Parish Priest's Corner: Has My Faith Been in Vain?

Dear Brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today's gospel presents us with an aspect of John the Baptist's life that we can all identify with. John the Baptist asks this question of Jesus: "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" This question speaks volumes about what was going on in John's mind at the time. We could say that although he was in prison, the solitude of the prison walls offered him a moment of reflection. We could see in John's question that he was filled with doubt about who Jesus was. Is he truly the promised Messiah? Jesus' public ministry does not have the semblance of a powerful leader or king everyone was expecting. John begins to ponder about his purpose here on earth. He may have been somewhat disappointed that what he spent his entire life doing, preparing the way for the Messiah, may have been the wrong calling. He wonders how well he has carried out the vocation/calling God gave him. He was filled with uncertainty and doubt to the point of sending his disciples to confront Jesus. Their witness of the transforming power of Christ – the blind regaining their sight, the lame walking, lepers being cleansed, the deaf hearing, the dead being raised, and the proclamation of the good news to the poor – reassures John that his mission was not in vain.

Just like John the Baptist, we naturally want of see the fruits of our labor. And when the results are not forthcoming or are not what we expected, we can be doubtful of whether we have done well. This applies to our faith too. "Do we ever doubt our faith in God? Do we ever think that maybe we have been wrong in the way we have lived our lives? We were baptized and confirmed. We attend Mass regularly and partake of the Eucharist. We try to be good to ourselves and our neighbors. We love and honor God. We read and listen to scripture and pray daily. When those moments of doubt hit us, we find ourselves questioning just like John: has our faith been in vain?" Our faith is never in vain because it is God working in and through us. Remember the words of St. Paul: "I planted, Apollos watered, but God caused the growth (1 Corinthians 3:6)." I encourage you to continue being steadfast in your faith at all times, and trust in God.

This weekend, we were spiritually enriched through the inspiring words of our parish Advent retreat moderator, Fr. Stephen Clovis. On behalf of Holy Trinity and St. John's parishioners, I thank Fr. Stephen for strengthening our faith and helping to prepare our hearts this Advent for the celebration of Christ's coming.

I also would like to thank Mike Hennick for building the beautiful tabernacle stand in our church at Holy Trinity. It truly makes the tabernacle stand out. Thank you.

The Lighthouse kiosk in the vestibule of the church, which has wonderful resources for our spiritual growth, was provided to our parish by Trish Freitag. I am very grateful to Trish for such a rich spiritual gift to our parish. I encourage everyone in our parish to always visit the kiosk. You will always find a book, booklet, CD or other resource that will inspire you.

The Festival of Angels last Sunday was a spectacular and joyful event. I thank Alice Stadelman for organizing it and decorating the hall together with Sarah Stadelman. Thank you to all who brought some food to share, a gift to exchange and joy to spread.

Catechetical Nuggets

O Antiphons of Advent:

The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century. They are the antiphons that accompany the *Magnificat* canticle of Evening Prayer from December 17-23. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah.

December 17

O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

December 18

O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power!

December 19

O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

December 20

O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

December 21

O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

December 22

O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23

O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!

Saint of the Week

Saint Peter Canisius, Feast December 21



A story for kids:

The year was 1564 and an important mission had to be accomplished. But who could do it? "We need a secret agent!" declared the church leaders. But who was brave enough to attempt it? The mission already had failed once before. What was the mission? To bring documents from the Council of Trent (an important meeting that the church leaders had in Italy) to the bishops scattered throughout Europe. This was a dangerous mission because whoever they chose must travel through hostile Protestant territory. It had been tried before and all the documents disappeared! STOLEN!

Who could travel through Europe as a priest and not be suspected of carrying these documents? Each document was 250 pages long! Father Peter Canisius was chosen. Did he wear a trench coat and dark glasses? Nope! He wore his priestly cassock. So why could he sneak through Europe and not be suspected? Well, Father Canisius started many universities throughout Europe, and he was a Jesuit monk. His disguise? To pretend to be checking up on the universities and monasteries in Europe.

"If I am going to travel all that way, I might as well bring some books to my universities," declared Father Canisius. He packed THREE large sacks full of books! Then he had to add all the documents from the Council of Trent. He must have had countless sacks of stuff by the time he packed!

Did Father Peter Canisius deliver all the documents without being caught? Yes, he did.

And here is a quote from St. Peter Canisius for adults:

"Christmas Day is nothing if not a day of universal joy. Children should rejoice because on this day God Himself became as one of them; virgins, because a Virgin brought forth and remained unstained even after giving birth; wives, because one of their number became the Mother of God; sinners, because their Mediator and Savior and Healer has come to redeem them; the just, because their Reward exceeding great has been born into the world. In fine, all faithful Christians should rejoice that their Creator and Lord has taken on human flesh and begun His reign over the hearts of men, not only as God, but also as the Son of Man among the children of men."
