



“The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son. He dispatched his servants to summon the invited guests to the feast, but they refused to come.”

-St. Matthew

All of us have known the first-hand, heart-wrenching disappointment when we have prepared for a great event and the people cannot come. Personally, I can remember many of those frustrating times.

I can recall being a young pastor and having everything ready for the Christmas Eve Mass, from the decorations, to the choir, to the servers being trained for Mass. Then, the prairie wind picked up and it started to snow and I struggled to get to the evening Mass myself. Only a handful of brave choir members showed up and a couple of servers, but the people largely were not able to come due to the weather.

I recall years ago starting a tradition of having some of the family over for New Year’s Day dinner. The table was set, the food was ready, and one by one family called and decided against attending as the weather simply would not cooperate as they did not dare to drive on icy roads.

My youngest sister was married on December 28th, years ago. December is never a good time to get married in Minnesota, and this statement proved to be true; especially for my sibling’s wedding. I performed the ceremony, which was quite small. It became so cold with sub-zero temperatures that cars would not start and the band decided not to even come to the dance.

Foul weather is one thing, foul attitudes is another. For in today’s Gospel from St. Matthew, the reason why the people do not come to the prince’s wedding feast is not because they “cannot”; rather it is because they “will not”. This is a huge spiritual difference.

This parable is of course highly symbolic. The “King” in this parable is “God”. The “Son” is of course “Jesus Christ”. The “wedding feast” is the “Kingdom of Heaven” on earth, through the proclamation of the Good News as well as heavenly glory. The “people who refuse” the wedding invitation are those in our midst who are baptized and have been invited to the Feast of the Holy Eucharist as well as sharing in the Kingdom of God, but “refuse to come as a result of sin and selfishness”. In the end, the King punishes those that do not come to the wedding. Similarly, Christ will come to judge the living and the dead and punish those who have refused to share in the celebration of salvation.

Do I refuse Christ the King’s invitation to share in the feast of the Holy Eucharist every week? Do you think that Christ is pleased with our spiritual decisions in 2014? Do I refuse the opportunities to proclaim the Kingdom of God in the smallest of ways by daily prayer or simply smiling or greeting someone I see on the street? ***The Kingdom of God***

is already here and we are invited to share in its spiritual joy. If we do not respond to the invitation of Christ’s love now, can we be certain that we will share in that same love for all eternity? May the Kingdom of God be in you and your hearts more and more in the week ahead. May God bless you!



R.C.I.A. (RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS)



**HOLY ROSARY FINANCE COUNCIL
MINUTES
SEPTEMBER 15, 2014**

The Holy Rosary Finance Council met on September 15th, 2014, with nearly all of the members in attendance. Following prayer, Father gave a brief "Pastor's Report". The new Administrative Secretary, Mary Homan has been hired and has been on the job for several weeks. She is doing an excellent job in spite of the newness of the position. Father hopes to meet every other month and have regular meetings as required by the Bishop and the Diocese of New Ulm. (*A minimum of four meetings are required by Diocesan policy.) Father stressed the need to increase revenue and also to decrease expenses now and in the future in order to stay ahead.

The administrative secretary reviewed financial figures. A month and a half into the new fiscal year, revenue is up from a year ago and expenses are somewhat down. Mary will be making adjustments to the accounting system. Some internal controls are being worked on at this time with Father and with the staff in the future.

Father discussed with the Finance Council specifically their consultative role. The council also plays an important advisory role that Father will utilize in the years ahead.

The auditors spent a full day reviewing the past fiscal year of 2013-2014. The audit is a recent requirement from the Diocese of New Ulm (established several years ago by the Priest's Council) when a pastor leaves a parish and a new pastor arrives. The firm that audited the books was CliftonLarsonAllen LLP out of New Ulm. A complete report will be sent to the Bishop, the head of the Diocesan Finance Office and to Father van de Crommert to be reviewed with the Finance Council and the trustees. A member of the firm and the Diocese will present the report to the council upon its completion and to answer questions and address procedures.

Father will be issuing letters of appointment to the Finance Council with staggered terms as required by the Bishop and the policies of the Diocese. E-mail addresses were also obtained.

Concerns were addressed about the electronic giving and that no electric contributions are given on the fifth weekends of the month when they occur. Mary informed the council that only estimates had been presented in the bulletin for four weeks, but no actual figures. The parish will now be going to on-line banking and will report each week what was exactly received and not an estimated amount as was done in the past.

Father proposed the hiring of a part-time choir director. The council unanimously supported this hire. Salary was discussed. Father reviewed the Diocesan directives regarding "stole fees" at the time of a wedding, a baptism,

and a funeral. The amounts were adjusted and the council felt they were equitable. These monies largely go to the parish and not to the priest. The council also supported starting a children's collection to get the young children more involved at Mass.

Father reviewed the basic repairs being done on the rectory: including a new washer/dryer, electrical updates, necessary plumbing as plumbing did not work in upstairs bathrooms, painting, etc. Father expressed gratitude for the many hours of volunteer help he has already received.

Issues regarding expenditures were addressed in keeping with the auditors and the policies of the Diocese of New Ulm. More will be discussed on this matter following the audit report.

Report on investments was also discussed.

The next scheduled meeting has been set for October 20, 2014. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and closed with prayer.
