



**Fri, Nov. 1, All Saints, a holy day of obligation. English Masses: 7 am, 12:10 & 5:30 pm**

Dear Friends in Christ:

Quý Ông Bà và Anh Chị Em thân mến trong Chúa Kitô:

Estimados Amigos y Amigas en Cristo:

The Apostle's Creed which is prayed at the beginning of the Rosary also can be prayed (especially during Lent and Easter Time) in place of the Nicene Creed which is used at Sunday Mass. In the Apostle's Creed at the end, we profess "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen."

There are 3 states of the Church: 1) those on earth, 2) those being purified (purgatory), and 3) those in heaven. This is what the Catechism of the Catholic Church # 954 states: "When the Lord comes in glory, and all his angels with him, death will be no more and all things will be subject to him. But at the present time some of his disciples are pilgrims on earth. Others have died and are being purified, while still others are in glory, contemplating 'in full light, God himself triune and one, exactly as he is: All of us, however, in varying degrees and in different ways share in the same charity towards God and our neighbors, & we all sing the one hymn of glory to our God. All, indeed, who are of Christ & who have his Spirit form one Church and in Christ cleave together."

Just as we pray for one another here on earth and for those who passed from this life to the next, so too the saints in heaven can pray for us. The Catechism #956 addresses the intercession of the saints: "Being more closely united to Christ, those who dwell in heaven fix the whole Church more firmly in holiness. . . . They do not cease to intercede with the Father for us, as they proffer the merits which they acquired on earth through the one mediator between God and men, Christ Jesus . . . . So by their fraternal concern is our weakness greatly helped.' 'Do not weep, for I shall be more useful to you after my death and I shall help you then more effectively than during my life.' (St. Dominic, dying, to his brothers). 'I want to spend my heaven in doing good on earth.' (St. Thérèse of Lisieux in *The Final Conversations*, 102)."

The Catechism #958 addresses the communion with the dead: "In full consciousness of this communion of the whole Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, the Church in its pilgrim mem-

bers, from the very earliest days of the Christian religion, has honored with great respect the memory of the dead; and 'because it is a holy and a wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins' she offers her suffrages for them (2 Maccabees 12:45).' Our prayer for them is capable not only of helping them, but also of making their intercession for us effective."

This coming Friday, November 1 is All Saints Day, a holy day of obligation. The Mass schedule is above and on p. 7. On Saturday at 9:30 am, we have a Mass for All Souls Day which is not a day of obligation but a day that should be revered with holiness by attending Mass. In the Sacred Heart transept, there are the 2 binders that you may list the names of your beloved deceased.

I am continuing to educate you on the purpose of the Diocesan Services Fund (DSF), as noted on p. 13. To be knowledgeable on what the Church does is all so important. I have addressed the Catholic Chaplain Corps (clergy & lay chaplains who visit the sick in the Medical Center); the Apostleship of the Sea (clergy & lay chaplains who visit the sick for those who come in on the ships at the port of Houston, LaPorte & Galveston); Correctional Ministries (clergy & lay chaplains who visit those imprisoned in the 37 jails in our Archdiocese); and San José Clinic (at McGowen & Fannin/San Jacinto Streets in Midtown, providing comprehensive high-quality health care & health education to 4,000 low-income, uninsured & uninsurable individuals & families). ## SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence and honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

- 1) A **bow of the head** is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.
- 2) A **bow of the body** (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words (and by the Holy Spirit...and became man—highlighted in red words in the Creed).

### Music Notes for Today's Liturgy

At today's 11 AM Mass, Cor Jesu is joined by the RSCM and SMMA Children's Choirs. The RSCM (Royal School of Church Music) Choir rehearses in conjunction with CCE on Sunday mornings, and the SMMA (St. Margaret Mary Ala-coque) Choir rehearses on Wednesday evenings.

