



1st Sunday of Lent

"At that time Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the Devil."

- St. Matthew



"Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil." Every time that we pray the Lord's Prayer, we say those words. We have perhaps said those ten words so often, they mean precious little to us decades later. However, I would like you to reflect on these words at the end of this most familiar prayer for a moment

once again, as we enter more fully into this season of Lent in this year of 2020.

Temptation is very much a part of the human condition. We are continually being tempted to sin, ranging from what we eat, to how much we eat; from being vain to vain-glory; from worshipping stars and celebrities to worshipping sports and the world of "stuff." We have come to a time in our culture and our society that we believe more in "societal philosophy" and less in "spiritual theology." Specifically, we believe today more in the cultural philosophy of "if makes you happy, you should do it," versus "whatever makes you holy you should do." So, we are amazed, shocked, perhaps even scandalized by people who have chosen "alternative lifestyles" (which are many in our present times), under the blessings of society that these people are profoundly "BRAVE." While those who remain faithful and true to the teachings of...say, the Roman Catholic faith, are often labeled at best, naive, out-of-date, or uninformed, even though they have the backing of 2,000 years of strongly held beliefs.

Today's Gospel from St. Matthew has Christ appearing out of character about as much as the Lord cleansing the temple. For to have such a strong temper that you would drive out the money-changers, it appears that one has lost control. For one to be tempted by the Devil in the desert, it also appears that one is, in fact, not in control. **Perhaps our** personal spiritual struggle to see Christ having a temper, much less being tempted, is due in part because we have secretly embraced the heresy that Jesus was only God. That is a great heresy to think that Jesus was divine but not human, for Jesus was 100% human like you and I are in

this world today. And while Christ displayed strong human characteristics, from anger to actually being tempted, from the temple to His temptations; the Good News is that Christ was not out of control but rather was in control in those situations both in terms of temper and temptations. Simply to say this control of Christ was a direct result of His 100% divinity, directs us away from the Good News.

In the case of temptation, how can we avoid succumbing to this spiritual trap and slipping into sin? The next time you find yourself in a tempting situation by perhaps taking that third donut, or driving well beyond the speed limit, endangering yourself or others; ask yourself this question. "Is what I am about to do a "HUMAN" action, or is it a "HOLY" action?" For when we act out of human desire, the focus is on ourselves in our human condition. When we act out of a holy response, we are acting not out of selfishness, but in response to the needs of another. Being trapped by temptation, at its very core, is selfish.

The three temptations of Christ, from a meal of bread, to the mirror of vanity, to making the Messiah worship the Devil to inherit the world; is all centered on the self. Christ was able to overcome the physical and emotional temptations, through spiritual reasoning that these requests were all centered on selfishness. It is for this reason that the Cross of Jesus Christ, in all of its pain, suffering and death, is so strikingly beautiful. For Christ's death on the cross was so incredibly selfless, so holy, so reaching out to others, beyond our neighbor, to the next generation past and present from the beginning of time to the end of time.

I predict that as we continue our practices of Lent over these next 40 days, we will be tempted to break our promises related to intensifying our prayer, fasting and almsgiving. In that brief moment of temptation in the future, ask yourself this question: "Is this a holy, selfless response or is this a human, selfish response?" You might be surprised that you could become more faithful to your Lenten resolutions than you have ever been. Keeping our resolutions is less about human will-power and more about following the will and the power of the Holy One, Jesus Christ. Happy Lent!

Stewardship of Gratitude

The season of Lent could be summarized with three elementary words: PRAY...FAST...GIVE! I think that many Catholics still see the need to intensify their prayer by attending Sunday or daily Mass, reciting the Rosary as a family, or perhaps attending the weekly Stations of the Cross. We know that Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of FASTING and ABSTINENCE, and so we deny ourselves meat and many of those things that we enjoy eating or drinking. But what about GIVING? Do we consider GIVING more during the season of Lent than we have been giving to our church or to a worthy charity? Our parish of Holy Rosary is approaching an annual budget of almost a million dollars. One third of the money that is given is in support of Catholic Education and the work of our Diocese of New Ulm. A great portion of the remainder of this revenue is spent just to maintain the facility and to cover the utilities, along with the salaries and benefits for a shoe-string staff. Yet, there are many who do practice the faith or who do not practice the faith, who are comfortable allowing others to take care of the GIVING, as they choose to give very little or nothing in the Sunday offering week in and week out, year in and year out. Is this right? Will this Lent be different in your pattern of giving? Will you increase your giving? Thank you for your gifts!

