

THE LITURGY OF THE DAY

February 12, 2023 • The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sirach 15:15-20 /1 Corinthians 2:6-10 / Matthew 5:17-37

Let us review Jesus' four examples in this light. If our hearts are merciful, we overcome whatever anger we might have toward our neighbor and replace it with a desire to reconcile. We forgive rather than retaliate. If we truly love our brothers and sisters, we see them in their wholeness, not merely the part of them that pleases us. With forgiveness and love, marriage is not just a legal contract, but a lasting covenant. If we are always honest, we do not need to swear to any kind of oath that we are telling the truth this time. This is what Jesus expected of his disciples, and so of us as well.

Question of the Week: When do the temptations of anger, lust, or deceit affect what I say or do? How can I build the habit of treating everyone else with honesty, mercy, and love?

Who was the real St. Valentine? Remember —it's Saint Valentine's Day.



You have to wonder whether St. Valentine and St. Patrick commiserate in Heaven about their feast days being somewhat obscured by their popular celebrations.

Treating your sweetheart to a nice dinner or a box of chocolates on this day is certainly a nice thing to do. However, as a part of your celebrations, be sure to call to mind Saint Valentine, whose real story is usually forgotten on his feast day.

We actually don't know a lot for sure about this saint. He was either a Roman priest or a bishop in central Italy who was martyred in the 3rd century. His remains are buried along the Via Flaminia in Rome.

The connection between him and romantic love is also a bit uncertain. One legend says that he secretly married Christian couples, a grave offense according to the persecuting government. Some versions say that this favor was done particularly for Roman soldiers, who were not allowed to marry since—the government thought—this would make them unwilling to risk their lives in war.

The customs we associate with St. Valentine's Day are traceable to the Middle Ages. Based on the tradition that birds began to pair on St. Valentine's Day, lovers exchanged letters and tokens of affection on this day. We see references to these customs in literature from 14th- and 15th-century France and England.


Whatever the veracity of the legends surrounding the life of St. Valentine, we know that this holy priest existed, and that he died for his faith during a time of bitter persecution. His very status as a martyr makes him an apt patron for love: he and his fellow-martyrs illustrate to us, through their sufferings, the depth of their love for Christ. Who is Love Himself.

As you enjoy your day with your sweetheart, remember the love of St. Valentine, which gave him the courage to suffer everything for the sake of his Beloved—and made him a saint.

Not all of us are called to prove our love by physical martyrdom, but we can live out the trusts, hopes and perseveres. vocation to love by sacrificing ourselves in smaller, though still powerful, ways. Simply following church rules to the letter and not out of love, does not necessarily put you on the path to heaven. Attending Sunday Mass and then gossiping about a fellow parishioner on the parking lot is an example of being a modern day Pharisee.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION (Confession) Saturday 3:00 - 3:30 p.m. or by appointment.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil as part of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Infant and child Baptisms are by arrangement.

FIRST EUCHARIST Preparation begins in grade one and includes classes, retreats, and home instruction. Children receive First Eucharist in grade two.

CONFIRMATION Our Confirmation program begins in the 9th grade; students are confirmed in the spring of the 10th grade. For young adults who have been baptized but not yet confirmed, contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY It is the policy of the Diocese of Worcester that a couple should contact the parish <u>at least one year</u> prior to the anticipated date of their wedding to allow sufficient time to carry out the various steps of the marriage preparation process. It is important that arrangements be made with the church before plans are made with reception halls, caterers, etc.

The Heart in Your Hands Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill." — Matthew 5:17

In my work as a freelance writer, I often find myself producing content on the subject of Catholic schools. For more than ten years, I've written hundreds of articles about Catholic schools, coming at the issue from every angle. I've written about current Catholic school families, and the sacrifices they make to ensure their children receive a Catholic education. I've written about alumni and their feelings about the education they received in a Catholic educational setting. I've written about the importance of Catholic identity in a Catholic school, and the lengths to which teachers and staff members will go to ensure their classrooms aren't offering merely a private education, but a Catholic one.

All this writing — hundreds of thousands of words, if you added it all up, I'm sure — and it all says basically the same thing. It's about the whole person.

In a Catholic school, you're not just going to learn math and science and language arts and all other sorts of things that are good for your intellect, you're going to learn about the Incarnation, about God's plan for you, about salvation history and the Great Commission. You're going to learn about the stuff that's good for your soul.

It's about the whole person.

That's the catchphrase when it comes to Catholic education, but it reflects the Catholic worldview as a whole, and it's a worldview that has its origins in today's Gospel passage, when Christ breaks the bad news that he hasn't come to do away with any rules, but to add one ginormous, supreme, uber-important clause to every existing part of God's law. It's a clause, I think, that can best be expressed in the words of St. Camillus de Lellis, "Put your heart in your hands."

It matters if you have anger in your heart, Christ tells us. It matters if you have lust in your heart. It matters.

It's about the whole person.

Whatever you do, you have your heart in your hands. It doesn't matter if you're offering a sacrifice exactly as the Book of Leviticus dictates it should be offered. Your heart is now in your hands, and if the heart is not pure, neither is the sacrifice. It's the whole-person approach to the law.

It's significant, too, that, when Christ tells us to "be reconciled with your brother" before making an offering to God, he doesn't forget to tell us to make the offering in the end: "and then come and offer your gift." As he said, he's not here to abolish the law. He doesn't care only about what is in our hearts, he cares what our hands are doing, too. The law is still in effect, it matters what you do. But it also matters why you do it. The law now includes the heart.
