Dear Padre,

After we die and go to heaven, will our quardian angel still be with us? Will we know the angel in a closer way?

"The existence of the spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls 'angels' is a truth of faith" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 328). The notion that each person has his or her own quardian angel may be based on Jesus' warning not to despise "little ones" because "their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Matthew 18:10). Saint Basil wrote, "Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life." How might we interact with these constant companions in heaven? In heaven, we'll be consumed with the



presence of the beatific vision—the immediate knowledge of God, which the angelic spirits and the souls of the just enjoy. In beholding God face to face, we find perfect happiness. "This perfect life with the Most Holy Trinity—this communion of life and love with the Trinity, with the Virgin Mary, the angels and all the blessed—is called 'heaven.' Heaven is the ultimate end and fulfillment of the deepest human longings, the state of supreme, definitive happiness" (CCC 1024). Even though "this mystery of blessed communion with God and all who are in Christ is beyond all understanding and description" (CCC 1027), to imagine the pure joy of being close to our guardian angel is just a foretaste of what heaven will be!

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

Spirited Truth

t's not always easy to figure out where God's spirit of truth is revealed or by whom the truth is spoken. After "the Lord came down in the cloud and spoke to Moses," some of that same spirit given to Moses was also bestowed upon the seventy elders. Two other men also received the spirit, although they were not specially designated, much to the consternation of the elders (see Numbers 11:25–26). These two outsiders were somehow included among those who saw themselves as insiders. How is one to know who speaks with the authority of the spirit?

Perhaps we all need to pay attention to the possibility that "outsiders" may be speaking the truth to us. Faith communities are often considered outsiders in the larger society, not worthy of a platform to be heard from; yet, many faith communities raise their voices in

defense of the unborn, the immigrants at our doors, and the lost souls adrift among us. Throughout life, we've been surprised by children who speak truth that is unrecognized by adults. We've been surprised by the voice of women to a patriarchal society, the sexually abused to the larger Church, those who defend victims of violence. But not all outsiders speak with the authority of the spirit. How is one to know? Perhaps the Gospel gives us a clue—those who give others a cup of water to drink, which is to say, those who speak with compassion on behalf of others who are thirsty for iustice and life.

Whatever we put our trust in will draw us closer to Christ or will pull us away.

When a person says they are "spiritual but not religious," what does that mean? It can be understood that what is generally meant is that the person is interested in spiritual realities but suspicious of the systems and structures that humans use to engage with them.

This suspicion should give those of us intimately bound up in these systems and structures pause, and our hearts should go out to those who might make such a claim. The claim to be "spiritual but not religious" is problematic because it demonstrates a profound misunderstanding of the human person. As embodied souls – spiritual and material beings – we encounter the spiritual through the tangible. This is what religion is – the tangible, audible, visible, touchable, and seeable ways in which we connect with the spiritual. The word religion comes from a Latin term that means "to bind." Religion is how we are bound together with spiritual realities, most importantly, God.

To be "not religious" is to be unbound, untethered, and disconnected from the spiritual and, in other words, disconnected from God. There is a real danger here, for we are religious beings by nature! If we are not tethered to God by practices, teachings, rituals, and sacraments given to us by God, then we will, by nature, bind ourselves to ... other things. Lesser things.

In our second reading from the Letter of Saint James, we hear a litany of these lesser things. Oh, the temptation to bind ourselves to treasure and luxury and pleasure! Yet none of these things can last. None can carry us through misery in a satisfactory way. None can endure through the doorway of death. They are not enough.

So, if we are not bound by the obligations, structures, and teachings of religion, we may find ourselves afloat, lost in a sea of choices, none of which can satisfy the deepest of our human needs.

Our Gospel reading today starkly contrasts these choices. Whatever we trust in, whatever we seek out to meet our deepest human needs, will either draw us closer to Christ and so draw us to goodness and love, or it will pull us away. One choice leads to life and life in abundance. The other leads to corrosion and misery.

As we confront this stark choice, these readings remind us that we are not left to seek blindly. God prepares and equips leaders such as Moses and the disciples. God sends the Holy Spirit, even to unexpected places. God is working through people of all sorts to provide for our needs and give us a cup of water to drink. God bestows his gifts generously on his people through all the structures and practices of our Faith.

As we approach the greatest of these gifts, the Eucharist, let us ask God to show us the areas where we are placing our trust, which are outside of his goodness. Let us request the grace to open our hearts to his unexpected gifts. <u>May we be drawn into his life and his love, bound to him in this Blessed Sacrament.</u>
