Happy Spring! Well, in these last days it has been wonderful to welcome the warmer temperatures and to see the snow piles shrinking. There is hope here in the frozen north of Minnesota that spring might once again happen. As we anticipate the physical springtime in Minnesota, so too we anticipate spiritually the coming of the Lenten season. [Recall, that the word "Lent" literally means "springtime".] And just as the springtime is a time of renewal of the natural order, so too each Lent is an opportunity to be renewed in the supernatural order through prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Believe it or not, Ash Wednesday is only days away. This year Ash Wednesday falls on Wednesday, February 22nd, or this Wednesday. Each year we are blessed with strong attendance, most especially for the afternoon Mass, as well as the early evening Mass. Our Mass schedule for Ash Wednesday will be the same as last year. On Ash Wednesday there will be a morning Mass at 8:30 A.M., followed by an afternoon Mass at 4:30 P.M. The evening Mass will be held at 6:45 P.M. [Faith Formation students in grades 1-9, are asked to report to the school on Ash Wednesday at either 4:15 P.M. or 6:30 P.M.] Parents are strongly encouraged to attend Mass on Ash Wednesday. Their children will be brought over to church by a catechist before the start of the liturgy. If the parents are in attendance, their son/ daughter may join them. Otherwise, these students will remain with the catechist and return to school for parent pick up at @ 5:30 P.M. or 7:45 P.M. respectively.]

I call your attention to the fact that Lent is a perfect time to return to the faith. May this Lent in 2023, be one that you will always remember. Although our parish is being blessed with both an increase in attendance and stewardship in these recent months, there are still so many out there that are still suffering from the spiritual virus after the pandemic of "Covid-casualness". Recall St. Luke's gospel 13:14: "Strive to enter through the narrow gate. Many I tell you will try to enter but will be unable." While I have always prayed as pastor for my congregation, one of the priests of our Diocese told me recently that at every Mass [in the petitions] he prays

specifically for baptized Catholics that do not practice their faith. I have been doing this spiritual act for the last few weeks at Holy Rosary and it appears to be working. I have been seeing greater attendance and more faces that I have not seen for some time! Praise God!

An older woman who had not been at Mass since before the pandemic, recently came up to me after Mass and acknowledged that she had been away for years. She commented, "Father, I have not seen the church since it has been restored. It inspires me." I guess, whatever it takes to bring you back to the faith!

In addition to the weekend Masses, there will be Stations of the Cross every Friday at 5:30 P.M. [We will also be having Stations of the Cross for our students during Lent on a Wednesday evening during Lent.] Parents will be asked to be in attendance, but all parishioners will be welcome as well. I strongly encourage those who are able to attend daily Mass on Monday's and Friday's to consider doing so at 8:30 A.M. I also will be offering Mass every Thursday at 12:00 P.M., followed by a light lunch [free will offering] followed by about 15 minutes of instruction on a passage of scripture. This will take about an hour and if you have to run back to work that is fine. For those who have the time, there will be an opportunity for small group discussion in the lower hall for as long as they wish to be there. There is also another opportunity of adult education entitled "Catholicism and Comedy" that will be hosted as well during the Lenten season here at Holy Rosary. And of course I will be scheduling multiple times for the individual celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. So, as you can see, there is lots happening here at Holy Rosary spiritually for the "springtime" of our faith.

As I am praying for you, I ask for your prayers for the numerous candidates we have this year that are seeking full communion in the Catholic faith. We have the makings of an amazing Holy Week and Easter Vigil. Let us make this Lent of 2023, life-giving for our spirits, so that we might see heaven and the promise fulfilled of Christ in everlasting life. See you next Wednesday!

This week I attended the Diocesan clergy conference with less-than-ideal weather. There is nothing more purgatorial for me than to drive for six hours through harsh, wet, and winter conditions. But it is not only a good opportunity to grow in adult spiritual formation but also to visit with some of the clergy that have gathered as well from across the Diocese of New Ulm. In the limited number of priests that I had talked to, because we are such a rural diocese and agriculture has continued to grow larger and larger, both in acreage as well as in production; communities and churches [as well as our Catholic schools] continue to see a continual decline in enrollment and attendance. One priest commented to me at this meeting that from the time that he served as an associate, to today serving as pastor, the student population of his large parish alone has decreased by about 2% each year or about 60%.

Holy Rosary has continued to see decreases in student population and also in demographic shifts due to death and relocation to other regions of the state and the nation. However, we are again blessed this week to welcome three new households to Holy Rosary. As always, thank you for your gifts!

Lenten Scriptural Studies Thursdays During Lent





This Lent as pastor I would like to offer a "lighter" form of scriptural studies. This would not be as heavy in "calories" [or should I say content] from a few years ago when on Sunday afternoons we gathered more than a hundred or so strong to study the history of the scriptures and all its historical background.