Retreat Proud

Last weekend nearly all of our Confirmation class was in attendance for an afternoon retreat 🛕 at the campus of the School Sisters. I was so proud of the mature response of our young people as we spent the afternoon in reflection, talks, walks, and prayer. On Monday morning of last week I returned to the School Sisters to offer Mass for them, (*and I will be there again this Monday), and several commented at how mature and respectful our Confirmation class from Holy Rosary carried themselves. I too was impressed. It was equally nice to hear from a few of the students as they were leaving at how much they enjoyed the day and felt that the time was well spent in prayer and reflection.

Many thanks to those parents who participated in the retreat, and also to Jane Young, Lorraine Klaseus and Timothy Cain for their assistance. Confirmation is now down to just three remaining classes in March. Their preparation is on the home stretch. They are a wonderful and responsive class. "Come Holy Spirit....fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love...." (*Rememberclass this Sunday and we are off next week!)



Vigil Lights - For Safety's Sake!

For those of you that follow the devotion of lighting candles before the shrines of St. Mary and St.

Joseph, you may have noticed some changes. For decades we have allowed the faithful to burn small votive candles, and allowing them to make a modest offering for doing so. And while the cost of the candles has continued to rise and the cost of one little candle that will burn for several hours is approaching \$2.00 a piece, people continue to offer twenty-five or fifty-cents or maybe a dollar. So, point one: The parish is losing money on this devotion, running into hundreds of dollars each year. (*Our hope is just to break even.)

Point two: our insurance provider is working on discouraging parishes from having unattended, open flames in church. Several churches in recent memory have burned from unattended vigil light racks or people burning candles in an inappropriate way. While it is true that there are candles on the altars, they are only burning during the time of the liturgy. (Incidentally, we are presently working on eliminating the six beeswax candles that are presently used on the high altar and to replace them with candles that are artificial and filled with a wick and oil. We hope to have these in place by Easter of this year.)

Therefore, we have eliminated the traditional flameburning candle, with a realistic tea-light battery operated candle. While our traditional candles were approaching \$2.00 a piece, these candles are less than a \$1.00 apiece. (A suggested offering would be at least \$1.00.) In addition to being much safer, they also require much less work and maintenance. This pastor has spent many Friday evenings picking up broken glass from vigil lights and scrubbing on hands and knees the soot that has resulted from the candles, dropped matches, etc. It is not a very glamorous job that few are standing in line to do for the good of the parish. One parishioner commented already how "real" they look. If you turn the candle over, there is a little switch to turn on. If the candle does not turn on, it is because it has already been used. Simply pick another one to light for your intention. Thank you for understanding and your devotion. St. Joseph and St. Mary, pray for us!



Diocese of New Ulm Reorganization Update

February 19, 2020, was the deadline for those who have filed sexual abuse claims against the Diocese of New Ulm or parishes within it to approve or reject the bankruptcy settlement plan. Claimants were mailed balloting materials, including the plan of reorganization, in late December. The outcome of the vote will be determined on or around March 10, 2020.

If claimants approve the plan, and the bankruptcy court judge confirms the plan at a hearing on March 10, then the case will be settled. At that point, the phase for distribution of funds to claimants will begin. Settlement payments will be paid to claimants out of an independently-run trust.

As detailed in the plan of reorganization, the \$34 million settlement will be funded by contributions from insurers, the diocese, and all parishes within the diocese, regardless of whether they had claims against them. Our parish, along with every other parish in the diocese, will be contributing to this settlement. The <u>combined</u> contribution from all parishes is \$1 million. This is the right thing to do to provide for a fair settlement for those harmed and help survivors in their healing.

Bishop LeVoir again asks that all clergy, parish and Catholic school leaders, and all local parishioners continue to pray for all those harmed and do whatever we can to help survivors in their healing. New - Evangelization Committee

Presently, I am in pastoral discussions to implement a new committee at Holy Rosary that will be focused on evangelization. Presently, there are several



members of the parish that have stepped forward on this new adventure to simply visit and connect with members of our parish family. Presently, our parish does an outstanding job visiting the sick, infirm and homebound of our parish. We also visit the homes of new parishioners when they join Holy Rosary. But who visits the parishioners that have been members for many years? There are many members of our parish who have never been called or visited for years or decades. And while it is not possible to for the pastor to visit more than 800 homes; recall that Jesus sent out His disciples two by two to proclaim the Good News of salvation.

We will be having an initial meeting in the near future but are seeking people that would be willing to go out and to visit those from our parish who are young or young at heart; those who may be active or inactive in order to visit and to pray with them, visit with them and to make them feel ever more included in our Holy Rosary family.