At the Offertory, the SMMA Choir and Cor Jesu sing "Hear My Prayer, O Lord" by Henry Purcell. Born in London circa 1659, Purcell was a composer of a unique "English Baroque" style of music, and his fame was not surpassed by another English composer until the 20th century. Researchers have struggled to precisely date his early works, but it is thought that he began composing when he was only nine years old. In 1679, Purcell became the organist at Westminster Abbey, and for the next several years devoted himself entirely to sacred music. During his short career before his untimely death in 1695, he composed over 800 works across many genres, including hymns, sacred songs, art songs, operas, service music, and instrumental music. "Hear My Prayer, O Lord" is a setting of the first verse of Psalm 102. It is thought that Purcell intended it as part of a larger work which he never finished. Composed for eight parts a cappella, the anthem is essentially one three-minute-long musical phrase, intensifying in range, dynamic, density, and dissonance throughout the entire piece until it comes to cadence in the final three measures.

For the Eucharist, both children's choirs join Cor Jesu in Bruce Neswick's hymn setting of "Love Bade Me Welcome." This poignant text is from the poem "Love III" by the 17th-century English poet and priest George Herbert.

### FEASTS OF THE SEASON

**November 1: All Saints' Day:** This feast celebrates the fact that everyone is invited to salvation, and that many who have died have been welcomed into the full presence of God. Many people have gone before us into the glory of heaven. These are not just those designated as saints by the Church, but all who have loved much and achieved the rewards promised to the followers of Jesus. This feast is a holy day of obligation, a day when Catholics gather to celebrate Mass together.

**November 2: Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls' Day):** Because of the strong bonds of love, human beings want to remain connected to loved ones who have died. Even after they have died, we want our loved ones to be safe, secure, and loved. That is the reason for our prayers on this day. We pray that they may have an easy passage to their eventual home with God. We pray that the time before they experience the full presence of God may be short.

#### **Things to Do as a Family to commemorate All Soul's Day:**

- Do pious practices to help the Poor Souls: attend three Masses for the Poor Souls on this day; remember your family and friends who are deceased and make an extra sacrifice for them; pray the rosary for the most forgotten soul in purgatory.
- Make a nice poster listing all the family and friends departed. Put this on display where the members of the family can be reminded to pray for the loved ones throughout November. Remind family members to offer extra prayers and sacrifices for the poor souls in purgatory. Of course this shouldn't be the only motivation, but do include the fact that after these souls reach heaven, they will intercede on your behalf.

## 10 Ways to Support Her When She is Unexpectedly Expecting

I had been brought up to believe that life is always a gift, but it certainly didn't feel like one when I gazed in shock at a positive pregnancy test. As a mom who had my first baby in college, I know that an unexpected pregnancy can sometimes bring fear, shame, and doubt.

However, I also know that an unexpected pregnancy can bring joy, excitement, awe, gratitude, and deeper love than I knew was possible—not to mention the little bundle who inspires these sentiments! About nine months after looking at that pregnancy test, I received the very best gift I have ever been given: my daughter, Maria\*.

An unexpected pregnancy might be confusing along the way, but life—though at times difficult—is ultimately beautiful. Perhaps one of your friends has become pregnant unexpectedly. As someone who has been there, I encourage you to support your friend in her new journey of being a mother.

Not sure how to help or what to say? Here are ten tips:

### 1. **Be available.**

An unexpected pregnancy can send a woman into crisis mode. If your friend just found out she is pregnant, she may not be thinking clearly, and she may feel she has no control over anything at the moment.

Be aware of how she is responding to you. Listen to her and let her know you love her and are there for her any time she needs you. Don't pass judgment on her either interiorly or through words or body language.

### 2. **Respond positively.**

When a woman experiencing challenging circumstances confides she is pregnant, the reaction of the first person she tells tends to set the tone for her decision-making. Avoid responding with shock or alarm, and be calm and understanding. Let her know you're there for her and that it's going to be okay. Pay close attention to her emotional state, and act accordingly.

Depending on where she is emotionally, it may or may not be helpful to congratulate her at that time. However, it is always important to affirm that every person's life—including her child's and her own—is precious and beautiful no matter the circumstances.

