RENEWING CATHOLICISM

We are a People of Justice and Love

As the Lenten season begins it seems appropriate to reflect on these Social Teachings of the Catholic Church. We need to discern how we as individuals and as a community value and honor life within and without. We need to work for quality of life for ourselves for ALL people from conception till death. The Social Teachings cover the whole gamut as is evident in the themes we are presenting here.

SOLIDARITY OF THE HUMAN FAMILY: Solidarity helps us to see the "other" (whether a person, people or nation) as a neighbor, a "sharer," a "helper," irrespective of age, race, gender, ethnicity, political persuasion, etc. there is an interconnection among all people demanding that we value and respect the experience of all. We are all part of the household, no one should be left out.

DIGNITY OF WORK Work is an extension of the person, his/her gifts, talents, education. It is also that person's contribution to the common good. Work should enhance the human person, not demean him/her for less noble motives. People should be able to earn a living wage with adequate benefits and be employed in good working conditions. Workers must also respect their employers and perform their job honestly.

Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical "On the Dignity of Work" in 1891 drew up the principles for both management and the worker. In this historical document, the Church laid out its adherence to the principles of workers' rights to organize and the managements' rights to receiving a full day's work for a full day's pay. The rights and responsibilities for both sides were identified.

BLESSING: May the God of VISION be with you. May you see as God sees and dream as God dreams for the world around you. With the eyes of God, may you look upon those who are hurting and know compassion, upon those who are holy and know joy, upon those who are broken and know understanding and mercy. May this God help you to see the truth about yourself no matter how beautiful it is. May the blessing of VISION be on you.

NEWS FROM FR. DANIEL SWARTZ: The infantry battalion with which Fr. Daniel Swartz is chaplain has just received orders to the Middle East. Fr. Swartz is a priest of our Diocese and was ordained in May of 2016. He is also a military chaplain and was commissioned into the United States Navy Chaplain Corps, in January of 2015. Due to changes in administration and geopolitical shifts, Fr. Swartz's assignment came on quite a short notice. He will be departing the United States with his unit in early April and is set to return by October of this year. Mission parameters are still being drawn up, but will include Kuwait, Iraq, Syria, Djibouti, and Jordan. Fr. Swartz asks for you to remember his marines and sailors in your prayers during this time.

ST. PIUS X CHURCH & SCHOOL DRIVE UP FISH/SHRIMP FRIES


St. Pius X will host three Lenten Fish/Shrimp Fries this year. These will be on March 5, and March 19, from 5:00-7:00 p.m. in front of the Family Center Kitchen.

This is a simple menu for everyone to drive up to the Family Center Kitchen, place your order and return home to eat your fish or shrimp.

The menu this year is very simple. You may order:

Three pieces of fried fish (Icelandic Cod-Battered Tavern Brand) **OR** six pieces of fried shrimp (panko bread crumb). The side dishes are rice pilaf OR 8 hushpuppies. The meal is \$10.00 each.

No additional side dishes or items will be offered. No condiments or cutlery or napkins. People will be taking this home to eat it and these items will be very stable and still taste good when you arrive home.



All profits will go to the SOS fund, Support Our Seminarians. Father Andrew H. Hohman Knights of Columbus Council #5253. St. Pius X is currently supporting two Seminarians.

Exciting Updates for our Capital Campaign: We currently have raised over \$4.4 million dollars in pledges and over \$3.6 million in cash. The past eight weeks I have contacted many parishioners who have not paid on their pledges for several months, and requested they contact me to confirm whether they are going to be able to continue their pledge payments. Many have confirmed they will continue, while a few have needed to discontinue their pledge and we are still waiting on some folks to let us know. If we lay out the cost increases from Sullivan Builders of \$57,436.00, plus the additional expenses of furniture, religious items for the Adoration Chapel and appliances for the kitchenette of \$50,000.00 for a total increase of \$107,436.00. Add this to the balance of needed pledges and this is \$156,476.00. If you are asking yourselves if we can complete this very soon, YES, WE CAN!! Two weeks ago, we had another generous parishioner come forward to offer an additional pledge of up to \$30,000.00 of *matching funds*, for any new pledges or pledge increases. This could bring an additional \$60,000.00 to the Campaign! We have received \$5,872.00 in new pledges and increases so with the matched pledge, this is \$11,744.00 total off the balance of \$156,476.00, for a total of \$144,732.00 as of this week.

The entire Phase II project is focused on building-up our parish: as a community of friendship with Christ, and as a communion of faith in Christ, with every person valued, and every family involved.

We are extremely proud and thankful for all of you that have made a pledge and continue to honor this commitment to St. Pius X Church and School by continuing to pay on your pledge until it is completed.

SEMINARIAN, JACOB STINNETT'S COLUMN

The COVID-19 pandemic has been in America for nearly a year now, and we have all experienced a lot of suffering from it. By now, we all know someone who has had COVID and maybe even people who have died from it. Many have been struggling with unemployment or underemployment, with making ends meet for our families. With so many schools being closed, helping our children learn has been a stressful experience. There are the social distancing and mask restrictions that become tedious and exhausting quickly. There is also the fear and psychological stress of the pandemic that has afflicted all of us. I don't mean to make this just a list of bad things; we all know them. But I want to acknowledge the suffering of the past year. This Lent, I would like to reflect with you on a letter that Pope St. John Paul II wrote in 1984 called *Salvifici Doloris*, "On the Christian Meaning of Suffering." Each week, we will look at a new section of the letter and delve into the great saint's understanding of suffering and how we can grow closer to grow precisely *through* our suffering, not just in spite of it. My only caution is that if you are only a casual reader of this column, please know that the next several weeks will be building on each other, and thus they are to be read as a series, and maybe not as stand-alone pieces.

