# September 13, 2020—24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

## Reading I: Sir 27:30-28:7

Wrath and anger are hateful things, yet the sinner hugs them tight.

The vengeful will suffer the LORD's vengeance,

for he remembers their sins in detail. Forgive your neighbor's injustice;

then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven.

Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the LORD?

Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself.

can he seek pardon for his own sins? If one who is but flesh cherishes wrath, who will forgive his sins?

Remember your last days, set enmity aside; remember death and decay, and cease from sin!

Think of the commandments, hate not your neighbor;

remember the Most High's covenant, and overlook faults.

#### Reading II: Rom 14:7-9

**Brothers and sisters:** 

None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself.

For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord;

so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.

For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

### Gospel-Mt 18:21-35

Peter approached Jesus and asked him, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive?

As many as seven times?"

Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times.

That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king

who decided to settle accounts with his servants.

When he began the accounting,

a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount.

Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold,

along with his wife, his children, and all his property,

in payment of the debt.

At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said,

'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.'

Moved with compassion the master of that servant

let him go and forgave him the loan.

When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants

who owed him a much smaller amount.

He seized him and started to choke him,
demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.'

Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged
him.

'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.'
But he refused.

Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt.

Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened,

they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master

and reported the whole affair.

His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant!

I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to.

Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant,

as I had pity on you?'

Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers

until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

# Scripture Reflection: From the Forgiven to the Forgiving

God's forgiveness is unlimited and unconditional, in both quantity and quality. When asked about the criteria and description of forgiveness, Jesus reminds Peter of the needs to forgive always (seventy-seven times) and "from the bottom of our heart".

God's forgiveness outsizes and outlasts our sinfulness. Just as nothing can stop God from loving us, so nothing can stop Him from forgiving us. As long as we, the sinners, have sincere contrite hearts and open ourselves to God, His love and forgiveness continue to flow into our lives and nurture our growth. We hurt ourselves when we fail to open our hearts to God's love and forgiveness. Our lives can easily be laden with guilt, hatred and anger when we fail to open ourselves to Him.

God forgives, but we need to dispose ourselves to being forgiven. Forgiveness is a two-way street not only between God, the forgiver, and us, the forgiven, but also among one another. In other words, once we experience God's forgiveness, we are called in turn to forgive others as God has done for us. The more we are forgiven, the more we should forgive those who offend us. We are both the forgiven and the forgiving. Our own experience of God's mercy is expressed in the way we forgive others. Only by doing so, we are able to liberate ourselves from the bitterness and anger caused by those who have offended and hurt us. God's love transforms us from being the forgiven to becoming the forgiving.

In my personal experience, revenge can satisfy my short-term need for satisfaction, but forgiveness can pave the way to inner peace, long-term fulfillment and freedom.

The deeper our wounds, the more difficult to forgive. Yet, that is exactly what Jesus invites His followers to do. Fr. Dam Nguyen
