

Happy Mother's Day!

I would like to wish all mothers a happy Mother's Day. Mothers have a unique love for their children. They carry their children in their womb for 9 months and in their heart the rest of their lives. Mothers love their children individually and hope their children love one another as well.

In this context, we can better understand Jesus' command in today's Gospel to love one another. Jesus would not have commanded this if He knew we would not be tempted to do otherwise.

Many families are torn apart by divisions. These divisions can come from a variety of issues. I'm amazed at how seemingly small things can lead to large divisions. Take the issue of masking for an example. The mask is such a small thing but it has caused great divisions. There are people on complete opposite sides of the mask debate. Both sides feel anger, frustration, judgement, resentment, etc., which lead to divisions.

I saw a headline for an article several months ago that read "When the masks went on, the masks came off." I never read the article but there is a lot of truth in this statement. The masks have unveiled our struggle to follow Jesus' command to love one another.

I'm not sure how to resolve this issue for each individual person or situation but I know that the answer is found in our Lord's command. Jesus goes on to say, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you." Jesus commands us to love one another. When we do this, we not only become His friends but we can begin to bridge the gap between our divisions and grow in our friendship with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Just as every mother rejoices to have her children together and getting along, Jesus and our Heavenly Father also rejoice to have their children loving one another.

May these truths be before us, and may the love of Mother Church and all of the sacraments take precedence over every earthly concern. God bless you.


