

"... and remind you of all that I told you".
"Remind me", is a very human response to a relative or friend; especially in this day and age as we have so much to remember

from day to day. On this Memorial Day weekend, we might tell those in our household: "Remind me to get to the store so that I can get those geraniums in the ground." or "Remind me to get out the flag pole so that we can roll out "Old Glory" on Memorial Day." or "Remind me that we need to run to the store so that we can refresh the refrigerator with hot dogs and potatoes salad for the supper when some of the neighbors come over."

Traditionally, Memorial Day is a "reminder" to all of us that the long winter is finally over with its cold and snow, and that the calendar is telling us that summer has officially arrived. Yet, one of the things that troubles me about Memorial Day each year is that while we are remembering so much for ourselves; we seem to forget more and more those who served, suffered, and made the ultimate sacrifice of surrendering their life in death on the battlefield. For it is this hard fought freedom that allows us on Memorial Day to sit in our back yards in freedom, to do as we please, except for swatting some of the first of those pesky mosquitos freely flying around.

What happened to the Memorial Days of the past with the parades, people coming to church to pray, or perhaps to simply ponder the passing of our loved ones at the cemetery who served in our armed forces? Originally, Memorial Day was actually called "Decoration Day", for the graves of the service men who had fought and died were decorated with flowers, flags, and other fine decorations. It is believed that June 3, 1861, in Warrenton, Virginia, was the location of the first Civil War soldier's grave ever to be decorated. There are many historians who believe that the original founder of Memorial Day was President Lincoln.

In April 1865, following President Lincoln's assassination, commemorations for Memorial Day became widespread across the nation. Since more than 600,000 men from both the "North" and the "South" died in the Civil War, Memorial Day, honoring the fallen military dead, was a really a big deal that was front and center of this holiday. It was also in the year 1865, that the federal government began creating national militaries for the Union war dead. By 1868, memorial events were held in 183 cemeteries, in 27 states, and 336 cemeteries. By 1870, the remains of nearly 300,000 Union dead had been interred in 73 national cemeteries, located near major battlefields, most of which were located in the southern states where the majority of the battles were fought.

I have been a pastor long enough to know and to "remember" that often when Memorial weekend comes around, the number of men and women that come to worship starts to decrease; as they are focused more on summer than on a fallen soldier. Yet, as the Sacred Scriptures forget, the Lord does not forget. For the readings for this Sixth Week of Easter, all seem to share a common theme of "remembrance" from circumcision, to a celestial vision, to the commandments of God.

Today, male circumcision is something that is connected to "health" and being "sanitary", while for the ancient Jew it was connected to "holiness" and being "spiritual." For the ancient mark of circumcision had less to do with a "doctor" and much more with the "divine"; a "remembrance" or a "memory" of the Almighty and the promise He made going back as far as Abraham. One author writes: "Circumcision is a mark or a reminder of the eternal covenant – the sacred covenant – between God and Abraham, and continuing between God and Isaac, then between God and Isaac's sons, then between God and every single male born to a Jewish parent or converted to Judaism – through the ages."

In the Second Reading from the Book of Revelation, we are reminded that for an ancient Biblical Jew, and even before, the great blessing of life was to make pilgrimage, at least once on earth, to the great and holy city of Jerusalem. To walk into that great wonder of the ancient world, the temple in Jerusalem, was a foretaste of heaven on earth. In St. John's visions (that we have been reading about these past weeks), this week he has a vision of a "Heavenly Jerusalem". St. John's wonderful remembrance of being in the city of Jerusalem on earth cannot compare to the "Heavenly Jerusalem" that is now before him in this supernatural sleep. I love St. John's line: "IT GLEAMED WITH THE SPLENDOR OF GOD."

Finally, in today's Gospel from St. John, the Lord's Good News message is mighty simple to say, but very hard to live. For he writes: "Whoever loves me will keep my word..." In other words, if we remember the Redeemer by obeying the rules, we can be assured the Lord will "remember" us when we retire from this world in death and will rise with Him, remembered for all eternity and a sharer in the Kingdom.

There is nothing wrong with having some "fun" on Memorial Day weekend, but let us not forget to have a little "faith" and to pray for our fallen dead, who have served to defend our freedom. Happy Memorial Day!
