Off in the distance you see a beautiful bright light coming toward you. As you look closer you can see the face of Jesus. Imagine the big smile on His face as He approaches you. Listen to what He says to you. "I stand at the door of your heart, day and night. Even when you are not listening, even when you doubt it could be Me. I am always there. I await even the smallest signs of your response that will allow me to enter. I come to you with my mercy, with my desire to forgive and heal you and with a love for you beyond your comprehension. I bring you My light, to dispel your darkness and all your doubts. I come with My power, that I might carry you and all of your burdens; with My grace, to touch your heart and transform your life; and My peace I give to still your soul. I know everything about you. I love you for you, for the beauty and dignity My Father gave you by creating you in His own image. Don't you realize that My Father already has a perfect plan to transform your life, beginning from this moment? Trust in Me. Ask Me every day to enter and take charge of your life, and I will. I promise you before My Father in heaven that I will work miracles in your life. Whenever you do open the door of your heart, whenever you come close enough, you will hear Me say to you again and again, not in mere human words but in spirit: No matter what you have done, I love you. Come to me with your sins, with your troubles and needs, and with all your longing to be love. I stand at the door of your heart and knock. Will you let Me in?"

UNLEASH THE GOSPEL

Unleash the Gospel Minute

"What does it mean to be a disciple of Christ? Am I one?"

Last week's article "what is the kerygma?" said that after hearing the kerygma (the basic message of the gospel), and responding to the invitation to give our life to Jesus, we take the first step toward becoming a disciple of Christ. What exactly does that mean?

In very basic terms, a disciple is like a good friend. When you have a good friend, you want to spend time with them, talk with them, and get to know them better. You trust them with your secrets, confident that they won't betray you.

A disciple of Jesus wants to learn more about Him, spend time with Him, and get to know Him better. They may spend time reading the Bible, listening to Catholic podcasts, or studying in some other way. They either have a steady prayer life (talking with God), or are working on one. They trust Jesus and want to be like Him however they can. They may try to spend time with other spiritual people, to get their 'take' on Jesus. Does any of this describe you?

A good parish supports disciples, like a 'trellis' allowing them to grow with 'Christ the vine', so they can eventually 'bear good fruit'. Jesus spent a good deal of time forming His own disciples, and left them with instructions to "Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations; ... and teach them to observe all the commands I gave you." Matthew 28:19-20.





Gospel Reflection on the Holy Family

"Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you." 725 kilometers. That's the distance on modern roads from Bethlehem to Cairo. Assuming one covered 40 km a day on foot — ambitious for two young parents and their infant son — the journey would take well over two weeks. Of course, the Holy Family didn't have modern roads. They would travel through wilderness, fear bandits, run low on water, and cross the vast Sinai Peninsula in a reverse of their forefathers in Exodus. Here, in struggle and sacrifice, are the beginnings of the forging of the Holy Family.



"Joseph rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed for Egypt. He stayed there until the death of Herod." Large Jewish communities existed in most major cities of the ancient Mediterranean world, after the collapse of their kingdoms chronicled in the Old Testament, and Joseph could likely find work as a carpenter. All the same, today's Gospel reminds us that the first formational years of Jesus as a babe-in-arms were spent in a strange land. The members of the Holy Family were foreigners, outsiders, immigrants.

The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. God took on our humanity. He is in solidarity with our own trials and difficulties. On the feast of the Holy Family, we honor the special place of the family within society. We are invited, too, to recall those families who share in the struggles of the Holy Family in a particular way. We pray for immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees. We pray for all parents who sacrifice their own well-being and comfort so their children may have a better life.
