THE 26TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME – SOME MUSINGS

". . . neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead."

Dark trees, silent sentinels of night, stood against the bright tangerine of the pre-dawn sky. As the sun crested the horizon I watched a pair of rabbits chase one another around the yard. The breeze was cool but held the promise of a warmer autumn day. A knock at my door and a familiar voice calling, "How's your day?" heralded a short but loving visit from a son and I realized once again how very richly I've been blessed. The day ahead was a busy one but the sun, the memory of sunrise and that short visit carried me in His arms throughout. The richness in our lives isn't always measured in monetary terms but when we're blessed with sufficient we need to be prepared to share with those less fortunate.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus can be troubling, just as troubling as the reading from the book of the prophet Amos. The rich man seems totally unaware of the beggar at his doorstep and it's easy for us to condemn that behaviour. All too often though we can do the very same thing. There are so many demands made for assistance that we can steel ourselves against that call, or that knock on the door, or the hand held out for change. And, let's face it, there's only so much we can give. If, however, our entire purpose in earning money is to give ourselves the luxuries we want we may find ourselves wanting at the end. I've always believed that where we go hereafter, depends in large part on what we go after here.

We would not sit eating and drinking and allow someone to starve outside our doors, surely not. But what do we do to feed the hungry? There are many kinds of hunger if we stop and think. People hunger for a kind word, a smile, a helping hand, a listening ear, a shoulder to lean on when things are going badly. And sometimes we're not very good at feeding those needs. We can become so wrapped up in our own affairs that the needs of others go unnoticed and uncared for. Often we can ignore newcomers to our neighbourhood or our parish. We know so many people that those who are new to us seem to be forgotten.

There are many kinds of poverty and I wonder if Jesus isn't reminding us to look for ways to alleviate some of that suffering. There are those who have been stripped of their identity by loss of a life partner, or a life's work. There are those who are homeless. Like Abraham they are aliens in an alien land. There are those who have homes but do not feel welcomed there. The needs are many and we're meant to do our part in helping those who are in need. When we turn a blind eye to the sufferings of others, like the rich man, we're allowing others to starve – for affection, for a caring heart, for comfort. For the most part we've been richly blessed. Let's not forget that there are others, right here in our own community who have not been. Let's strive to do better than that rich man in the parable and to do what we can to ensure that the rich blessings we've received are shared by all. We know that winter is on its way but let's not let the colder temperatures and bitter winds chill our hearts to the needs of those around us, hardening us to their plight.

The coming seasons of autumn, Thanksgiving, Christmas, are times when we'll be asked to give to the food bank, to the Christmas gifts, but let's not let these be the only times we give. Let's not turn those in need into our rent-a-family plan, our Thanksgiving relatives, but let's carry that attitude of giving throughout the year, ensuring that there is food and drink for all; comfort at all times and love in abundance.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

In this weekend's Gospel Jesus uses symbols and expressions which were in use in Israel: "the bosom of Abraham," "between us and you a great gulf has been fixed." This language may not be quite well understood today. It does not mean that the dead had contact with others and communicated with each other.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus gives the lesson that the riches we have is to be used to assist us to gain eternal life. The rich must share; the haves have a responsibility towards the have-nots. The rich man of the Gospel was punished only because he refused to help his brother in need.

The selfish abuse of wealth takes many away from God, for 'you can't serve both God and money.' "You can either conquer the world or the world will conquer you; you must be either a master or a slave."

If we condemn people and do not accept them, we ourselves will not be accepted and will have to 'stand outside.' Our life is a precious gift of God and we are responsible for the things entrusted to us. We have to use them for God's glory and for our fellowmen. And our earthly life is the preparation for eternity. We have to do good, "as long as the day lasts." (Jn. 9:4)

"What will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?" (Mt. 16:26)

A miser in France used to keep all his gold and precious things in a cellar under the floor of his house. One day he went down through a secret trap-door at the top of the cellar to gloat over his treasure. Then the trap-door banged down so that he could not get out. No one in the house knew about the cellar and the miser could not be found. People searched all over the place but could not find him. After a long time, they gave up and the house was sold. The new owner of the house wanted to have a new building built there. While they were digging to have a new foundation the cellar was found. When it was opened, the miser was found sitting at the table with all his gold glittering around him. (M. Nassan) The life of the rich man in the Gospel became meaningless because he used his wealth only for himself and neglected others. He was blind to the needs of others. There is more happiness in giving than I receiving. (Acts 20:35) The poor Lazarus in spite of his misery believed and hoped in God.
