Jesus said to His disciples, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill."

-St. Matthew



To be a public figure, much less a religious leader, one has to expect public criticism. From the priesthood to the presidency, it is "open season" to tell either civic or church leadership, either directly or indirectly, what we disagree with or dislike ranging from their leadership to their decisions. Criticism

that comes in these leadership positions comes with the territory, regardless if you like it or not, you are a good leader or not a good leader.

But, once in a while, voters and those Christians who claim that Christ was victorious over death, cross the line and when unfiltered, can say some pretty amazing and harsh things. I can recall serving out in the western portion of our Diocese almost 30 years ago as a freshly minted pastor. I had less than 30 months under my belt when one particular parishioner told me at a Pastoral Council meeting that she felt sorry for their parish as they always got the "leftover priests," meaning both my predecessors and myself. (*I didn't feel I was even old enough to be already considered "leftovers"!) Suffice it to say, she was in disagreement over some decision I had made at that small church so many years ago. In fact, while I don't remember what the disagreement was about, I still remember that very hurtful statement she had made. The words that we speak, have a power both to heal and to hurt.

Just as in the name of Love and in the name of Lord, some souls can say some pretty sad and sinful things; so too in the time of Jesus. For if there was one thing that a Jew had a great love for was the LAW. For obedience to the LAW PROVED THEIR LOVE FOR THEIR LORD AND GOD. So, when Jesus is accused of not being a keeper of the LAW, even Jesus gets (justifiably) a little hot under the collar. For Jesus stresses He is and will keep not just the major Jewish laws, but even the tiniest of the laws of their religion. For Jesus wants to assure them that He does love His Heavenly Father!!!

When we read today's Gospel from St. Matthew, we are coming in the middle of a major spiritual fight. If you turn back a page or so in St. Matthew's account,

Jesus previously has given the greatest sermon any religious leader has given. For the Lord has just given the Sermon on the Mount, or better known to some of us as the Beatitudes. Today, when we hear the gospel passage of the Beatitudes, we are consoled and comforted as we hear in part: "Blessed are the poor in spiritBlessed are the sorrowing," etc. HOWEVER, FOR THE BIBLICAL JEW, THE LAWS OF GOD DID NOT BEGIN WITH THE SWEET WORDS OF "BLESSED," BUT INSTEAD THOSE STRONG WORDS, "THOU SHALT NOT." There is little doubt that those Jewish leaders believed Jesus was watering down their religion and therefore had no real love for God.

The Good News is that Jesus was turning obedience to the Law of God from something negative "Thou Shalt Not," to something positive, "Blessed." Secondly, Jesus was not trying to destroy the Old Law or the Old Covenant, but instead building on the Old Law/ Old Covenant with a New Law and the New Covenant. The previous readings for this 6th Week in Ordinary Time affirms this Good News theme of the Law and the Commandments (in their severity), as the First Reading from Sirach says, "If you choose you can keep the commandments, they will save you; if you trust in God, you too shall live." However, Psalm 119, already affirms the positive side of the Law in keeping with the future Beatitudes, as the refrain prays, "BLESSED are they who follow the law of the Lord." Finally, St. Paul tells the Corinthians about a need for wisdom. In keeping with Paul's challenge to be wise, we must be wise to know that we SHOULD NOT MAKE THE LAW INTO GOD, BUT RATHER TO KNOW IN WISDOM THAT THE LAW LEADS US TO GOD.

A week from this coming Wednesday, February 26th, we will be celebrating another Lenten season with the start of Ash Wednesday. It is a time to intensify our prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and also to be more attentive to the laws of the Church regarding fasting and abstinence. For many Catholics, they see Lent as a negative law-abiding time, rather than a positive or BLESSED time. As we begin to spiritually prepare for these 40 days of renewal, how about coming up with some laws and regulations for yourself that are positive, blessed, and life-giving during the upcoming season of Lent? Enjoy these remaining days of Ordinary Time! Have a good and a less wintery week!

Usually after a major fundraiser, the faithful will ask, "How many meals were served?" After a major winter storm, (of which we have had our fair share in the recent years), the faithful will ask, "How many were at Mass?" This week, I was asked that question multiple times as to how many people attended Mass due to the winter weather. As I told those people, I will also tell you, "I am amazed at the lack of faith of some souls and the love of the faith among other souls." When weather is so severe, I feel (in my practical Dutch mind) that the very, very young (such as infants) should maybe plan to stay home and not go out in the storm. I also feel that our very elderly, at the risk of falling and breaking something, might come to Mass when it is more favorable, even during the week when the weather is more cooperative. So, amazingly I see some very young and some very...not so young still come to Mass under some very harsh conditions. God bless them! However some of our younger people and high school students who are only blocks from the church, should try and come to Mass.

