



# March 8, 2020

2nd Sunday of Lent

"And He was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and His clothes became white as white." -St. Matthew



In Latin we would say, "Eides Martiae." In English we would say, "Beware of the Ides of March." I recall in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade, sitting in Latin class, and Fr. Mike Cotone, who was introducing us to that March day, to the "Ides of March." The Ides of March, when corresponded with the ancient Roman calendar comes out to March 15<sup>th</sup>

(next Sunday to be exact). For the ancient Romans, it was a day for settling debts with another person. It was also on this day that Brutus killed Julius Caesar, as he was fearful that Julius wanted to be more than a democratic leader of the people but actually wanted to be the King of the Roman Empire. As Julius Caesar was stabbed by his friend, his last words in Latin were "Et tu Brute?" In English (with the implication): "And you also Brutus, have betrayed me?"

It is amazing how quickly things can change. As we have changed seasons from Ordinary Time to the season of Lent; I am still pastorally amazed, after all of these years of serving as a priest, how people can change their ways for the better and pick up their spiritual cross of prayer, fasting, almsgiving and service with such enthusiasm. For yesterday, on my day off, as I was catching up on cleaning in the rectory, doing laundry and finally ironing shirts that I had worn last summer when I was in Colorado; I was thinking how many people have responded spiritually during this Lent of 2020, and have seen the spiritual light.

For example, our appeal for more liturgical ministries and service on our various committees beginning on Ash Wednesday has produced some pretty wonderful results. It looks as though we will be gaining some 10 new altar servers; 2 more choir members; 3 more Education Committee members, 9 Extraordinary Ministers of the Holy Eucharist; 4 more members for our newly forming, Evangelization Committee; 32 households to bring up the gifts: (that will cover almost 25% of this ministry for the entire year); 12 new lectors; 6 new members to the Pastoral Council; 4 more Rosary Leaders; 1 new song leader/cantor; 13 more ushers; and 13 new

Worship Committee members. WOW! From just the appeal on Ash Wednesday we gained 105 families/ members who have stepped forward in faith to serve and there are still more forms coming in as I write these words. We had ordered only 25 books for adult faith sharing that began this past Wednesday, and this week we placed another order to double that amount because we are already anticipating some 50 people that will be participating this year, which is also excellent and those numbers will also continue to grow! It looks as though our light is shining at Holy Rosary on the other side of the Minnesota River.

In today's Gospel from St. Matthew, the light of God did not shine on the Son of God but rather shone out from Him. The miraculous Transfiguration of Christ was not just a fancy parlor trick, but it was a spiritual lift or enlightening before the Lord would be led to the cross and die for the sins of the world past, present, and future. As quickly as the Lord changed in appearance from a regular human being to radiating in divine holiness; He would change again to be ravaged by the heavy cross and dying on the hill of Calvary, outside of the city of Jerusalem.

Likewise, I was also thinking of all of the wonderful changes that are taking place in and around our parish. We are again seeing progress on our front entrance; daily Mass attendance has nearly doubled during this season of Lent; Faith Formation has had a good and faith-filled year; parish stewardship is up from a year ago; fuel costs are down from a year ago; more repairs and updates are being planned for our interior space, etc., etc., etc.

But just as Christ radiated this supernatural light on the Mount of Transfiguration before the light of life left Him as He hung upon the Cross at Calvary; so too, it appears that this potential pandemic cross of sickness, disease and even death as the coronavirus works its way through the western hemisphere could also turn all this positive Good News into bad news. For it appears that many people who possess underlying health issues, such as the elderly, the infirm and even some normally healthy souls might see death. How quickly things will change in the life of our own parish if people are hesitant to go out in public or are scared of coming together in groups due to this contagious virus.

The Good News is that the more things change, the more they stay the same. Just as so many spiritually good things are happening in our midst, it all could change overnight. But even if a pandemic does occur, at the same

## **Vigil Lights - For** Safety's Sake!

For those of you that follow the devotion lighting candles before the shrines of St. Mary and St.

