November 28, 2021 • The First Sunday of Advent

The Gospel is a frightening one, and the final line is outright terrifying: "Be vigilant at all times and pray that you have the strength to escape the tribulations that are imminent and to stand before the Son of Man" (Luke 21:36). Matthew tells us what it is like to stand before the Son of Man. Have I given food to my hungry brothers and sisters, or provided for them in their need, or cared for them when they're sick, or visited them in prison? Just to get to that point, we must survive great suffering. Since we don't know when it will happen, we must be prepared to face judgment at all times. We have been warned!

How do we do this? Perhaps the secret to preparing for the Lord's coming—at Christmas, at the Last Judgment, or fully into our hearts—is to act as if the Lord is already here. After all, he is. Do we see the Lord in our brother and sister in need? The more willingly we see the Lord in our neighbor, the more easily we love those whom we would otherwise overlook, dismiss, or outright reject. How easily do we focus our love solely on our own loved ones, or, worse, just ourselves? May we see Jesus in all those in need and act accordingly.

We celebrate Advent each year in preparation for the birth of Jesus, His first coming, as we await His second coming. 



Why is St. Peter wearing a sling in his statue at the Vatican?

A bronze statue of the first pope sits regally in his basilica in Rome. But why is his left arm in a sling?

On the right side of St. Peter's Basilica, just before the main altar, a small but maiestic statue of



the first pontiff sits on an elevated throne. His eyes gaze into the distance; his bearing is upright and noble; a golden halo rests on his head; his right hand is raised in blessing. His feet have been worn smooth by the constant touches of countless pilgrims that have passed through the Basilica over the centuries.

In his left hand, he holds the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven—the keys that have been passed on in an unbroken line of succession since the day Christ gave them to him. But Peter's left arm is encased in a sling, as though it were injured or needed support. What a strange detail!

Strange in appearance, but profound in meaning. The sling is a reminder of human weakness. The weight of the keys of Peter is far too great to be borne by mortal strength; the pope must rely on the divine aid that Christ promised to His Vicar on earth. It is the Holy Spirit that guides the hand that holds the keys, not any human ability.

This theme is re-echoed in the Altar of the Chair, beyond the main altar in the back of the Basilica, where we see the Chair of Peter borne aloft by clouds. The four Church Fathers at the four corners only guide it; they do not bear its weight. Again, the Holy Spirit, portrayed in the alabaster window above the altar, is the

Church's true strength and support.

December 1. BLESSED CHARLES DE FOUCAULD


Orphaned at the age of six, Charles was raised by his devout grandfather. He rejected the Catholic faith as a teenager, but resumed its practice around age 30. He then became a Trappist monk. After leaving the monastery, Charles traveled extensively, living a peaceful and somewhat hidden life.

December 2. BLESSED RAFAL CHYLINSKI

This Polish Conventual Franciscan served in the military, but felt the call to the vowed religious life. Rafal was known for his simple and candid sermons, for his generosity, as well as for his ministry in the confessional. People of all levels of society were drawn to the self-sacrificing way he lived out his religious profession and priestly ministry.

December 3. SAINT FRANCIS XAVIER

Saint Francis Xavier was won over to Christ by the gentle persuasion of Saint Ignatius of Loyola. He then joined the Jesuits and soon after set off for the East, where he labored the rest of his life. Xavier was on his way to China when he died in 1552. Saint Francis Xavier is a Patron Saint of Japan, Jewelers, Missions, and Sailors.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION (Confession) Saturday 3:00 - 3:30 p.m. or by appointment.

<u>SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM</u> Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil as part of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Infant and child Baptisms are by arrangement.

<u>FIRST EUCHARIST</u> Preparation begins in grade one and includes classes, retreats, and home instruction. Children receive First Eucharist in grade two.

<u>CONFIRMATION</u> Our Confirmation program begins in the 9th grade; students are confirmed in the spring of the 10th grade. For young adults who have been baptized but not yet confirmed, contact the parish office.

<u>SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY</u> It is the policy of the Diocese of Worcester that a couple should contact the parish <u>at least one year</u> prior to the anticipated date of their wedding to allow sufficient time to carry out the various steps of the marriage preparation process. It is important that arrangements be made with the church <u>before</u> plans are made with reception halls, caterers, etc.
