### Dear Padre,

Was Jesus born in a stable or a cave? The Christmas scene in our church has Jesus born in a little shed, but in my friend's church it looks more like a cave. The Bible says Jesus was born in a manger, so just where was Jesus born?

The Christmas scenes, sometimes called Nativity scenes or crèches, vary from church to church. In Scripture, we find more details about the Nativity in Luke's Gospel, but even he simply



says that Mary wrapped Jesus in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because the inn was full (Luke 2:7).

In none of the Scriptures do we have any details about what the place looked like, but since a manger is a place where caregivers feed livestock, we can assume that Jesus was born in a stable of some kind. At that time, small caves sometimes were used as stables.

Nativity scenes, though, are not an attempt to present a historically accurate picture of where Jesus was born. Rather, scenes of the birth of Jesus remind us of the special love that God shows for us in sending the Son to us. We do not care so much about creating an exact picture of what took place as we do of beholding the beauty and wonder of God born among us.


### **Making Room** for God

he story of John the Baptist is the story of taking a back seat to Jesus, of fading into the background so that Jesus might be the light. Fading out of the picture is something we may find ourselves doing more than once in our lives. Sometimes it's also a choice we have to make, even when it's painful.

Actor Nick Nolte talked about what it was like for him when he turned seventy; how his body would hurt and how painful it was to get out of bed some mornings. He told of how he cried when a longtime friend passed away and of the sadness death brings. But the worst part, he said, is coming to the realization that your children have grown up, are on their own, and don't need you the way they once did. His son has a family, and for him the family comes first, as it should be. That's the painful part, Nolte says, the letting go of your children because they are no longer yours; in reality, they never were.

From the perspective of faith, why do we need to fade into the background? To leave room for the hand of God in life, that's why. So that God can do what God does best, and so that we don't get in the way of it all. That is a task not only at the end of life but for all of life.

### We Rejoice Always Because in Christ, We Have Good News!

Today, we lit the pink candle of joy for Gaudete Sunday, the Sunday of rejoicing. <u>I say again, Rejoice Always</u>; we heard Paul say this to the people of Thessalonian. Paul uses the word <u>Always</u>, he says. Today we may do so because Christmas is almost here, but rejoice <u>Always</u>? Is this even possible? It is!

Isaiah is overjoyed because the Spirit of the Lord is upon him and sends him to do good works such as healing, proclaiming liberty, and bringing the news of God's vindication to his people. Isaiah knows the Lord is with him and gives him great work to do.

In our responsorial psalm today, where the verses are actually from the Gospel of Luke, not the Psalms themselves, Mary is full of joy because the Lord has looked upon her lowliness and done great things for her. She will be the mother of Christ; all generations will call her and give her great meaning and purpose.

John seems to delight in his mission and purpose as he cries out: *Make straight the way of the Lord*. In dark days for his people, John testifies to Christ, the light, so that others may have hope and believe through him. Again, John lives out the purpose given to him and knows the Lord is at hand.

Isaiah, Mary, John, and Paul, because they know the Lord is with them and working through them, that they have the Good News and they glory in sharing it. What is our Good News to share? Perhaps, like Isaiah, we have the good news about the meaningful work or service we have been called to. Perhaps, like Mary, we have good news about the family or friends we have been blessed with. Or maybe times are currently dark, but like John, we have good news about a future filled with hope in Christ.

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and in all circumstances, give thanks. Paul teaches us! We do not do this because our unceasing prayers are always answered, or because we are thankful for circumstances that are always in our favor. We do so because, in Christ, we always have Good News to share. It may not be as dramatic as the news we heard in today's readings, but it is personal and meaningful because we know how the Lord has blessed us and given our lives meaning and purpose.

In the darkness of Advent, we always look to the light of Christ and rejoice in the Good News we have in him. In our rejoicing, we come to the Lord unceasingly with our needs, as we did in our petitions today. We must always rejoice and give thanks, as we did in the Eucharistic celebration at mass today, for the times when things are not well when things are going well, but most of all, we need to praise and thank God for the gift of his Son, Our Lord, Our Redeemer but more importantly, His LOVE!