Joseph, you may have noticed some changes. For decades we have allowed the faithful to burn small votive candles, and allowing them to make a modest offering for doing so. Recently, our insurance provider is discouraging parishes from having unattended, open flames in church. Several churches in recent memory have burned from unattended vigil light racks or people burning candles in an inappropriate way. While it is true that there are candles on the altars, they are only burning during the time of the liturgy and are not left unattended.

Therefore, we have eliminated the traditional flameburning candle, with a realistic, battery operated tea-light candle. In addition to being much safer, they also require much less work and maintenance. If you turn the candle over, there is a little switch to turn on. If the candle does not turn on, it is because it has already been used. Simply pick another one to light for your intention. Thank you for understanding and your devotion. St. Joseph and St. Mary, pray for us!

#### Soul-nourishing Practices for Lent

#### Fast from busyness.

Take a slow walk around a neighborhood park or other natural place. Listen to the sounds around you—of nature, of people, of silence—and let your soul find rest in the moment.

#### Fast from emotional exhaustion.

When feeling a soul-draining emotion, such as resentment, hurt, anger, or fear, give yourself time and space to let it rise and then subside. Don't judge, bury, or ignore it, but let it play itself out before choosing a way to respond.

#### Fast from negativity.

Pay attention to times when you find yourself indulging in skepticism or sarcasm, cynicism or contempt. Make a conscious effort to turn your thoughts around to something positive, hopeful, and life-enhancing.

#### Fast from verbal violence.

Look for ways to replace hurtful words with healing ones. Be mindful of abstaining from television shows, films, books, articles, and other forms of media that are filled with hateful, judgemental, or cruel words, images, and actions.

\*This, rather, is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed, breaking every yoke; Sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; Clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own."

Presently, I am in pastoral discussions to implement a new committee at Holy Rosary that will be focused on evangelization. Presently, there are several

And while it is not possible to for the pastor to visit more than 800 homes; recall that Jesus sent out His disciples two by two to proclaim the Good News of salvation.

We will be having an initial meeting in the near future but are seeking people that would be willing to go out and to visit those from our parish who are young or young at heart; those who may be active or inactive in order to visit and to pray with them, visit with them and to make them feel ever more included in our Holy Rosary family. We are hoping that those who join this committee would visit one or two homes a month. This would come to about 15-20 households a year. We would have some 3-4 meetings a year to pray, review the visits and to address the progress of this committee. 

# Is a Pandemic Possible? Are We Prepared?

Although it is still uncertain if the coronavirus will reach pandemic proportions, if this illness spreads throughout the United States and the upper Midwest, it will certainly curtail our extra-curricular activities and would include our church and worship activities in various degrees.

Catholic Mutual of Omaha, has recently sent to all of the parishes that they provide insurance coverage to, some recommendations to help stop the spread of the virus. Most of these points are pretty much common sense and practical precautions, as we prepare for the eventual spread of this outbreak. (\*Holy Rosary has already implemented # 1 and #3 at this time.)

- 1.Holy Communion should not be distributed under the form of the chalice.
- 2.Receiving Holy Communion on the tongue will be <u>strongly</u> discouraged.
- 3.Shaking of hands should stop and be replaced with greeting the person and/or bowing to them out of respect at the sign of peace or by greetings after the liturgies.
- 4. Seating could be done in alternate rows.
- 5. Anyone appearing sick would be invited to return home.
- 6. There might be a limit placed on the number of people attending a baptism/funeral/wedding.
- 7.In the event of multiple deaths or a severe outbreak, a full Funeral/Memorial Mass would not be done or a funeral luncheon, but instead a brief, grave-side service be held, with a possible Memorial Mass at a later time.
- 8. Parish gatherings, meetings, classes, etc. would be either postponed or cancelled.
- 9.Catholic Schools would follow the lead of the public school system as to whether classes would be held.
- 10.Confessional boxes/rooms would not be used.
- 11. Holy water would not be available in the fonts or for distribution.
- 12. Collections would be done through a basket with a handle and not being passed from one person to the next.
- 13.People who are vulnerable and who have other underlying health issues would be strongly encouraged to stay at home.
- 14.Extraordinary Ministers would not be bringing Holy Communion to the sick or homebound for a period of time

May we pray to St. Joseph the patron of the sick and dying that we might be spared from such a terrible outbreak! Mary, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary, pray for us!
