


THE JOURNEY OF FAITH WITH

Fr. Matthew Oakland

Habemus Episcopum!

Six years ago, Bishop Joseph Tyson was transferred to the Diocese of Yakima to be their new shepherd. Since that time, we have only had one auxiliary bishop assisting Archbishop Sartain—Bishop Eusebio Elizondo. Near the end of Lent, it was announced that Pope Francis has appointed us a new auxiliary bishop!

Msgr. Daniel Mueggenborg is a priest of the Diocese of Tulsa in Oklahoma. In his almost 28 years of priestly ministry, Bishop-elect Mueggenborg has pastored parishes, worked in



Bishops have certain symbols of their office, most of which are only used during the Liturgy. The mitre (the pointy hat) and the crozier (the staff) are symbols of their authority as shepherds to the flock entrusted to them. They wear a ring, a symbol of their union to the diocese, which usually has their coat of arms on it (harkening back to a time when it was used to seal documents). Bishops also always wear a large pectoral cross on a chain around their neck. Archbishops, bishops of larger dioceses, also wear a pallium—a band of wool around their neck with five crosses for the wounds of Christ and three nails. None of these are worn until the priest is ordained a bishop, as it is during the Ordination Rite that he is given these signs of his office.

[Fun story interlude: St. Nicholas (yes, that St. Nicholas) was at the Council of Nicaea in 325AD. Fr. Arius was advocating the position that Jesus was created by the Father fully human. This is very different than what the Church teaches and proclaimed at Nicaea—that Jesus is fully human but also fully divine, consubstantial with the Father. Fr. Arius created much confusion throughout the Church, with many following his teachings, including the emperor. Bishop Nicholas of Myra grew so upset with him that he actually punched him one day at the Council. The other bishops were so astounded that they removed from him the signs of the office of bishop—the Book of Gospels and the Pallium—and threw him in prison. When a group of bishops went to see him in the morning, they discovered that he had his Book of Gospels and pallium. When they asked where he got them, he informed that Jesus and Mary had appeared to him in the night and restored them to him. Needless to say, the bishops restored him to his office.]

Bishops also wear zucchettos—a skullcap which can be worn by all clergy. The color for bishops is magenta. The pope wears white and cardinals wear red. Priests can wear black ones—although this is not common. Bishop-elect Mueggenborg could begin wearing a magenta skullcap during liturgies as soon as his appointment was announced. I happened to be the Master of Ceremonies for the Archbishop at the Chrism Mass this year. That was the day that the announcement was made, and Msgr. Mueggenborg was present. Before Mass, Archbishop Sartain gave him one of his

zucchettos to wear. As he took it, he held it in his hands and looked at it. He hesitated before putting it on. It was all becoming very real for him—the reality of his calling. Please pray for him, that he may be a good and faithful shepherd for us all, assisting Archbishop Sartain and leading us to Heaven.

Msgr. Mueggenborg will be ordained a bishop on May 31st at 2PM at St. James Cathedral. Anyone can attend—but be sure to come extra early to get a seat if you do.



May is Mental Health Awareness Month

Our faith communities can be an important part of the support and recovery process through education, support and by helping individuals and families feel part of a caring community. As part of this, I wanted to bring something to your attention. Netflix has recently released a series that seems to be garnering attention from teens and young adults. Many churches are urging parents to familiarize yourself with the series "13 Reasons Why," based on a young adult novel. Many teenagers are watching this, sometimes one episode after another.

According to information referred to us by the Archdiocese, the series includes mature content on several levels including language and situations that may not be suitable for teen viewing. Although the series is intended to bring to light circumstances and serious content leading to the character's suicide, it may have an unintended effect of glorifying suicide among teens. I urge you to visit the Catholic News Agency online for an important overview, along with interpretation by mental health and Catholic professionals.

Overall this is an opportunity for family conversation and to offer guidance, to stress values and remind everyone of God's love for all His children.