With regards to Mass attendance, I was pleased with a very strong attendance on Saturday night as many people anticipated the Sunday morning storm. When I got up on Sunday morning and looked outside, I truthfully thought I might be saying a private or almost a private Mass. I was amazed that we had about 50 people in attendance at 8:00 A.M. I was impressed. At the 10:00 A.M. for we had a loosely-filled half a church. That too was pretty good. The stewardship was remarkably good as well as we were able to make budget. This is due in part that though the week we continue to receive monies allowing us to make budget. I talked to an administrator this week from a Catholic parish who said that they had taken a major hit financially because of the weather. In that regard we are very blessed here at Holy Rosary. One reason our revenue was slightly down last year as we had several weekends of bad winter weather. It could be that this year we have been much more fortunate with regards to stewardship as last weekend was our first weekend where the weather cut into our worship. Thank you for your faithful devotion Oh yes and your ever-faithful stewardship. Thank you for your gifts!

Education Committee Minutes Holy Rosary Church January 20th, 2020

The Holy Rosary Education Committee was called to order at 7:00 P.M. on Monday, January 20th, 2020. Nearly all of the members were in attendance. The meeting opened with prayer that was led by Father. The minutes of the October 7th, meeting were approved as read and that were published in the bulletin. The agenda was approved with no other additions.

<u>Pastor's Comments:</u> Father reported Faith Formation is progressing well. We are now well past the mid-way point. We have only about 12 weeks of class remaining or about two and a half months. Confirmation has four classes and a retreat remaining before they bring their formation to conclusion. We have gained a few students from the area, as people are wanting a more "classroom like" setting for their children as opposed to self-preparation on their homes. We have completed our stewardship support for our area Catholic School of St. Ignatius of Loyola earlier than in the past. Catholic Schools was celebrated recently at St. Peter and St. Paul as well as our four area Mankato parishes.


Lent will be starting up in just a couple of weeks on February 26th with the start of Ash Wednesday! Classes will be held on Ash Wednesday along with the celebration of Mass. Father stated that with the extended commitment to Confirmation this year he would not be doing any adult education this year as he did in the past. However, Mary Beth Nygaard would be directing an Adult Education program as in the past, which in previous years was done during the weekday on Tuesdays.


Business: Guest Speaker: Beverly Miller, from St. Peter and St. Paul, spoke to the committee about inviting Holy Rosary to share in an evening of enrichment on February 12th, for grades 6-12 on purity and chastity. The talk is entitled "A Love that Satisfies". All the other Catholic parishes were supporting the project and Beverly was also seeking the support of Holy Rosary. Father had spoken to Beverly previously on the phone and asked her to come and present the evening program seeking the support of the Education Committee. Father had expressed that parents become unrestful when there are changes or something differs from the ordinary routine or schedule. The Education Committee supported and encouraged Father to propose that it would be a

requirement for grades 6-8, as the youth are being bombarded through technology with so much impurity and pornography. As a result of this decision, there would be no classes at Holy Rosary for grades 6-8 that evening. The Confirmation students would not be required, but strongly encouraged to attend, with the time spent to count towards their service hours for the fulfillment of their Diocesan requirement. Grades 6-8 would be encouraged to attend with parents (if possible) from 6:00 - 8:00 P.M., although the event would go to 9:00 P.M. Father would promote the event through the bulletin and through the weekend announcements. Youth Ministry Sub-Committee Update: There was no report. Faith Formation Calendar/Community Meals: Father presented the second semester calendar and hesitated to publish it prior to the Education Committee meeting as it is difficult for one person to foresee all of the scheduling obstacles. The Education Committee saw no issues with the proposed second semester schedule and it was approved for distribution. The schedule would be published in the bulletin as well as available on-line. The committee did decide to close the Faith Formation year at the end of April with an Ice Cream Social and to also have a picnic-style community meal towards the end of the school year to replace the monthly or weekly Community Meals due to the limited attendance. Father would add these social items into the schedule as well. Youth Liturgies: Father noted that we are more than half-way through the year and we have not had any Youth Masses. Although there is no clamor from parents to have these liturgies and in the past it was difficult to get students to have students participate due to families limited presence or participation at the liturgies; Father still wanted to pursue this as a means of catechesis evangelization and asked the Education Committee for the their input. A liturgy or two was suggested during the Lenten season with sign-up beginning in the upper grades. Vacation Bible School: Theresa Calsbeek, a member of the Education Committee and the First Grade Catechist proposed a return to Vacation Bible School during the month of June. Father indicated that he would support the program but did not see himself

as overseeing the program due to his many other parish commitments. A discussion was held as to who might volunteer for the week to oversee this activity for our young people. At least one person from past years has agreed to organize the crafts and find the materials, but she did not want to oversee the entire, week-long program. Names were thrown out but no leadership emerged at this time. The program is contingent on finding someone who would like to lead this week-long activity.
