Fr. Lance's Letter

Bishop Emeritus Frank Joseph Rodimer went to his eternal rest with God last Thursday, December 6, 2018. He was waked in St. John the Baptist Cathedral on Friday from 2:00 PM until 7:00 PM, and his Funeral Mass was celebrated on Saturday at 10:00 AM. It was in this Cathedral that Bishop Rodimer was ordained to the priesthood in 1951. He left our world, but he left our Diocese of Paterson with a rich history. He was the sixth Bishop of Paterson.

As bishop, he served as shepherd of our diocese for 26 years until his retirement in May 2004. During his ministry as bishop, he established 12 new parishes, ordained 91 priests and 179 permanent deacons and confirmed more than 100,000 Catholics. Like any leader, he had to weather a variety of seasons. Most notable the sexual abuse scandal and the crisis it has caused the Catholic Church throughout the world. On the other hand, Bishop Rodimer was energetic about liturgy and the proper worship of our God.

We all have our individual stories of Bishop Rodimer. To me he was a gracious, understanding and welcoming person. Every Christmas I received a personal, handwritten greeting with words of encouragement and gratitude. When he visited Rome to meet with our Holy Father and give his report to the Roman Curia (it consists of 56 offices) he found time to send me a greetings postcard with an assurance of his prayers and blessings. He wanted me to do my level best for the good of our people in the Paterson Diocese. I experienced his trust and confidence in me.

Advent time reminds us of our preparation for the Coming of the Lord. I believe that our late Bishop Frank Joseph Rodimer was worthily prepared and looked forward to going home to our Lord. May he enjoy eternal rest with the Angels and Saints in heaven.

ROTARY SEEKS STUDENTS FOR 3 WEEK EXCHANGE WITH JAPAN

Rotary District 7475 is looking for students ages 15 to 18 to participate in a unique three-week trip to southern Japan. The Rotary Short-Term Youth Exchange to Japan (STYE) now in its 41st year, provides an in-depth cultural experience that cannot be duplicated as a tourist.

If you know students who may be interested in this trip, please send this information to them ASAP.

The exchange is expected to depart Thursday, June 27, 2019, and return Thursday, July 18. The trip gives students the opportunity to experience Japanese culture, interact with Japanese students and families, visit local high schools, participate in home-stays, and form friendships that will last a lifetime.

The group will visit major cities in southern Japan including Osaka, Kyoto, Nara and Hiroshima. The students will then move to the island of Shikoku where they will enjoy four home-stays with local Japanese Rotarian families.

The all-inclusive cost of the trip is \$3,000 (this includes airfare). Students are selected through an interview process which will take place in February and March. Applications are now being accepted. Interviews are scheduled based upon the order the applications are received.

Weekly Reflections

Third Sunday of Advent Luke 3:10-18

Advent is a season of Joy. We celebrate the time of waiting in the expectation of God being with us, entering time and staying with us. In today’s Old Testament reading, Zephaniah wrote “the Lord is in your midst. You have no more misfortune to fear.” In today’s Gospel, Luke reveals John preaching the Good News to his people - that the promise of the Old Testament, made to the people of God, was being fulfilled; that John told his followers, “...one mightier than I is coming,” i.e., that God is entering time, that He is coming to walk with them (us), but also that they must live up to the Commandments set down to our forefathers. That is why we are celebrating Advent as the season of Joy. The “Good News” can’t get better than this, that we are not left to struggle through life alone, that we have a friend, not just in high places, but One who is in our place. He is with us!

How do we react to all this “Good News”? Does this change our life? Do we feel His presence? Do we stop to think how this News does change our life? Let us rejoice, we are blessed. We don’t have to go it alone. The birth of every child brings joy to a family. This quiet birth, we celebrate, rocked the world, it changed everything. Joseph and Mary, that young couple, who possessed only what they had on their backs, felt this joy at the birth of their Son. Our Savior. To others, they looked like they had nothing; yet, they had everything.

Lord, let us feel your presence in our daily life this Advent season. Oh come, oh come, Emmanuel!

EVANGELIZATION CORNER



Many of us seem to spend a lot of our lives focusing on the future, concerned with approaching events and preparing for what might be coming. However, in focusing on the future we can easily miss appreciating what is happening right here and right now. This is especially true of Advent. With the peace and joy of Christmas in the air, Advent runs the risk of being overlooked or forgotten.

But the season of Advent reminds us of the importance of living in the present moment, renewing our lives in God’s grace. It calls us to determine for what and for whom we will live and to allow these convictions to determine our focus, to mold our lives and to shape our journey today; a journey that will lead us to our eventual destination.

On this the third Sunday in Advent, ‘Gaudete Sunday’, we are reminded that Advent is a journey of hope and that we are called to rejoice in this hope. Pope Francis reminds us that, *“For the great human family it is necessary to renew always the common horizon toward which we are journeying. The horizon of hope!”*

The theme of Advent is clearly joy as we await the celebration of the birth of Jesus. It is also a time when our hearts should be filled with hope and expectation for the coming of the Word made flesh. As John the Baptist found joy amidst his suffering when he heard the Good News that the Christ had appeared, we too should pause from our Advent penance to rejoice in the salvation that is drawing near.

The pink candle that we light on the Advent Wreath today, also known as the ‘Shepherds Candle’, reminds us of the joy of the shepherds in finding the Christ Child. It also reminds us that God sent the angels to proclaim His arrival to common man. Today God uses ordinary people, like us, to share this joy and to spread the good news of Christ with others. As Christians we have been made responsible for sharing Jesus’ message of love to all who need to hear it; the message of salvation through Him and His promise that He would one day return.

May His grace be with each of us as we continue on our journey with Christ.
