## Dear Padre,

"Lead us not into temptation..." God does not lead us into temptation, so what is this saying?

You are of the same mind as the pope! In 2019, Pope Francis approved changing the Lord's Prayer, that is, changing the phrase "lead us not into temptation" to "do not let us fall into temptation." Pope Francis said that the original appeared to suggest that God caused the temptation. However, most Scripture scholars agree that "lead us not into temptation" is the best translation from the Greek. It's a subjunctive verb. It's used in the second person, addressed directly to God. And it really does say "do not lead us into temptation."

What did the pope hope to accomplish? Those who are most familiar with the pope say that what he was trying to clarify was not anchored in the intricacies of translation but rather anchored in pastoral life. He wanted to focus the attention of God's people on their action, "falling into temptation," and not on a misunderstanding of what Jesus was teaching. It was a point of focus and clarification to help us in our spiritual journey and our understanding of our relationship with God. Understood in this sense, the new translation would accomplish this pastoral purpose.

# **Keeping Your Balance**

hese days, when people come to confession, they seldom list their sins by name and number. Quite often, it seems, they simply talk about their lives, about the chaos in which they seem to be living, about the relationships that are less than what they would hope, about the values they've let slide sometimes into the muck, about how they've turned in upon themselves, and about how caring for others has faded from their lives. After they've told their stories, I will usually ask if they take any time in the day to be guiet and if they pray in whatever way they find helpful and with some regularity. Invariably, they will say that they've let such prayer time slip away; that they have not been praying the way they once did. In such cases, I often suggest that as penance, they take some time-even just a

little time—in the next day or two to simply quiet themselves in the presence of God.

Life will always tend to be chaotic. These days, there is too much going on for life not to be. But, quiet and reflective prayer seems to bring a balance, a refocusing upon what is important and what is trivial. Without that, we can become overwhelmed and lose our way. It is what the Martha/Mary story is about. It's not that our own Martha-service is not worthwhile. It's crucially important in order to make life hum along in an orderly fashion. But without Mary's reflective part, our lives can become muddled drudgery.

## Fear not! ... The Lord himself will fight for you; you have only to keep still

When Pharaoh's army pursues the Israelites, they understandably panic. They cry out to God and complain to Moses. "Why didn't you let us stay in Egypt? Slavery in Egypt would be better than dying in the desert." Moses answers the people, Fear not! ... The Lord himself will fight for you; you have only to keep still.

Moses was encouraging the people to trust what they had already seen. That is, they were leaving Egypt because, after witnessing God's power through the ten plagues, Pharaoh finally agreed to let the Israelites go. God made their freedom possible. Yet, as we hear today, Pharaoh changed his mind, and the Israelites were very afraid. When faced with hostile pursuit by Pharaoh's army, they have doubts, lose faith, and question what lies ahead.

How often does this happen to us? We know God's will. We decide to follow it. But then, we see what lies ahead, and out of fear or stubbornness, we turn back to our old ways. When our hearts are hardened, we cannot see who God truly is. Like the Israelites, we prefer the enemy we know over the unknown trials that lie ahead. Conversion is an ongoing process of turning away from ourselves and toward God, trusting not in our own strength, but in His faithfulness.

In today's Gospel reading, some of the Scribes and Pharisees ask Jesus to perform a sign. They, too, have doubts, perhaps even fear, and they question what lies before them. Jesus tells them that a sign will do them no good. He is God's own Son. Yet the

Scribes and Pharisees have accused him of being an agent of Satan just a few verses before this (see Mt 12:24). Jesus knows that no sign he performs will convince them otherwise, not even his resurrection.

Yet his resurrection is the very embodiment of the Lord himself fighting for us. It is not a "sign," but a reality: Just as Moses told his people, the prophets reiterated, and the angel Gabriel said to Mary – Fear not! God has heard us, God hears us, and he cares for us. He has freed us from slavery, sin, and death. The Lord himself will fight for you; you have only to keep still.

#### Bishop Lohse Opens Applications for Deacon Candidates for The Diocese of Kalamazoo

Effective immediately, the Diocese of Kalamazoo will begin receiving applications for candidates to enroll in the inquiry phase of diaconal formation. Shortly after his ordination in 2023, Bishop Lohse appointed a deacon formation task force to work on developing an articulated vision for diaconal ministry in the Diocese of Kalamazoo in response to diocesan and parish needs and priorities. The task force's recommended revised formation process along with requirements and application procedures was accepted by Bishop Lohse and presented to the Presbyteral Council and the Deacon Community.

#### FROM THE DIOCESE

USCCB issues statement on recent interpretation of Johnson Amendment

Last week, in response to the recent interpretation of the Johnson Amendment publicized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) offered a statement from its spokesperson, Chieko Noguchi, executive director of public affairs. The Johnson Amendment defines guidelines for the tax-exempt status of a church or other nonprofit regarding political activities and endorsing or opposing candidates for public office.

"The IRS was addressing a specific case, and it doesn't change how the Catholic Church engages in public debate. The Church seeks to help Catholics form their conscience in the Gospel so they might discern which candidates and policies would advance the common good."

Catholic Dioceses in the United States continue to maintain their stance of not endorsing or opposing political candidates.

Within our diocese, Bishop Edward M. Lohse instructed clergy to maintain the policy of non-endorsement or non-opposition of political candidates.

"The current policy of not endorsing or opposing any candidate or political party remains fully in force," said Bishop Lohse

Bishop Lohse has committed to providing professional counseling or therapy to victims of clergy sex abuse in the Diocese. Victims can access 24-hour support through the crisis hotline established by Catholic Charities at 800-873-8336.
