

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A reflection from Msgr. Celano from the 27th Sunday of Ordinary Time

What do you expect from the Church? Have you ever pondered that question? What do you expect from your clergy and religious, from your parish and its ministries, from the people you worship with every week? Interesting to think about, isn't it? Experience has taught me that most Catholics have very low expectations: they want their clergy to be kind and show up when needed, their parish to be friendly, and the people they worship with not to blow their car horns at them in the parking lot.

But shouldn't we expect something more than this? Isn't it reasonable to look for real holiness among us; shouldn't we expect our parishes to be places where the fire of the Church's mission is raging like an inferno; where the people we worship with are not just familiar faces but are a real community with one another? Not that we're looking for perfection in our churches, mind you, if we're looking for that, we will be sorely disappointed. But there's nothing wrong with looking for a little "fruit" on our vine...

The coming of the kingdom is at the heart of Jesus' preaching. He not only announces the coming of God's absolute reign over creation, but He himself embodies it. He is the kingdom. But it can't be rushed, forced, or willed into being by us. Its signs are often difficult to see, as small as mustard seed...but it is coming. In fact, it is already here, in the poor in spirit, in the merciful, in those who hunger and thirst for holiness...in the peacemakers...Jesus assures us of this even as the Kingdom still presses on to its fulfillment.

Knowing this – that the Kingdom cannot be brought about by our efforts – is not an invitation to do nothing and wait for it. Paul's reminds Timothy, and us, to "stir into flame" the gifts we have been given as servants of



the Kingdom. But I want to nuance that a bit: we are not necessarily being asking us to *do* more; in this case, we're called to *be more*

I believe on some deep level we recognize that faith in Christ is not just to be a part of our lives, but the principle that organizes them. On some deep level, we all "thirst" for that encounter with Christ that Pope Benedict calls life's "new horizon and decisive direction" (*Deus Caritas Est*), to live a life of significance; one that is filled with meaning even in the mundane things of life, a charity that embraces all – even the person who does honk the horn at us - and joy in the simple gifts that surround us. We recognize that because God has placed the knowledge of the eternal in us and only a life lived in relation to the eternal is a life of true human fulfillment. That is a very theological way of saying something simple – we cannot give to others what we ourselves do not possess.

If we want to stir into flame the mustard seed of faith and mission among us, then we first must *be* more - more deeply conformed to Jesus Christ in his servanthood to world.

Christ is looking for men and women who will be these kinds of servants, who will place *the people served* above the tasks of serving, who give of themselves without need of praise or recognition, and who stay the course when it becomes difficult or even mildly inconvenient. If we want to see a holiness among us, a parish on fire for mission, and community with one another, then it doesn't begin with *doing* more; it begins by *being* more of what Christ calls us to be...servants who fan into flame the mustard seeds of faith and mission entrusted to us.

Roof Project


Several weeks ago I informed you that we discovered a leak in the church roof which has caused minor damage to the mural of St. Paul preaching in the Areopagus on the right side of the church facing the altar. The repair of the roof will begin on or about Tuesday October 15 and should only take a few days. During this time, parking in the rectory lot will be confined to the section furthest from the church while the roof repair is taking place. The total cost of the project will be \$38,000.

Once the repair is complete, we can begin to repair the water damage to the mural. More information on this will be forthcoming.

Parking Deck Vouchers

We've been informed by the New Brunswick Parking Authority about recent changes to the way in which vouchers for use in the Gateway Garage are being allocated. The parish office must now request vouchers every two weeks and the vouchers themselves are only valid for Sunday use. Some have informed us that this is creating a problem when attending church functions during the week, while others have told us that some of the Sunday vouchers are not being accepted in the garage. We are working to address this issue with the NB Parking Authority. I apologize for any inconvenience this current situation may be causing you.
