["Rejoice Sunday"]

The crowds asked John the Baptist, "What should we do?" - St. Luke



Once upon a time, people would go to the parish priest for counsel and advice seeking out an appointment and then sitting down for a visit. Today, what most of us can expect in the priesthood, is someone running out of the church on a weekend liturgy and saying, "Father, can I ask you a question?" Usually,

the question that they are asking of God's representative, they could just as easily have "googled", and maybe get an even clearer answer on some point of Catholicism, rather than expecting the priest to give an answer off the cuff on the steps of the church.

Maybe that is why the faithful are less and less inclined to come to the Sacrament of Reconciliation these days. For the Sacrament of Reconciliation is more than the confession of sins, but it is also seeking counsel; more than acknowledging of one's sins, but also seeking spiritual direction on how to live a more holy life. But when pride and independence take over our lives, there is often very little room left in our heart for an interior examination of our spiritual lives, much less the spiritual power to push us by God's grace into the confessional.

I was still quite young and in grade school when my older brother came home one day during the summer to announce that he was leaving the seminary and the religious order that he had joined, having taken only temporary vows. I recall my brother making the announcement in the summer while visiting us from the state of Indiana where he had been living in the monastery attending Purdue University. disappointment and surprise was palpable, and perhaps a bit loud. Feeling that my brother was rushing into a life decision he might later regret, they "forced" him to put on "good clothes", [imagine dressing up to go to see the priest] drive to town and speak with our pastor. Reluctantly, he did so, and returned an hour or so later, informing that the counsel he had received from the Catholic clergyman was pretty much the same that had been given by his superiors of the religious order to discontinue his studies if he did not feel the call to the priesthood and/or religious life.

Although that was not a thousand years ago, it seems almost that long ago when I think how much influence the priest had on the lives of the faithful under their charge versus today when most often people want to speak with a pastor because of a "concern" or perhaps some "comment" the Pope or some other person has made on some spiritual topic. But more than 2,000 years ago the

people also held the clergy and holy people such as prophets in high regard, and certainly wanted their advice on how to be holy and to share in heaven.

So, in today's Gospel from St. Luke, those who seek out the sage spiritual advice from St. John the Baptist range from a crowd of people that included tax collectors and even military soldiers, [perhaps even Roman soldiers who would not have had a belief in the Jewish faith]. St. John's wisdom and spiritual counsel causes many people to think that St. John the Baptist was in fact the Savior. But John the Baptist assures them that he WAS NOT the Savior. And any lack of holiness that John may have felt when people complimented him that he might be the Christ, John makes up for in humility with the words: "...I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals". That is pretty humble, people of God!

It is not by accident that we hear again of the great St. John the Baptist, advising us spiritually and announcing the coming of Christ for a second week in a row. May the words of the prophet that have been passed onto our generation 2,000 years later, permeate our hearts, so that we might see the need of penance in this season of Advent, and that our Christmas celebration, with the Holy Mass, might be one that is truly "Merry". May your GAUDETE SUNDAY, be in fact and in faith a day of JOY and REJOICING! Maranatha! Come Lord Jesus, do not delay! I hope you might take a little time to come to church this Sunday and spend some time before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament when He is exposed on the altar! See you in church!

Stewardship of Gratitude

Over the past few weeks, you may have noticed that our stewardship has rebounded, although we had a slow start at the new Fiscal Year of 2020-2021. Last Thursday the Holy Rosary Pastoral Council met and among the many things reported and discussed, the finances of the parish were reviewed, with some very positive results. I will mention a few of the highlights at this time.

The parish expenses were noticeably down from a year ago, by almost 29%. This is due in part to the many repairs that were done last year and also were carried over from the exterior work on "Stepping Up in Faith" campaign. Secondly, adult contributions, when compared to last year at this time increased by 15.1%; junior collections had increased by almost 16%, electronic giving increased from a year ago by 6.3%, and the loose plate collection had increased by a whopping 128%. Of course, all of these statistics from stewardship are a visible sign that the spiritual life is slowly returning to normal.

We are still however behind in our overall contributions to both the Diocese and Loyola from a year ago by a little more than \$39,000.00. As we approach the Christmas holidays, regardless if you will be celebrating at Holy Rosary, or will be out of town, please keep Holy Rosary on your short stewardship "nice" list! And as always, thank you for your gifts!

instructed the catechists, that with such little precious class time, to reserve just a small portion of the class for this purpose.



Thought for the Week



Year-End Giving



The end of the year is not far away, and it is time to start thinking of strategies to maximize the tax benefits of year-end giving. Federal tax laws and many state laws make it possible to reduce or eliminate taxes on gifts to charities like your parish, diocese, schools

and other ministries. Remember that only gifts made by December 31st can help reduce the amount of taxes you owe next April. Please consult **your professional tax advisor** for tax strategies for your personal situation.

