

High School Leadership Camp & Middle Grades Summer Camps Revived

This year, the Diocese of Baker offered two youth summer camps for the first time since 2018. The first was a High School Leadership Camp, June 23-25. The second camp was a Middle Grades Summer Camp for incoming fifth to ninth graders, June 26-29. The theme for both was, "Abide In Me," Jn 15:4. The second camp had a secondary theme, "Witness to Jesus", that focused on three young saints-to-be: Blessed Carlos Acutis, Blessed Chiara Luce Badano, and Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati.

The High School Leadership Camp welcomed six youth and several helping adults to a new Diocesan Youth Leadership Team. Four Youth Leaders stayed to help with the second camp and welcome an additional 26 campers.

The High School Leadership Camp focused on the campers' relationship with God and tools to help each to become the fullest He created them to be. Highlights from this camp included community-building games, prayer, Mass with Bishop Cary, a great talk about prayer by Fr. Joseph Kunnelaya, and Adoration with an opportunity for confession with Fr. Sibi Polouse. The last session allowed the youth to try their leadership, collaboration, and teamwork skills to create and present the final talk, "Consider it All Joy."

The Middle Grades Summer Camp was four days of high energy! Campers played games and did religious activities that everyone could participate in. Some camper's favorite activities were Gaga Ball, the group hike, roasting s'mores and hot dogs over a campfire, and serving at Family Kitchen in Bend. Camp guests and speakers included Fr. Sibi (the "Be-Attitudes"), Fr. Todd Unger (A Teaching Mass), Fr. Victor Mena (The Eucharist, Adoration), Patty Matlock (Friendship: "Strive to be a Golden Retriever"), Bryce Herrmann (Prayer, hike guide), and Bishop Cary (Ending Mass).

The campers and adults had a lot of fun as they grew in their faith and practiced serving others. Additionally, they were allowed time to pray the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, pray a unique mix of camp blessings before meals, and spend an amazing half-hour of Adoration in the St. Mary Chapel. Throughout the short time together, they formed a connection with other Catholics and shared about their personal relationships with Jesus. The goal was to create a space for all to feel safe while challenging them to grow spiritually. St. Vincent de Paul Marks Over 25 Years of Service in The Dalles

Our history in the community runs deep. The St. Vincent DePaul Conference in The Dalles has been a large part of providing needed services for over 25 years. With great support we were able to purchase a building to house our first store and add a kitchen to the building. For the past 25 years, Bread and Blessings has provided a morning meal Monday-Friday. Bread and Blessings had been feeding the homeless for a few years before, and we provided them with a location with a kitchen. In addition, Community Meal, which is a group of churches and volunteer organizations, partnered with us to use the kitchen for meals on Friday-Sunday evening. Twelve years ago, we partnered with other community members to offer a winter overnight shelter for the homeless.

In April of 2003, we were able to purchase another building for our store, which had outgrown the space. We opened our new store site on December 5, 2003 to serve people with a much larger space. In early 2014, we leased the store to St. Vincent de Paul of Lane County, and they named it St. Vinnie's Thrift Store, and we concentrated our efforts on providing services to the community. With help from St. Vinnies and other community businesses, we now supply clothing vouchers, gas vouchers, propane, emergency housing, and we now have added an afternoon meal Monday-Thursday. We also opened a food bank in the basement area of the St. Vinnies store on December 1, 2014, having moved it from our Ministry building site, and we now serve clients in a food store type setup.

We are presently looking for another co-operative group to keep the shelter going. Time has taken a toll on the first winter shelter group, and we are now looking to assist a new group to operate the shelter in our facility for the coming winter.

We are excited about what the future holds and we are now in another season of expansion and have added another couple of new services that visit once a week. There is now a mobile medical unit and a community volunteer lady who comes to give haircuts in our day use center.

Future plans are to make improvements to our day center and possibly expand the building itself, to better serve the needs of the community. Our vision is to offer more laundry, shower services, safe storage and personal information assistance. We are working towards having better connectivity to other community resources such as housing, drug rehab, and mental health services. We also are working on connecting with a future navigation center to help with some education and job services/ support to help the houseless community become self-supporting and step into a housed and sustained lifestyle.

Times are changing, needs are changing, but our love of the community does not and we will flex to continue to meet the needs and keep loving our community. If you
