THE LITURGY OF THE DAY

December 5, 2021 • The Second Sunday of Advent

Quite likely you have a long checklist of things that you need to do before Christmas, which is now only three weeks away. But is "repentance for the forgiveness of sins" on that list? It ought to be, for this is exactly what John the Baptist called for in preparation for the Lord's coming. Gathered here today to receive Jesus in the Eucharist, let us repent of the wrongs we have done or failed to do and seek forgiveness for our sins so as to properly prepare a place for our Lord to be born into our lives.

Each reading this week ultimately directs our focus onto the future. Baruch looks forward to the time when Jerusalem is restored in glory. In Luke, John the Baptist calls everyone to prepare for Jesus' coming, when salvation will come to all people. Paul looks ahead to "the day of Christ Jesus," the time of the Second Coming (Philippians 1:6). As Christians, we are called to anticipate the completion of the good work that has begun in us.

How are valleys filled in, mountains made low, paths made straight, and rough ways smoothed? Repentance. It is sin that throws up obstacles on our paths to salvation. Like a falling out between friends prevents that friendship from growing, our past sins prevent our love of God and love of neighbor from developing. Repentance allows us to put aside the past and focus on the future.

"And this is my prayer:

that your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value..."

(Philippians 1:9-10)

During the Christmas shopping season it is easy to get caught up in the frenzy of buying gifts. But, is that "gift" truly an expression of your love for the other person? Or, are you just fulfilling your "obligation" to give them something? To grow in friendship with someone, you need to spend time with them, learn what is of value to them. Maybe this year, buy less "stuff" and spend more time with those you love.

Why do Catholics confess their sins to a priest?

"Why can't I just confess my sins to God?"

The first and best answer to this question is: because Jesus said so! In St. John's Gospel, Jesus appeared to His Apostles after His Resurrection and said to them:

"Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." —John 20:21-23

Christ clearly states in this passage that He wishes to act through the Apostles in order to forgive men their sins. Since the Church is founded on Peter and the Apostles, the powers given to them are communicated to their successors.

Why might Jesus have chosen to effect the forgiveness of sins in this way?

One reason is so we never have to worry about whether our sins are forgiven. God has given us a simple formula—Confession—for getting back into His graces when we have failed. It's not based on subjective feeling, but a sacred rite. Within Confession, our contrition doesn't even have to be perfect, although perfect contrition is the ideal. "Perfect contrition" is being sorry for a sin because it offended God. "Imperfect contrition" is sorrow for sin due to a natural fear of punishment.

Imperfect contrition is all that is necessary within the Sacrament of Confession. God does the rest. Wow, what a gift. A way to confess and do penance without the worry of "Have I done it right?"

Other reasons include the sacramental graces we receive in Confession and the advice of the priest, both of which assist us in avoiding sin and growing in virtue.

Jesus is Wisdom Itself. He is the Word of God. He knows us far better than we know ourselves, and knows just what we need.

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Saints of the Week

December 6. SAINT NICHOLAS

The absence of "hard historical facts" is not necessarily an obstacle to the popularity of saints, as the devotion to Saint Nicholas shows. Both the Eastern and Western Churches honor him, and it is claimed that after the Blessed Virgin, he is the saint most pictured by Christian artists.

Saint Nicholas is a Patron Saint of Bakers, Brides and Grooms, Children, Greece, Pawnbrokers, and Travelers.

December 7. SAINT AMBROSE

It is said that Ambrose's was instrumental in the conversion of Saint Augustine, and also baptized him. Known for his lively preaching and writing, Saint Ambrose must have been a force to be reckoned with. Maybe those qualities were what attracted Saint Augustine. But Saint Ambrose stands on his own merits independent of his protégé.

Saint Ambrose is a Patron Saint of Bee keepers, Beggars, Learning, and Milan.

December 8. IMMACULATE CONCEPTION of the BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Under the title of the Immaculate Conception, the Blessed Virgin is the patron of the United States. Thus this is a major feast—in fact a Holy Day of Obligation—for the Church in the United States of America.

Mary as the Immaculate Conception is the Patron Saint of the United States and Brazil.

Thousands of people gathered in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe July 31, 2002, for the canonization of Juan Diego, to whom the Blessed Mother appeared in the 16th century. Pope John Paul II celebrated the ceremony at which the poor Indian peasant became the Church's first saint indigenous to the Americas.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION (Confession) Saturday 3:00 - 3:30 p.m. or by appointment.

<u>SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM</u> Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil as part of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Infant and child Baptisms are by arrangement.

<u>FIRST EUCHARIST</u> Preparation begins in grade one and includes classes, retreats, and home instruction. Children receive First Eucharist in grade two.

<u>CONFIRMATION</u> Our Confirmation program begins in the 9th grade; students are confirmed in the spring of the 10th grade. For young adults who have been baptized but not yet confirmed, contact the parish office.

<u>SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY</u> It is the policy of the Diocese of Worcester that a couple should contact the parish <u>at least one year</u> prior to the anticipated date of their wedding to allow sufficient time to carry out the various steps of the marriage preparation process. It is important that arrangements be made with the church <u>before</u> plans are made with reception halls, caterers, etc.