John Paul II begins with one of my favorite quotes from St. Paul's letters. It is Colossians 1:24 "In my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of His Body, that is, the Church." Understanding just what Paul means when he writes this is the goal of the pope's letter, and hopefully it will become clearer for all of us through this Lenten journey together. Suffering is part of being human, and it is something unique to being human, because we can reflect on it, we experience our own suffering in a way that no other creature can and does. Our dog or cat might be in pain, but it cannot ask the question "Why?" and it does not know that this suffering should not be. This is part of the mystery of suffering, a mystery that "is as deep as man himself, precisely because it manifests in its own way that depth which is proper to man. [...] Suffering seems to belong to man's transcendence: it is one of those points in which man is in a certain sense 'destined' to go beyond himself, and he is called to his in a mysterious way" (SD 2). That suffering is a mystery does not mean that we cannot make any sense out of it, as if it were unknowable. Suffering is a mystery because it is something beyond us, something that is greater than our power to know. We can give meaning to suffering (the goal of our Lenten journey through Salvifici Doloris), but we cannot comprehend it fully.

Chapter II of *Salvifici Doloris* is entitled "The World of Human Suffering." The purpose of this chapter is to acknowledge the fact that people suffer, that it is a part of everyone's life. This may seem obvious, but there are temptations to think other things about suffering. Some might try to deny it outright, saying that suffering does not really exist, that it is just in our minds. Some might take the attitude that suffering can never be understood at all, and we just have to resign ourselves to this cruel existence. A popular belief today is that suffering can be understood and eliminated completely in some future utopia, so get on board. In the face of all these notions, the Christian claim is the only one that ultimately remains coherent and addresses suffering and humanity's experience of it. Christianity does not deny suffering, does not resign us to suffering, but does admit that suffering is not something that we can fully understand and overcome. Nowhere does Jesus say that He came to eliminate suffering.

John Paul II begins by acknowledging the hard and mysterious reality of suffering, because this is what Jesus did in His earthly mission. In taking on our human nature, Jesus, too, experienced pain and suffering. We know He wept at the death of His friend Lazarus; He sweat blood thinking about the pain of His Crucifixion, and He experienced the full reality of death on Good Friday. There is both physical suffering and moral suffering, or what the pope describes as "pain of the soul." This "suffering seems almost inexpressible and nontransferable": our pain and suffering is our own; we cannot give it to someone. Suffering comes from an encounter with evil. "Man suffers on account of evil, which is a certain lack, limitation or distortion of good. We could say that man suffers because of a good in which he does not share, from which in a certain sense he is cut off, or of which he has deprived himself. He particularly suffers when he ought—in the normal order of things—to have a share in this good and does not have it" (SD 7). This is not something nice to come face to face with, but there is hope in this statement by the pope: the meaning of suffering comes through the good that is lost in the suffering. The good is how we can come to make sense of suffering and even rejoice in it like St. Paul. Next week, we will look at Chapter III, entitled "The Quest for an Answer to the Question of the Meaning of Suffering."

ESL learners continue in the program until they feel they have gained the skills that they want to acquire. GED learners, however, have a very specific end goal and typically only stay with us until they have successfully completed their GED (General Equivalency Diploma). Prior to being matched with a learner, all tutors are trained in the subject area that they have chosen to tutor. At this time, the majority of our matches are working together via Zoom or another online platform, but when the pandemic allows, we will also encourage those that can, to meet in person at our South Side location. We ask our tutors to commit to working with their learner for 1½-2 hours a week. Blessed Luke Belludi (1,200-c. 1,285)

Blessed Luke Belludi's Story:

In 1220, Saint Anthony was preaching conversion to the inhabitants of Padua when a young nobleman, Luke Belludi, came up to him and humbly asked to receive the habit of the followers of Saint Francis. Anthony liked the talented, well-educated Luke and personally recommended him to Francis, who then received him into the Franciscan Order.

Luke, then only 20, was to be Anthony's companion in his travels and in his preaching, tending to him in his last days and taking Anthony's place upon his death. He was appointed guardian of the Friars Minor in the city of Padua. In 1239, the city fell into the hands of its enemies. Nobles were put to death, the mayor and council were banished, the great university of Padua gradually closed and the church dedicated to Saint Anthony was left unfinished. Luke himself was expelled from the city but secretly returned. At night he and the new guardian would visit the tomb of Saint Anthony in the unfinished shrine to pray for his help. One night a voice came from the tomb assuring them that the city would soon be delivered from its evil

After the fulfillment of the prophetic message, Luke was elected provincial minister and furthered the completion of the great basilica in honor of Anthony, his teacher. He founded many convents of the order and had, as Anthony, the gift of miracles. Upon his death he was laid to rest in the basilica that he had helped finish and has had a continual veneration up to the present time.

The epistles refer several times to a man named Luke as Paul's trusted companion on his missionary journeys. Perhaps every great preacher needs a Luke; Anthony surely did. Luke Belludi not only accompanied Anthony on his travels, he also cared for the great saint in his final illness and carried on Anthony's mission after the saint's death. Yes, every preacher needs a Luke, someone to offer support and reassurance-including those who minister to us. We don't even have to change our names!