### 3. **Be honest.**

The journey through an unexpected pregnancy is not easy, and it's okay if you don't know the perfect words to say. Just be honest. Let her know you are there for her, and ask her how she is feeling and how you can support her.

It's a good way to open the door to communicate, and she may be grateful for the opportunity to talk freely with someone. She might become emotional at times, but be patient—let's not forget hormones; the struggle is real.

### 4. **Offer specific help.**

Don't be afraid to ask her if she needs help with anything or to make specific offers to help. For example, you might offer to help with cleaning, finding a good doctor, or running to the store to pick up the one food that won't make her feel sick. But remember to read her cues, and make sure you're not being overbearing.

### 5. **Set up a support system.**

In addition to the standard baby registry, you can help her get other kinds of support by lining up much-needed, practical help. Think outside the box. Food = love, so take advantage of websites that allow friends and family to sign up to make meals, send food deliveries, or simply donate money. Some websites can even help organize other assistance like rides to the doctor, babysitting other children she may have, or help around the house. You can also look into what programs and assistance may be sponsored by your local diocesan pastoral care or Respect Life offices.

### 6. **Tell her she is beautiful.**

She may be feeling physically, spiritually, and emotionally drained with this pregnancy. Take the time to reassure her of her beauty, both inside and out, especially when morning sickness might make her feel otherwise.

### 7. **Help her recharge and relax.**

First-time mothers may have difficulty crossing that threshold into their new life as a mother. Your friend may be fearful that her life is "over," so help her see it's okay—good, actually—to still focus on herself sometimes. Even though she is a mother, she will still continue to be a woman, so affirm that it's healthy and important to take care of herself—not only physically, but emotionally, as well. Help her to do things she really enjoys. Take her out for a nice meal, a movie, or a day of pampering.

## 8. **Reassure her it's okay (and good) to be happy.**

It can be hard to be happy about a pregnancy that many people see as unfortunate timing at best and totally irresponsible at worst. Even if your friend wants to be happy about her bundle of joy, she may not feel she “deserves” to show that happiness. Get excited about her pregnancy in front of her, and she may just feel comfortable enough to share her own excitement with you.

Also, continue to show your interest and excitement throughout her pregnancy. Ask questions about her developing child. What is she learning at her doctor appointments? What names is she considering? Ask her what she thinks her baby looks like. Does she think they will have her eyes?

## 9. **Encourage her.**

Society tends to focus on ways that an unexpected pregnancy can be challenging. Help your friend to think of the benefits. Remind her of the fluttering kicks, somersaults, and maybe even dance moves her son or daughter will be rocking once they grow a little more. With moms’ groups and opportunities for play dates, there’s a whole new social world to explore. And there are plenty of benefits to being a young mom—like having more energy to chase her kids around.

## 10. **Point out some real-life role models.**

Many amazing young mothers and birthmothers have experienced unexpected pregnancies and still followed their dreams. Other women have discovered that, even when unable to follow their lives as planned, something beautiful and good came out of the twists in the road, bringing opportunities, growth, and joy they hadn’t imagined.

Point your friend to some of the many websites, blogs, and social media accounts dedicated to supporting young mothers. And let’s not forget Mary, whose “yes” to bearing Jesus affected the course of history. The Blessed Mother is a great person to pour her heart out to, and she’s a powerhouse of intercessory prayer.

An unexpected pregnancy can be a difficult and frightening time, and it’s important that your friend knows you are thinking of her and supporting her. Although the tips mentioned can be helpful, don’t forget the most important thing is to pray. Even if it’s just a quick two-second prayer, prayer is the most effective way we can help. Pray for her, for her child, and for guidance in how you can give her the best possible support.



Also, pay attention to how your friend feels most loved. One person might appreciate encouraging words, while another might feel more supported if you wash the dishes. Simple things—letting her know that you care and are always ready to listen, that you are available to help her, that you are praying for her—can give hope and courage when she might otherwise feel alone. Your support might be the only support she receives. Even if we never know how, the smallest things we do can change someone’s life. You can make a difference in her life. Will you?