Gifts of Cash: The most popular way to give to charity is still by cash or check. Gifts completed by December 31st will qualify for tax deductibility for the current tax year. Gifts of cash qualify for up to one-half of your adjusted gross income (AGI). You must receive an acknowledgement for gifts of \$250 or more.

Gifts from Retirement Plans: Retirement plan assets can be a practical source from which to make charitable gifts to your parish. If you are over 70 1/2 and are required to take withdrawals from a Traditional IRA, you may want to consider making a charitable gift using all or a portion of your mandatory withdrawal amount. This way of giving may result in little or no tax impact when you report the amount withdrawn along with an offsetting charitable deduction.

Securities & Appreciated Assets: Gifts of stock, bonds, mutual funds, and certain other property that have increased in value can result in even greater tax savings than gifts of cash. If you have owned such investments for longer than one year you can generally donate them to your parish and deduct their full current value, even if it far exceeds your original cost. Congress has provided that in addition to regular tax savings, you also do not have to pay capital gains tax when these assets are given to a qualifying charity. This "extra" tax savings is another reason why some choose to make their gifts this way.

Request for Volunteers for the VITA Tax Program



Volunteers are needed for the VITA Tax Program. The program provides free tax preparation for lower-to-middle-income taxpayers, older individuals, and those with disabilities, to help them get the tax refunds wo which they are entitled. We need <u>tax</u>

<u>preparers, greeters, & phone volunteers.</u>

<u>Tax prepares</u> need only computer competence and an interest in financial/tax issues. Some tax prep experience is

interest in financial/tax issues. Some tax prep experience is welcome but not required; tax preparation training and training materials are provided. <u>Greeters</u> will do intake and initial screening, and <u>phone volunteers</u> are needed to take tax appointments. Training for both will be provided, and no experience is necessary.

We have news in our "Stewardship Corner" on two fronts: first, our Loyola stewardship commitments and secondly, the annual Diocesan United Fund. In the first instance, we contributed an additional \$20,000.00 to Loyola again this week. [For recall, last week we also gave \$20,000.00, so in the past 14 days we have contributed \$40,000.00. This brings us well over the 50% mark of contributions to \$95,000.00, or about 62% of our total parish goal.

We also have our first figures in from our Diocesan Annual Appeal. Our "soft goal" has been set by the Diocese at a healthy \$33,786.20. In actual cash received, the Diocese has taken in a total of \$7,190.00. The total amount in pledges and gifts has climbed in this early stage to \$7,590.00, or about 22% of the total goal the Diocese of New Ulm is requesting. [At this time, the parish will be receiving back from this amount a total of \$1,438.00 that will be turned around to pay down the "hard goal" of the annual Diocesan United Fund.]

When these figures are compared against the figures of 2020, last year the parish had paid to Loyola a total of \$125,000.00, or \$30,000.00 more at this time. The Diocesan Annual Appeal had taken in last year at this time, \$9,970.00, or \$2,655.00 more than this year. Last year the parish had contributed \$30,915.58 to the Diocesan United Fund, while this year, the parish has contributed \$24,412.26, or \$6,503.32 less than last year. So, overall, when compared to a year ago, the parish has contributed \$39,158.32 less than last year at this time in these three combined areas.

As you are making out your Christmas list, perhaps you can include one of the Diocesan appeals, either the D.M.A. or the D.U.F. We will again be taking up a second collection for the Catholic School of Loyola at all of the Christmas Masses to cover this year's \$153,000.00 commitment, as we have done in years past. We hope that you will extend again your Christmas generosity. And as always, thank you for your gifts!





Holy Rosary Worship Committee Meeting Holy Rosary Catholic Church October 11, 2021

The Holy Rosary Worship Committee met on Monday, October 11, 2021 at the parish school in the conference room. Following prayer, the past minutes of the November 16th meeting, published in the bulletin, were approved as read.

Pastor's Comments: Father briefly stated that more and more of the liturgical life is returning slowly but surely back to normal. The servers are starting to return with new servers being trained in the coming weeks and months. Attendance is slowly increasing and the stewardship is also increasing. When compared with other Christian and other Catholic churches, Holy Rosary is doing as well, and possibly even a little bit better than many other churches. There has been no manual for pastors on how to steer spiritually through a pandemic such as we have experienced, and hopefully the country is winding down from the pandemic at this time. Masks are no longer required at Mass if a person has been vaccinated, but the priest and Extraordinary Ministers of the Holy Eucharist are encouraged to wear them at the time of the distribution of Holy Communion, as many people do not have a respective sense of distance. It has been suggested that the priest would wear a mask after Mass as people try to come sometimes so close to the priest and recently 3 priests of the Diocese of New Ulm, that had been fully vaccinated, still came down with Covid-19. There will be no distribution of Holy Communion under the form of the Precious Blood, indefinitely. The shaking of hands at the Sign of Peace is also being discouraged as well as the priest shaking hands after Mass. [However, Father admitted that there are still several people who wish to shake his hand as they are leaving the church.] Overall, the parish is adopting well to the present environment. Father thanked the committee and people during these unusual times.

