Dear Padre,

Does praying to the saints really do any good?

Prayer can connect us, however mysteriously, to those who have gone before us in faith. If prayer can change people, opening them to God's grace and healing, then surely the saints and our deceased loved ones can facilitate similar healing from their communion at God's right hand. Such prayer also calls us, however subtly, to the central mystery that we also shall one day die and be a part of that communion. Thus, even as we seek the intercession of the saints for our earthly cares, such prayer reminds us that the fire of our own lives is being consumed daily, and that each of us will inevitably receive a call to death when it becomes God's will.



When Sr. Thea Bowman (1937–1990)—brilliant, creative, beautiful, and passionately alive—was diagnosed with cancer, she wondered how to pray. "I didn't know if I should pray for healing or death. Then, I found peace in praying for what my folks call 'God's perfect will.' As it evolved, my prayer became 'Lord, let me live until I die.' By that I mean I want to live, love, and serve fully until death comes. If that prayer is answered, I am able to truly live until I die. How long really doesn't matter."

cousin died recently. After the burial, I walked among the gravesites remembering many of those I had once known who were now buried nearby. I came across a tombstone engraved with the epitaph: "In all of life God brings us to where we should be." I noted the statement was not about where we want to be or where we think we need to be, but about where we should be. I agree. Even though we may find ourselves grumbling about how it is that we ended up where we are in life, the gospel suggests that God has sent us to that place.

We may think to ourselves: this is not the life I chose; this is not the marriage I thought it would be; this is not what I thought raising a family would look like; this is not what retirement is supposed to be. We may think that little of life is what we chose it to be. Yet somehow, God brings us to where we are, as if we've been sent as the Twelve were sent to overcome evil and bring about healing, even though no one ever asked if it was what we wanted. Wherever we are, it is there that we have been chosen to become holy. The Letter to the Ephesians tells us that God chose us, even before the world began to unfold, chose us to be holy, to be the presence of God in all that comes our way.

We are Blessed with Every Spiritual Blessing in The Heavens

At the beginning of the Rite of Baptism, the person about to be given this adoption in Christ is called by name. This mirrors a truth that runs all our theology: We are present here today because God has called us, by name, as unique individuals. God knows each of us intimately and has designed us to play a crucial role in his loving plan for goodness.

In today's Gospel, we see the striking aftermath of this kind of call. The disciples are sent, and they drive out many demons and cure many who are ill. They combat the powers of evil and darkness and bring God's goodness everywhere they go. They also anoint with oil – they offer tangible evidence of God's presence and share God's healing generously.

There is a temptation to relegate this pattern to the past, to assume such effects could only be manifested in the lives of great saints of other times. But God's power has not changed. God's capacity to work mighty deeds has not diminished. Our calling is no different – we are created to be saints! Like Amos, we may be going about our own work, but God says to us, "Go."

Responding to this call requires us to pause and listen, be formed in prayer, and align our hearts and minds with God's voice. God is calling us at every moment: calling us to a relationship with Him, calling us to love Him and one another while sharing the Gospel and calling us to a life of holiness in witness to the Gospel message. This call is not a one-time event but a continuous, loving invitation from God.

If you feel overwhelmed by this calling and to take on such a mission, let us look to the Letter to the Ephesians:

• Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavens, as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world. God has lavished the riches of His grace upon us!

Be assured that by responding to God's calls, He will never leave us alone in that call. It is a call to be drawn to His side, swept up in His life, carried by His Spirit. Yes, <u>God will ask much of us, but we should not be afraid of that ask. It is an invitation to live fully, richly, and generously.</u>

Know that anything we give to God, any sacrifice we make in response to His invitation, will be returned and poured out on the world, transformed by God's perfect love.

Regardless of where we find ourselves today, whether we are going about our work like Amos, following Christ like the Twelve Apostles, or somewhere in between, we have been summoned here by God. He has drawn us here to nourish us, to give us nothing less than His whole self so we can answer that call and participate in God's work in the world. As we prepare to receive Him in this holy Eucharist, let us listen for Christ's call, and ask for the grace we need to answer courageously, to respond actively, and to transform our world with His love. Remember, each of us has a unique and significant role to play in this transformative mission.
