly symbolic. When Jesus gives the beloved disciple to Mary, we are invited to appreciate Mary's role in the Church: She symbolizes the Church; the beloved disciple represents all believers. As Mary mothered Jesus, she is now mother to all His followers. Furthermore, as Jesus died, He handed over His Spirit. Mary and the Spirit cooperate in begetting new children of God – almost an echo of Luke's account of Jesus' conception. Christians can trust that they will continue to experience the caring presence of Mary and Jesus' Spirit throughout their lives and throughout history.