Business: Fall Communal Anointing: The date was set for the Fall Communal Anointing Mass for November 8th, at 4:30 P.M. Because of Covid-19, a catered meal will be brought in, but desserts would be allowed to be brought in by the people. [It may be a long time before the parish will be returning to any potluck meals where people prepare food in their own kitchens and bring them to church.] Lorraine will call and invite the infirm and elderly to attend. Memorial Mass: The November Memorial Mass, honoring those that have died within the past year [plus the previous year of lock-down], will be held at the 10:00 A.M. Mass on November 14th, the weekend after the Fall Festival. Invitations will be sent out to the families who have lost a loved one through the parish office. There will be no reception following the Mass. Candles will be processed up as in past years by the family members following Holy Communion. Decorating for Advent/Christmas – [Set-up and Take Down] Thanksgiving decorations will come down the day after Thanksgiving, November 26th at 1:00 P.M. Advent decorations will be set-up at that time. Dates for Christmas decorating were also established and will be published in the parish bulletin. The Worship Committee discussed how to approach decorating the church for Christmas this year. It was decided to simplify the area around the crib as the old adage holds true, "less is more". The possibility of putting up one large tree might be possible near the crib. The stable area will also be downsized as well from years past. Father would work on some sketches and make some final decisions, and if needed would get some men in earlier to do the heavy lifting before the final decorating takes place. The Christmas flowers have been ordered from Drummer's for Advent, the Third Sunday of Advent as well as for Christmas, with delivery dates set as well.

Phase III - Church Interior Work: A further discussion was held regarding the completion of the interior decorating of the church. The sanctuary is largely completed, but the main area of the church still needs to be addressed. [About \$7,000.00 has been given specifically for this purpose of interior work at this time.] A specific discussion was held about the music area and redesigning this space with a new flooring in that area that would be stone rather than carpet to improve the sound for both the instruments as well as the singers. The organ is in need of repair with limited people being able to repair the instrument and also the tremendous cost. The organ is not a pipe organ but an electronic instrument, and perhaps has seen its better days because of its age. Father asked the committee if they have heard from people about the desire to hear the organ played more often at the liturgies. The Worship Committee admitted that some people like the organ, but with fewer people being true organists and that the parish has largely been using the piano, some members raised the question, was it worth spending so much money to repair an instrument that might break down again, [Father has already had the organ repaired in the recent past with no guarantees for a long future.] The committee agreed with the proposed musical changes, but felt a repairman be sought out, despite the cost, to assess how expensive it would be to repair the organ. If the life of the instrument is nearing its end, and replacement parts are getting harder to find, it might be better to simply upgrade the piano. Father stated that he would visit this issue with both the Pastoral and Finance Councils as well. Relocation of the Presider's [Priest] Chair: Father stated that the parish choir is once again in "limbo" as our director took a new position in Iowa. Equally, there are still many concerns about singing in a group as Covid-19 is still alive and present. [Perhaps there may be some small groups singing in the near future such as was done at the "Mass in the Park".] Many people have fallen in the sanctuary over the years due to the indentation of the steps in the sanctuary for the choir. There had been concerns by the Diocese at the time they were being proposed and Father Paul, who was serving on the Bishop's College of Consultors, was asked by Bishop LeVoir, to visit with Fr. Peter. The steps were approved but with a little hesitation by the Diocese. Since then, the choir was disbanded before Father Paul arrived as pastor. A new director was found and the choir restarted, but the church has gone through several directors largely because of marriage and moves. The choir sings [at its best] infrequently, and if the steps were done straight across, the choir [which most likely will be smaller in the future] could still stand in that same area. Thus, the chair could be placed on the opposite side of the pulpit creating perfect symmetry which the church architecture calls for in its style. Brian Eggersdorfer made a significant point that all the other churches in Mankato have the chair in the place that Father is proposing and would be liturgically more appropriate. The rest of the committee concurred. Father was informed that Vetter stone has enough stone from the quarry of this particular color, to redo that choir area, but it may not be available in the near future if the parish would wait. With the additional work that needs to be done in the church this summer, this would be the perfect time to complete this project. The committee's consensus was to move ahead and to speak to the Finance Committee and Pastoral Council on these two areas involving the music and the movement of the chair. 2021 Renovation Costs: The parish is still working on finalizing the cost of some of the areas. There is no firm bid on the pews or the carpeting at this time. A preliminary estimate is around \$150,000.00, to complete the main church worship space, but the price could be higher. What could not be raised could be taken from the parish reserves. Decorating for the Fall: The meeting closed with decorating for the fall in the church for those that were able to remain after the meeting. Next Meeting: The next meeting for the Worship Committee was not set at this time. The meeting closed with prayer.
