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## Pastoral Letter to the South Windsor Catholic Family of Parishes – Christmas Octave and Liturgical Awareness

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, January, 2026

Grace and peace to you in this holy season. I write to you with both gratitude and concern—gratitude for your presence and devotion, and concern for the way we, as a parish family, understand and live the rhythm of the Church’s liturgical life.

First, let me express my sincere joy at seeing so many of you gathered for the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. Your attendance on this holy day of obligation is a sign of faith, reverence, and love for the Blessed Mother. It is always a blessing to see our community come together to honour the mysteries of our salvation.

However, I must also share with you a pastoral concern that arose that day. As I greeted many of you with “Merry Christmas,” I was met—often jokingly—with responses such as, “Father, you’re too late,” or “You’re very early for next year.” While these comments were offered in good humour, they reveal a deeper misunderstanding of the Church’s liturgical calendar and the sacred seasons that shape our spiritual lives.

### We Are Still in the Christmas Season

In the secular world, Christmas ends on December 26. Decorations come down, music stops, and the world moves on to New Year’s celebrations. But the Church does not follow the secular calendar. The Church follows the rhythm of salvation history, not the rhythm of commercial culture.

In the Roman Catholic tradition, Christmas is not a single day—it is a season.

The liturgical year is the Church’s way of sanctifying time. [Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1168-1173]

According to the Church’s liturgical tradition, Christmas is not a day—it is a season, beginning on December 25 and continuing through the Feast of the Epiphany. The “Twelve Days of Christmas” are not a countdown to Christmas, but the celebration after it — the joyful period from December 25 through January 5, leading into Epiphany on January 6.

This is why the Church sings, prays, and celebrates Christmas long after the world has moved on to New Year’s festivities. In fact, the Church celebrates the Octave of Christmas, eight full days in which the joy of the Nativity is prolonged and intensified. Each day of the octave is celebrated as though it were Christmas Day itself. This is why, on January 1, it is still entirely appropriate—and indeed liturgically correct—to greet one another with “Merry Christmas.”

### What Is an Octave?

An octave is an ancient tradition of the Church in which a major feast is celebrated for eight consecutive days. The Church does this only for the most important mysteries of our faith: Christmas and Easter. The octave allows us to linger in the grace of the feast, to meditate more deeply on the mystery, and to rejoice in the fullness of what God has done for us.

So when I greet you with “Merry Christmas” on January 1, I am not being late or early—I am being faithful to the Church’s liturgical life. I am inviting you to remain in the joy of the Nativity, to continue contemplating the Incarnation, and to celebrate the gift of Christ who has come to dwell among us.

### The Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God

January 1 is not “New Year’s Day” in the Church. While the civil calendar marks the beginning of a new year, the Church celebrates something far more profound: the divine motherhood of Mary. This solemnity is one of the highest feasts of the Church, because it honours Mary’s unique role in salvation history. By calling her “Mother of God,” we affirm the truth that Jesus Christ is fully God and fully man, and that through Mary, God entered our world in the flesh.

This solemnity is not about fireworks, resolutions, or the turning of a calendar page. It is about the mystery of the Incarnation and the dignity of the woman who bore the Saviour. It is a day of deep theological significance, a day of grace, and a day of obligation for all Catholics.

### A Call to Renew Our Liturgical Awareness

My concern is not simply about greetings or jokes. It is about the deeper question of how we, as a parish, understand and live the liturgical life of the Church. The liturgical calendar is not a set of optional traditions—it is the heartbeat of our faith. It forms us, teaches us, and draws us into the mysteries of Christ.

When we allow secular culture to define our seasons, we risk losing sight of the sacred. When we treat Christmas as a single day rather than a season, we diminish the richness of the Incarnation. When we focus more on “Happy New Year” than on the Mother of God, we miss the grace the Church offers us.

I am not asking for perfection, but for awareness. I am not asking for rigidity, but for reverence. I am asking that we, as a community, strive to live more deeply in the rhythm of the Church, to celebrate her feasts with understanding, and to allow the liturgical seasons to shape our hearts.

### Moving Forward Together

Let us commit ourselves to celebrating Christmas fully and faithfully—not only on December 25, but throughout the entire season. Let us honour the octave as the Church intends. Let us celebrate the Solemnity of Mary with devotion and gratitude. And let us remember that our identity as Catholics is rooted not in the secular calendar, but in the mysteries of Christ.

I offer these reflections not as criticism, but as pastoral guidance. My desire is that our parish grow in understanding, unity, and holiness. Let us walk together, learn together, and celebrate together the beautiful traditions of our faith.

May the Blessed Mother intercede for us, and may the joy of the Christmas season continue to fill your hearts with peace.

Footnote: Blessed Chalk and Epiphany Blessings of Home.

In the bulletin and at the welcome desk you will see the availability of chalk and a blessing for families to pray at home.

Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy (2001) - Issued by the Congregation for Divine Worship.

- Encourages the sanctification of the home
- Praises customs that connect families to the liturgical year
