### Dear Padre,

My family, friends, and coworkers seem to be uncomfortable when I tell them that I've been praying for them. Should I just keep it to myself?

There is nothing fundamentally wrong with telling people you have been praying for them. Most people are probably grateful for such care and support. But it can be a little tricky. If the person believes the praying is



actually a judgment and not a blessing, it may provoke a less-than-grateful response. This is where honest discernment on your part is invited. Are you coming across as prayerfully concerned, or is there some criticism or judgment in what seems to be an innocent blessing? People are able to perceive the difference.

Another consideration—and this is not at all unusual as a response in the culture of today—is that some people are very defensive about any religious expressions and do not react favorably. Think, for example, about the different reactions to "Merry Christmas" or "Happy Holidays," which can often provoke the familiar idiom "them's fightin' words." My best advice is to keep praying for everyone, as no one truly understands or fully appreciates the power of prayer. That being said, temper your announcement when you suspect it will not be well received. This demonstrates a grateful and blessed heart, which is what you intend and hope for, after all.

## The Light Side of the Dark

here's something to be said for kindness. Often when we say to ourselves that something is an act of godliness, it's when someone is kind, especially when it seems to come out of the blue. It's what John the Baptist seemed to be thinking when he said we would be baptized with the Holy Spirit and with the sort of passionate fire that warms and gives off light. Henry James. the British novelist, once said that three things were important in life—the first, be kind; the second, be kind; the third, be kind. Long before Henry James said it, St. Paul wrote to the Christian community in Philippi: "Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near" (Philippians 4:5). God's presence seems to be nearer when someone is kind.

It is curious how in the darkest moments of life, the light of kindness shines more brightly. Natural calamities seem to bring out kindness toward those who suffer. So too, at times of personal tragedies or disasters, when others are grieving the death of someone they love, as well as countless other times when people find themselves lost in the dark. Little wonder then how during this time of year when the days are shortest, and the nighttime dark is longest, that the days of Advent and Christmas seem to be laced with kindness for one another. Then the veil that hides God from our eyes grows thinner, and we catch glimpses of "God with us."

#### Regardless Of the Challenges We Face, We Can Rejoice Because the Lord, Our Mighty Savior, Is Coming

When was the last time we stopped in our tracks, threw our arms in the air, and sang praise to the Lord, unable to contain our joy? We see joy like this after championship games, with the winners embracing one another, shouting, and dancing in complete exuberance. Or at the moment when a child is born – the parents' joy is so intense that tears replace words.

These are remarkable moments indeed, the ones we remember for the rest of our lives. But what if this kind of joy – life-altering, memorable joy – was a part of our *daily* existence, including the difficult and troublesome times? And what if we could not just find and possess it in those moments but share it?

The first two readings exemplify this kind of joy. The prophet Zephaniah gives a vibrant pep talk to the people in exile, bringing them the good news of their impending salvation. He has experienced his people bound to and oppressed by the Assyrian empire, struggling to keep their covenant with the Lord. Prior to today's passage, he offered them a stern warning to resume their religious obedience. Now Zephaniah says, Shout for joy ... Sing joyfully ... Be glad and rejoice with all your heart ... The Lord has removed the judgment against you. He has turned away your enemies ... Fear not. He writes that a mighty Savior is coming who will renew the Israelites with his love.

Like Zephaniah, Paul also wrote in dire circumstances. Scholars agree that he wrote this letter to the Church in Philippi while imprisoned in Rome. Yet, like Zephaniah, he instructs the Philippians to rejoice and to *rejoice in the Lord always!* His entire message exudes joy and peace, the result of trusting Christ regardless of one's circumstances. Paul knows in the depth of his soul that the mighty Savior has come.

John the Baptist instructed the people on proper life in a community: share their clothing and food, and the soldiers should stop extorting funds and be satisfied with their wages. In the midst of the difficulties of living under Roman occupation, John tells them that someone mightier than he is coming. He preaches this Good News of Christ, knowing that the arrival of Jesus was a cause for joy. The mighty Savior was coming, and this Good News trumped any negative situation one faced.

Advent is a time to prepare ourselves for our Savior. We may find ourselves in less-than-ideal circumstances due to health, employment, or other issues. Sometimes, these deficiencies dominate our state of mind, and we forget all too easily what we do have – a Lord who is in [our] midst, today and every day. He is our joy, and He is eternal and everlasting.

This third Sunday of Advent, we light the pink candle to remind us to rejoice, even if we face challenges like Zephaniah and Paul did. We do not need to experience something extravagant to throw our hands in the air and praise God. The Lord is coming indeed. He is here, our mighty Savior.
