Dear Padre,

At a recent gathering, a relative questioned my family's continued participation in the Catholic Church because of the sexual abuse cover-up. What is the best way to address this question?

Resist the temptation to argue or make any response that is not respectful. Choose to respond with empathy and understanding; perhaps something like this: "I understand and respect your feelings. Some have made the difficult choice to leave the Church. Others find the choice to remain also difficult.

"As a mature and discerning person, I am not making excuses for behaviors that are inexcusable. I cannot and will not defend behavior that should not be defended. I choose to remain in the Church because I choose to remain in a relationship with Jesus, and that relationship



includes my reception of the sacraments of the Church. I value the sacraments even as I remain vigilant about the conduct of those who have been entrusted with celebrating those sacraments. I retain my practice of the sacraments and, at the same time, I retain my responsibility to be alert to abusive behavior. This is not acceptance or approval of what most certainly happened. It is continuing to participate in what is beautiful and wise and true so that, in the company of other believers, I may become more like Christ."


The parables Jesus told were always about how God moves in our lives, how God is powerfully intertwined in all that is. Jesus told parables to give us a hint of where to find God. out in the cold. It's not the rich man who is the Godperson in the parable. The rich got rich by abusing the poor. Rather, it is the steward who is the image of God—a God who, like the steward, is desperate to be accepted, to find a way into our lives. We might say clever...or even sneaky. It is God who finds a way into our lives when we are afraid, when weface the loss of love, when our worlds are falling apart, when we go looking for him. There, then, is God, eagerly wanting to be wanted.

CHOOSE TO SERVE GOD DAILY.

No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other or be devoted to one and despise the other. The two masters Jesus is referring to are wealth, or earthly possessions, and God. The truth Jesus seems to be pointing out to us is that we must make a choice; we can't serve both. And clearly, our choice should be to serve God.

What does choosing to serve God require of us? It requires us to surrender control of our lives to God and trust Him completely. Our lives include our family, loved ones, livelihood, safety, and health. It calls us to trust God no matter what happens. When things go well, that can be easy. But when bad things happen, we might start questioning whether that trust is justified and begin looking for other options.

Choosing to serve God isn't a one-time decision; it's a daily choice. Earlier in the Gospel, Jesus highlights another truth relevant to this point: the person who is trustworthy in small matters is also trustworthy in big ones. In other words, the choices we make when the stakes are small will shape the kind of person we become and determine whether we succeed or fail as followers of the Lord.

Before facing that big moment when our trust in God is truly tested, there will have been many smaller tests: when we were tempted to act in an un-Christian way but chose to listen instead to the voice of our conscience; when we were tempted by vice but remained strong in virtue; when we forgave and prayed for the person who hurt us. All these are ways we choose daily to serve God.

And we must choose, because we might be tempted to straddle the fence—serving both God and our earthly interests. This is a strong temptation because our temporal, physical needs are deeply rooted. Plus, we live in a culture that values and rewards pursuing worldly goods. But, as Jesus warns, trying to pursue both won't work. We will end up choosing by default, and that default choice might not be the best one.

Fortunately, the Lord understands that these temptations exist and knows our weaknesses. He is always there to help us. If we realize we've been making many small wrong choices, the Lord waits for us at the sacrament of reconciliation to offer forgiveness, healing, and a fresh start. And here in the Eucharist, He gives us Himself as spiritual nourishment to strengthen us so we can choose to serve God today and every day.