What I am proposing is that we would gather for Mass as usual at 12:00 P.M. on Thursdays [as I have been offering for some time now]. We have been having some of our strongest daily Mass attendance at these Thursday noon Masses of the entire week. Before Mass you are welcome to sign up for a sub and chips from "Jersey Mikes" if you wish. [We will ask for a free will offering to cover the cost of the meal.] You are also welcome to bring your own bag lunch if you wish. After Mass, you will be invited to briefly eat your lunch downstairs in the lower social hall as I change out of my vestments, and clear up things from offering Mass.

At 12:45 P.M. I will make a 15-minute presentation [on a passage of scripture] perhaps the passage that the Church prayed that day around the world, but maybe within the entire chapter. For those that need to return to work and have only about an hour lunch break, they could return to work. Those of you that are retired and/ or have more time on your hands, would be welcome to break into small group discussions with some follow-up questions you could discuss if you wish that I would provide in a worksheet form.

Now of course is the time to start thinking of what I am going to do seriously this Lent to enrich myself and make myself a better person spiritually. While it is a good time to give up the sweets and some of the things we enjoy, how about becoming an adult person when it comes to Lent and not childlike saying I am giving up only candy or sweets. Don't allow the evil one to convince you that we do not have to do anything for the Lent with those lies: "I am too old", I am too young", "I am too busy", "I have afternoon cards", etc. Now is the time to think, "How will I intensify my prayer, my fasting and my giving?" A little early but, HAPPY LENT!

We are proceeding on our projects for the summer of 2023. This week I signed a contract for the front doors of the church. We had planned on replacing these doors more than a year or two ago when we were planning to redo the church's interior. Unfortunately, due to supply chain problems following the pandemic, the company could not come with either the glass or the hardware for the doors. After many months of delay, it was decided several weeks ago, to submit a new project form [unfortunately at a higher cost due to inflation]. Although it will still take months for the doors to arrive, the company representative has assured me that the doors will be installed around the time of June, or early this summer. Can you believe how long you have to wait for things these days? Of course we must pay forward for the project, so this week we paid from parish monies [not the monies we have set aside] a total of \$25,000.00.

We have also ordered this week new windows for the lower social hall, most of which are still original from 1950, and are of wood construction. We had to pay forward on this project a total of \$7,000.00. So between the necessary windows and doors, the total cost has come to an expense of \$32,000.00 for doors and windows at this time. [Nothing is cheap these days.]

So, this raises our total amount of "paid to date" for our project from \$43,843.76, to \$75,843.76. That is a nice jump to an even 10% of the total monies we intend to raise for the church. In one week this has resulted in an INCREASE OF 3%! Yea! As I stated in a recent bulletin, it was my pastoral hope to raise the amount of money for this project by 1% a week. We are off to a great start, and we still have the remainder of the month of February, all of March, April, May and June, to add to this designated account with new monies before we end the Fiscal Year of 2022-2023, at the close of June.

Your strong weekly offerings is making it possible to continue the improvements, updates, and restoration of our parish church possible. This week's envelope for Ash Wednesday is but another opportunity for us to pull ahead in stewardship. As always, thank you for your gifts!







Lenten Spiritual Opportunities!

Prayer: Lenten booklets will be made available at the entrances on Ash Wednesday and into the Lenten season as long as they last. 300 of these booklets have arrived for your personal prayer life. There is a brief reflection that takes only a few minutes to pray each day. There is no charge for these pamphlets.



Almsgiving: Again this year, beginning on Ash Wednesday, students and their families, as well as all parishioners are invited to make

use of Operation Rice Bowl to take home a "rice bowl" that is provided to collect [not just coins] but also bills and checks for the poor around the world. More than a 140 million of the poor around the world are helped through this program. These "bowls" will be returned during Holy Week, beginning on Holy Thursday!

Daily Mass and Friday Stations of the Cross

Now that the winter is starting to fade, the days are getting a bit longer, and the sun is getting up a little earlier; perhaps it is time to make a little spiritual sacrifice [if we do not have to report to work] to come to morning Mass on Mondays and Fridays here in church. If you have a difficult time to get going in the morning, then how about coming to Mass at least once a week on



Thursday at 12:00 P.M. [We are having some of our best attendance during the week on this day and we are having several visitors as well from other parishes coming to pray with us which is very nice.] So, how about you? Maybe you could do a little fasting, and in lieu of lunch come to celebrate Mass on Thursdays celebrate the liturgy, share a sandwich and some scriptural enrichment.

