Dear Padre,

Why are the Gospels Matthew and Mark so alike? Why did the Church keep both Gospels when so much of Mark seems to be a mirror image of Matthew?

The Gospels were written over time and used by the faithful when they gathered for worship. They read the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) and accounts of the life and ministry of Jesus collected by Matthew, Mark, and Luke.

The Christian communities were often great distances from one another. A community may have had access to only one of these accounts. There is considerable similarity because the Gospel writers depended on one another. All three Gospels include

some of the same incidents. Each also has incidents or details unique to that Gospel.

These were not the only accounts written about the life and ministry of Jesus. At some point, the Church had to decide which should be considered the inspired word of God. There were four accounts that were widely used: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. With their similarities and differences, the Church accepted these four accounts as Gospel-the Good News.



ometimes it seems as if life is a laboratory of designed experiments on how to become human, all of them allotted ten-year blocks.

Have you noticed how nine- and ten-year-olds can be easy to be around? Then about the time we've gotten being a kid down to a science, life begins to move us into adolescence. We want to be independent and responsible, but we don't yet have all the skills. We have sexual feelings, but we're expected not to act on them. About the time we reach adulthood and move into our twenties, it seems we can finally do what we want, but then we might drink too much, spend too much, drive too fast, and party too long. Once we begin to settle down around year thirty, we have to learn how to live with another person. One likes it warm, the other cool. One seeks to save, the other spends. One is a homebody, the other enjoys going out on the town. By the time we've gotten to our sixties and seventies, we may have figured out life, but by then we've used up most of our energy.

Faith suggests it's the hand of God shaping us into the sort of persons we're meant to be. "Lord, you are our father; we are the clay and you our potter: we are all the work of your hand" (Isaiah 64:7). Advent may be a time to figure out how God is acting in your life now and look back to see that God was shaping you all along. •

Let Us Be on The Watch for Christ's Return

As we begin this Advent season, we need to begin the season of preparation and anticipation. Yes, this is a time for us to prepare for Christmas - for family that may be visiting or ourselves going to visit family. Whatever it may be, we prepare ourselves and family members in anticipation of these events.

How much have we prepared ourselves in anticipation of Christ's return? Do we put as much energy and time preparing for the major events such as Thanksgiving and Christmas as we do in preparing ourselves for Christ's return? Jesus tells us in our Gospel reading, just as he told his disciples, that we need to be alert, to be ready, and to watch. In short, he tells them to be full of hope. Are we full of hope in anticipation of our Lord's return?

Advent is a season of hope, and the parable in our Gospel makes it clear that our hope cannot be passive. Hope is an activity for every Catholic, not simply a passive state of being.

Hope is one of the theological virtues, and like the other virtues, it requires action. To be virtuous first requires building up a sort of habit of doing the good — a state of being which is inclined to do the good. The courageous person is ready to face his or her fear and fight for the good. In this way, virtues such as hope are a sort of passive state of being. But virtues are also activities. They must be actualized — made real — by some specific action. The courageous person must not only be ready to face his or her fear but must actually feel some specific fear and actually pursue the good in spite of it.

Hope is a desire, a longing, for some future and difficult-to-obtain happiness. Ultimately, it is a longing for nothing less than the return of Christ and our eternal reunion with Him. This is the posture, the attitude, that Jesus describes in the servants of the traveling master. It is not enough for them to be good stewards of the house who passively wait for his coming. They and WE need to be on watch — actively looking for HIM.

All Catholic as well as our Protestant brothers and sisters, during this Advent season, must be fully alive and fully engaged. We must be active in our pursuit of the Lord, looking around every corner and eager for his return.
