
# Dear Padre,

#### Is "co-redemptrix" a title for the Blessed Virgin Mary?

The Church does not officially regard Mary as a co-redemptrix with Christ. Her "unique holiness'...'from the first instant of her conception' comes wholly from Christ: she is 'redeemed, in a more exalted fashion, by reason of the merits of her Son'" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 492).



"obscure" the origin that "everything comes through Christ," as written in Ephesians and Colossians. "Mary, too, is everything she is through Him," stated the future Pope Benedict XVI, adding that "co-redemptrix" is a departure "from the language of Scripture and of the Fathers, and therefore gives rise to misunderstandings."

Likewise, in 2019, Pope Francis quoted St. Bernard, who said that no praise is sufficient to talk about Mary, but, ultimately, her title as a humble "disciple" best represents Mary's faithfulness to "her Son, the only Redeemer." "She never wanted for herself something that was of her Son," explained the pontiff. "She never introduced herself as co-redemptrix. No. Disciple."

Pope Francis reiterated the Church's position on this matter in 2021, saying that Jesus entrusted the universal Church and all the faithful to Mary, "Not as a goddess. Not as a co-redemptrix. As a mother." Incidentally, "Mother of God" (Greek: *Theotokos*, "God-bearer") is Mary's oldest title, established in 431 by the Council of Ephesus.

## Where I Stand

ne day, as I was walking in a local nature preserve, I came across what someone had written in the sand: "It's time to take a stand."

Though the person never suggested what we should take a stand on, all of us take stands in life. In many ways, those stands define our lives: Republican or Democrat, pro-life or pro-choice, NRA and guns, save the whales, vax or anti-vax, ecology. As we all know so well, where we stand on any given issue can become divisive among friends and even family.

The Scriptures this weekend tell of the prophet Jeremiah, who took a stand of faith against the king who trusted in military arms rather than in God. The Letter to the Hebrews mentions an Old Testament "cloud of witnesses" who placed faith in God without knowing where that would take them. And, Jesus himself recognizes that those who place their faith in him and the vision of life he proclaimed would find themselves in conflict with others. For every person who professes faith in Jesus Christ, the question becomes how this faith affects all the other stands we take. To "keep our eyes fixed on Jesus" influences the lifestyle we choose, how we spend our time and our money, who our friends are, and even who we vote for. At some point, faith insists we take a stand.

#### Let the Children Come to Me

In today's Gospel, Jesus admonishes his disciples for trying to drive away some children who want to see him. Then, Jesus lifts up the children as examples of who the kingdom of heaven is for: the <u>vulnerable</u>, the seemingly insignificant, and those who are inherently the least in society. He says, "Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them; for the Kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

Jesus' treatment of the children shows how God sees us when we seek to know Him and be in relationship with Him. God does not favor the rich and powerful, nor the smartest, strongest, or fastest. He opens his arms to all who seek Him, especially those most in need of him, as children are often most in need in society.

To be like children ourselves when calling upon the Lord, to encourage one another in approaching God, and to avoid being an obstacle to God for another – these are three exhortations we find in Christ's words today.

Regarding the first exhortation, to be like a child: Only in our vulnerability—similar to the vulnerability of children—are we able to open our hearts to dependence on God.

If we have childlike hearts, He will be able to love us, lead us, and conform us to be more like Himself.

The second point is that <u>we should encourage each other</u>: Once we experience the joy of a life lived in humble dependence on God, <u>we are meant to share it with others</u>, to show them the blessings of trusting God and His promises.

The third point is just as important: We need to watch out that <u>our actions and behaviors don't become obstacles for others</u> discovering the beauty of God's kingdom.

We have been offered our inheritance and become co-heirs with Christ of the kingdom. The kingdom of heaven belongs to us—just like these children—those who are eager, open, vulnerable, and willing to embrace the Lord. His hands will be upon us, just as they were upon the children. Walking with Him and following Him, we will one day rest in the fullness of the kingdom that awaits us.

### TRAUMA RECOVERY PROGRAM - NEW SESSION OPENS THIS FALL

When children are physically, emotionally, or sexually abused, or experience severe neglect, the injuries are profound. The effects often extend into their adult lives and affect their abilities to live effectively and experience contentment. They are apt to feel isolated in their pain, with no knowledge that their struggles are expectable because of their trauma histories.

The diocesan Trauma Recovery Program will begin this fall, open to any Catholic that is an adult survivor of childhood abuse or neglect. Participants meet for ten sessions in a small group (no more than ten participants), facilitated by licensed mental health professionals. If you are interested in participating in this program or have questions about the Trauma Recovery Program, please contact Fr. Ken Schmidt at 269.381.6290, ext. 9390.