Last year, with each passing week, the attendance became stronger and stronger as I challenged the faithful to come at least once to the Stations during the course of the 40 days of Lent. Let us see how strong our attendance can be on the first time that we journey with our Lord through His passion, suffering and death at Calvary this Friday at 5:30 P.M.!

May this Lent be memorable because we have intensified our life of PRAYER and ultimately our relationship with our Divine Lord. See you in church.

Directive for Lent and Life



Precepts of the Catholic Church

The Precepts of the Catholic Church are a description of the absolute minimum actions required of Catholics regarding the Church.

The Church uses these precepts to remind us that Christian life requires a commitment to prayer and active participation in the liturgy and sacraments. If we fall below this bare-minimum level, we can't rightly consider ourselves to be in full communion with the Catholic Church.

Each of these precepts of the Catholic Church is a requirement. Together with the Ten Commandments, they represent the minimum level of moral living. Intentional violation of the precepts or the Commandments is a grave matter, meaning a mortal sin.

The Precepts

1. You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor.

We must "sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord" (Sunday), as well as the principal feast days, known as Catholic holy days of obligation. This requires attending Mass, "and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days."

2. You shall confess your sins at least once a year.

We must prepare for the Eucharist by means of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). This sacrament "continues Baptism's work of conversion and forgiveness."

3. You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season.

This "guarantees as a minimum the reception of the Lord's Body and Blood in connection with the Paschal feasts, the origin and center of the Christian liturgy."

4. You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church.

"The fourth precept ensures the times of abstinence and penance which prepare us for the liturgical feasts and help us acquire mastery over our instincts and freedom of heart." See below for more about fasting & abstinence.

5. You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church.

"The fifth precept means that the faithful are obliged to assist with the material needs of the Church, each according to his own ability."

(These quotations are from the Catechism of the Catholic Church, in its section about the Precepts of the Catholic Church (#2041-3).)

Note that these precepts of the Catholic Church are required, unless you have a legitimate reason for not meeting them. For example: If you are sick, tending to a sick child, experiencing a blizzard, and cannot get to Mass, it is not a grave violation to miss Mass that day.

Children, the elderly, and pregnant or nursing women do not have to fast on normal fast days (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday).

More about fasting & abstinence

One of the precepts of the Catholic Church requires fasting & abstinence as signs of repentance. Repentance means to turn away from sin and turn back to God.

Catholic spirituality traditionally includes in repentance some form of penance. Penance means some practice that lets us express sorrow for our sins and helps repair the damage that sin has caused.

Penance gives us important practice in resisting temptation, thereby strengthening us. It greatly strengthens a number of virtues, especially charity, and it greatly enriches life.

The Catholic Church has two official forms of penitential practices: fasting and abstinence. These are so important that they're one of the precepts of the Catholic Church.

Fasting is reducing the amount of food you eat below normal levels. Specifically, on fast days you may eat one full meal and two smaller meals, but those two smaller together should not exceed the amount of the normal meal. Snacking is also prohibited on fast days. All Catholics age 18 to 59 are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. You are still encourage to fast and abstain if you are 60 years old or older. You are excused from fasting if you have a legitimate need to eat a normal amount of food on fast days. This includes: The sick or infirm, including handicapped or mentally ill people who need the nourishment or cannot make a free choice to fast

Pregnant or nursing women

Some manual laborers

Abstinence means not eating meat (fish is not considered meat in this case).

All Catholics 14 and older are required to observe abstinence on these days: Ash Wednesday, Good Friday (the Friday before Easter), and all Fridays in Lent.

In the U.S., it is still strongly recommended to observe Friday abstinence outside of Lent, but Catholics may choose to substitute another penitential practice or act of charity for these days.

Please note that the **duty** to perform the tasks of your state in life takes precedence over the law of fasting in the precepts of the Catholic Church. If fasting honestly causes you to be unable to fulfill your required tasks, it is uncharitable to fast — the law of fasting would not apply in this case. (Consult with a priest if this is a concern to you.)

Always remember: the precepts of the Catholic Church are minimum levels of participation in the life of the Church. Out of love for Christ and a desire to advance in the spiritual life, you will normally try to do far more than they require.

Many people recommend that Catholics during season of Lent:

- 1. Attend Mass at least one more time a week.
- 2. Go to confession at least once during Lent, and find a regular confessor so he can give you better guidance.
- 3. Attend adult enrichment in the opportunities the parish provides.
- 4. Receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at every Mass, if you meet the guidelines for reception (are free from mortal sin, etc.).
- 5. Make a habit of practicing penitential and charitable acts beyond those required by the precepts of the Catholic Church.
- 6. Contribute as much as possible to the material needs of the local Church and the needy through local charities.
- 7. Abstain from unnecessary and unhealthy foods during Lent.
- 8. Prioritize the 3 sacred days of the church, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil.




