
Dear Padre,

How do we maintain our faith in a world that shames religion and creates doubt in our beliefs?

I would respond to your question with one of my own: "When has it ever been different?" In what place has there been universal praise and acceptance of the practices of faith and belief? When has there been a time when there is no doubt? This is a good question for this Sunday, when we hear about St. Thomas, the doubting disciple.

Many years ago, unanimity might have been understood as the norm in a tight-knit neighborhood community of people with the same experience and belief. However, in the wide world today that is so connected and disconnected at the same time, sameness and uniformity cannot be assumed. It may cause unease, or even fear, to learn that someone disagrees with you, perhaps even someone you love, but it should no longer be a surprise or considered out of the ordinary.



Doubt can help a person grow in faith and belief. Even though doubt is challenging, it is often a necessary experience in order to be strengthened and to persevere. Doubt is not something that should cause us to quiver in fear, but rather to rejoice in hope, in the confidence that what we believe is worth living and has something to teach us.

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

From Anger to Peace

t this point in history, we are a nation filled with much anger. Given all that is taking place, one might conclude that it comes from a fear of losing control—fears due to the waves of immigrants seeking asylum, to a changing economy, to political alliances, to artificial intelligence, resulting in our inability to sort truth from untruth. Fears also due to strained relationships with non-Western nations, to urban violence and the abundance of guns, to the conflict between pro-life and pro-choice allegiances, and, for some, to what is perceived as conflicted thinking within the Catholic Church. There is no shortage of what may be fueling our anger. How can faith help us respond in a life-giving way?

Saint John writes that "whoever is begotten by God conquers the world. And the victory that conquers the world is our faith" (1 John 5:4). This is not to say that we can easily make the world respond in ways we want, but rather that the world has no power over the person who places all trust in God's presence among us. It was the risen Lord who once brought peace to the disciples behind doors locked out of fear. Might not our faith help us who have locked ourselves behind doors of mistrust and anger? If only we allow ourselves to trust God. Yet, we should not simply shrug off all cares or involvement in life; on the contrary, with faith and trust, we recognize we are not the only players in shaping the events of the world.

Relying on the Holy Spirit, we can point others to Christ.

As Christians 2,000 years removed from the early Church, it is easy to underestimate the power of the Holy Spirit. We tend to think of the Spirit only in relation to the sacraments – and indeed, he is active in each of them. But we who received him in baptism and confirmation can continue to call upon him as we strive to live out our vocations each day.

In the Book of Genesis, God spoke or breathed creation into existence. The Hebrew word for this creative force can also be translated as "wind." It is no coincidence that Jesus arrives on the scene in today's Gospel and breathes on the disciples to impart the Holy Spirit. He is creating them anew and giving them the power to accomplish marvelous things for the kingdom of God.

We see some of these marvels in the first reading. People are so eager to meet an Apostle that they even lay the sick in the streets so that Peter's shadow may fall on them. In addition to performing miracles, the Apostles passionately share their testimony about Jesus as the risen Lord, and great numbers are converted. Indeed, the Holy Spirit was alive and active through them.

In today's second reading, John is caught up in the spirit. Usually, when we use the term "getting caught up," it refers to being busy or distracted by something, often something insignificant. What if we were caught up daily not by work or household chores, but in the spirit? For John, this experience entailed a profound awareness of the resurrected Christ, who appeared to him in glory. John is terrified by the power before him, yet Christ reminds him not to be afraid.

The disciples had also been timorous, hiding behind locked doors, terror-stricken that they too would end up dead at the hands of the authorities. In the face of adversity, one mark of the Holy Spirit is peace- not in the sense of a heartwarming feeling or emotion. Instead, the peace of the Spirit manifests as the confidence and endurance to carry out God's work, even amid persecution or hardship. Immediately before imparting the Spirit, Jesus tells the disciples, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you. "Jesus sent the disciples out amid wolves, so to speak, yet they accomplished their work by the power of the Holy Spirit.

For us, "getting caught up in the Spirit" does not require leaving aside our real responsibilities — our jobs and daily chores — but instead means calling upon the Holy Spirit to help us do all these things for the sake of God's kingdom. The Latin phrase age quod agis — "do what you are doing" — applies here. We do what God has called us to do, and we do it well for his sake. In this way, we contribute to the upbuilding of the Church and point others to the kingdom of God.

PROCESS FOR ELECTION OF A NEW POPE

- The College of Cardinals, usually composed of Roman Catholic electing Cardinals, gathers in Rome upon the death or resignation of the previous Pope.
- A secret meeting, called a Conclave, is held in the Sistine Chapel, where the Cardinals are locked in until they reach a decision.
- A series of voting rituals are carried out. Each cardinal writes the name of his preferred candidate on a ballot paper and places it in a chalice.
- A decision is reached when a candidate receives at least two-thirds of the votes.
- The Cardinal Protodeacon announces the new Pope to the Roman Catholic people and the world, who proclaims "Habemus Papam" (We have a Pope) and reveals the Pope's chosen name.
