St. John

This weekend the Universal Church once again sets aside a Sunday in Ordinary Time, in order to celebrate another feast. This weekend we celebrate the Feast of the Dedication of St. John Lateran's Basilica.

This feast holds little meaning for many if not most Roman Catholics. For most of you have never seen this great basilica in Rome and there is a good chance that many of you will never see it in your life time. There are perhaps many things on our "bucket list" before we pass from this world to see and do, but there is a good chance that seeing the Church of St. John Lateran is probably not one of them.

In my priesthood I have been privileged to see this church on several occasions. This past winter, while studying art in Rome. I had a free Sunday afternoon, and with a city map in my hand, walked several miles through the maze-like streets of Rome to the Church of St. John Lateran. There I spent time in prayer and petition, admired the beautiful art and architecture at my own leisure, bought a couple of small souvenirs in their gift shop from a sweet Italian nun, and made my way home from this minipilgrimage before the sun had set.


The Church of St. John Lateran is significant to celebrate as a major feast for the simple fact that this church is the Cathedral of Rome. Many Catholics falsely conclude that St. Peter's Basilica is the "Cathedral" of Rome and of the "Bishop of Rome", namely Pope Francis. St. John Lateran is an ancient church as it was built as far back as 324. This great structure should hold spiritual significance for us regardless if we see it or not. For this church has been referred to in the Church as the "MOTHER AND HEAD OF ALL THE CHURCHES OF THE CITY AND THE WORLD."

When you visit the churches in Rome, there is a certain "spiritual etiquette" that is required. Shorts on either men or women or flip-flops are not accepted when entering these venerable and holy places. You will be sent away by security if you try to enter under dressed. This past winter, as I was in the Basilica of St. Francis, in Assisi, one young girl (of high school age) came in with a very short skirt and bare legs. The security guard told her in Italian to leave. That girl looked very much like a deer in headlights. Equally, "spiritual etiquette" is required when you walk into the Sistine Chapel with the famous ceiling from Michelangelo. Every so often a security guard will say in Italian "Silence!".

There must be a little Italian blood in Christ for the Lord makes a whip of cords and drives out the money changers and those selling animal sacrifices in the temple in Jerusalem. With an equally strong voice the Lord said; "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace."

"Reverence" has fallen out of favor with many religious Catholics, be they leaders in the church or lay people. We have embraced today in this country an attitude towards church behavior as "half-way is not half bad". In many churches (luckily not Holy Rosary) there is more visiting and socializing with the people around us before Mass than praying to our Savior. (The question begs itself, why were "Gathering Spaces" built if people are still talking before Mass in the church proper?) Genuflecting when we enter or leave a church is many times forgotten or becomes a curtsy or bob of the head at best. Our dress is often anything but dignified for receiving the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Christ; but if pastoral leadership would challenge the faithful in this regard, the response is often; "Just be happy that they are coming to Mass." Yet, would we go to a job interview, meet an important client, or even attend prom dressed with anything but the finest clothing? Do any of these things equal encountering Christ through the Holy Eucharist?

The Lord had a great love for the Temple of Jerusalem which was one of the great wonders of the ancient world. Our Redeemer believed in reverence. He believed that the temple was a place for prayer. He believed it was a place to encounter the "vertical" and not the day to day "horizontal". In short, the Lord knew then and still knows now that the human condition spiritually needs a place to rest from the restless world outside. We need a "sacred space" that is quiet, consoling and prayerful and that will be a spiritual tool in this life to lead us to everlasting life! Be reverent! It is virtuous and leads us closer to Christ! Have a great week!

HOLY ROSARY PASTORAL COUNCIL MINUTES

October 6, 2014

The Pastoral Council from Holy Rosary met in the conference room with a full membership of some 15 members present. Committee reports were given from C.C.W., Knights of Columbus, Worship and Finance Committee. (*Please review past minutes of those committees.)

Father spoke again to the Pastoral Council of their role as a consultative body that is being encouraged to meet regularly at the recommendation of Bishop LeVoir. Father stressed that the council knows the area and people far better than he does as pastor at this point. Father must rely on the council to advise him to insure the parish can move again both physically, financially and spiritually.

New membership was discussed. Father wishes to see the members being rotated on a regular basis as the parish has significant numbers to involve more of the faithful. Father does not see the Pastoral Council as a committee that one should be serving on for many years.

Father introduced the first spiritual task of the Pastoral Council to help identify the parish's strengths and weaknesses. These areas include: Spirituality, Worship, Structural, Financial, Outreach, Evangelization, Catechesis and the Future of Holy Rosary as a parish in the Diocese of New Ulm.

The first area that the Pastoral Council addressed at length was Worship/Spirituality. 1.) Strengths: Beautiful Church, Good Music, Children's Liturgy of the Word Program, Full Time Pastor, Core Group of Faithful Volunteers, Reforming of Parish Choir, Strong Volunteers, Urban Setting that is Growing, Parish is Warm and Welcoming, Broad Spectrum of People – Young – Middle Age - Mature. 2.) Weaknesses: Youth Attendance and Involvement in the Life of the Church, Teens Encounter Christ Involvement has Declined, Core of Volunteers is Shrinking, Community Events Have not Been Promoted, Few Attending Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Thursdays, Church is Closed Most of the Time, Little Adult-Ed Enrichment, Limited Training has Been Done for Liturgical Ministry at Mass, Very Few Ushers, Need to Do Again Time and Talent Survey of the Entire Parish.

The next Pastoral Council Meeting has been scheduled for November 24th at 7:00 P.M. in Conference Room 1. Future Business will include addressing Structural, Financial, Outreach, etc. of the parish in both its strengths and weaknesses. The meeting concluded with prayer.
