SEPTEMBER 21, 2025 / TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Amos 8:4-7/1 Timothy 2:1-8/ Luke 16:1-13

Jesus' parable of the dishonest steward is not as clear. Should the steward be applauded for his ingenuity and prudence? Or scorned for his dishonesty and self-centeredness? Perhaps Jesus is pointing to the steward's shrewdness in planning ahead for his expected fate of poverty and using that to encourage his disciples—the "children of light" (Luke 16:8)—to be as enterprising in pursuing the kingdom. After all, for this future we too are undeserving and dependent on the mercy of others—in this case, God.

Question of the Week: How do I value true wealth over material wealth? How can I do so more fully?


Gospel Meditation

Before I was a priest, I was a lazy worker for a retail Apple store. Hearing a rumor that my boss was going to fire me, I secretly sold iPhones for half-price, gave away dozens of free iPads, and donated several brand-new laptops to managers in other stores in the mall. After a week, my boss called me into his office. He knew what I was up to. He said I had cost the store thousands of dollars. "Really great work, John," he said. "I am going to recommend you to be my assistant manager and double your pay." I was amazed.

And so are you. Which is understandable because it never happened. How could it? My tall tale is a retelling of Jesus' brow-furrowing parable we hear this week. A lazy, dishonest steward defrauds his boss and then the "master commended the dishonest servant for acting prudently" (Luke 16:8). What is the Lord saying to us?

Most of us treat our spiritual lives like a lazy teenager at an Apple store. We really don't care. We go through the motions. Then, if we are lucky, something happens that shakes us to spiritual action; to employ whatever time, money, and resources we have to build around us a strong network of love. Every saint did that. Our Lord is so good he wants us to use his stuff to forgive debts and to bless others. He wants us to ensure our future. So do it!



SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION (Confession) Saturday 5:00-5:30 p.m. or by appointment.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil as part of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Infant and child Baptisms are by arrangement.

FIRST EUCHARIST Preparation begins in grade one and includes classes, retreats, and home instruction. Children receive First Eucharist in grade two.

CONFIRMATION Our Confirmation program begins in the 9th grade; students are confirmed in the spring of the 10th grade. For young adults who have been baptized but not yet confirmed, contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY It is the policy of the Diocese of Worcester that a couple should contact the parish at least one year prior to the anticipated date of their wedding to allow sufficient time to carry out the various steps of the marriage preparation process. It is important that arrangements be made with the church before plans are made with reception halls, caterers, etc.

The saint whose fiery words led to exile...

September holds the day that is the feast of St. John Chrysostom, one of the most eloquent preachers in Church history!

It was his eloquence in preaching that earned him the nickname Chrysostom, meaning "Golden-Mouthed."

You may think that having such a powerful command over language and the ability to preach moving sermons would only result in accolades and popularity for St. John Chrysostom. However, it occasionally got him into some tight situations. St. John's high position didn't help either...

John was made the Archbishop of Constantinople in 398 A.D., which placed him at the heart of political and religious conflict. And John didn't shy away from condemning the extravagant lifestyles of the wealthy, and that didn't make him many friends. In fact, he made some real enemies, including Empress Eudoxia.

His conflict with the empress would start a chain of events that would lead to his death. In several sermons, John criticized the moral failings and extravagance of the rich, and some of his comments were perceived as directed at the empress herself. Eudoxia, who was already displeased with his calls for reform, took these remarks personally. So, St. John was exiled.


But St. John was so beloved that the public pressured their rulers to bring him back. He was briefly allowed to return, but even after exile, St. John continued to preach the truth—a truth those in power didn't want to hear.

After he preached another sermon condemning an extravagant silver statue of Eudoxia erected near the cathedral, he was removed once again. In 404 A.D., John was permanently exiled to the remote town of Cucusus, in what is now Turkey.

During his years in exile, John's health deteriorated due to harsh conditions. Despite this, he remained in contact with his flock through letters, continuing to encourage them in their faith. His final journey came in 407 A.D. when he was forced to travel on foot to an even more distant location. His body, weakened by illness and exhaustion, couldn't withstand the journey, and he died along the way. His final words are said to have been, "Glory to God for all things."


