Can I Get a Witness?

In the last couple of weeks I have watched several movies. The first was called <u>The Scarlet and the Black</u>, the story of Msgr. Hugh O'Flaherty—an Irish priest working at the Vatican during World War 2. He played an instrumental role in hiding allied soldiers during the Nazi occupation. The movie is almost entirely historically accurate—with only a few slight changes discovered by reading the book itself. He was a man of great courage, and of great faith.

I also watched a Russian movie called <u>The Island</u>, about an Eastern Orthodox monk named Father Anatoly. He is a man who is searching for mercy and forgiveness for his past crime. It is a beautiful story of God's mercy and grace —which sometimes is easier to discover for others than it is for ourselves. He is renowned for his holiness—so much so that people come in search of him from the local villages and towns and beyond.

Finally, this Sunday, on the anniversary of St. Oscar Romero's death, I watched the old film about him—<u>Romero</u>. It covers nicely the story of his life as archbishop, accurately portraying his life as one of encountering the poverty and injustice around him. Unlike some of those around him, he did not embrace the liberation theology of some of those who were fighting for justice, realizing that it comes at the cost of other injustice. He was declared a martyr and was canonized this past fall—being assassinated while celebrating Mass.

During the Season of Lent—we seek to draw near to Jesus Christ in the desert. He was a very different sort of witness, which was part of the reason for His rejection. Rejecting power. Casting aside fame. Commanding others to love. Stooping to wash the feet of others. A life of sacrifice—lived not for Himself, but others. Culminating on the Cross—where stripped of everything—literally, everything, even His clothes, He was lifted up. Rejected by the world, seemingly abandoned by God—He was no longer of earth or of Heaven. He occupied that middle space. As He died. For us. And not just died for us—but He freely gave up His life for us as He embraced the Cross.

In some ways, the Cross is too normalized for us. It's even sanitized usually—nice and clean except for one cut on his side, though in some countries the body of our Lord is more correctly blood stained.

During the Lent—the Cross needs to become real for us. Because it is our salvation. It is our hope. It is His promise. And the only way for that to happen is for us to truly enter into the mystery of these coming days.

Every year at this time, the statues and icons are covered as we join with Christ during His final days. No death and Resurrection means no Heaven yet, and no saints. Normally the Cross would be covered as well—but we haven't found a way to do that. Until this year! One of our parishioners set himself to the task, and working together they will bring their plans to fruition.

The veils are always startling, and will be even more so this year. And perhaps it will help us to enter into the mystery more—to see the horror and beauty of the Cross for what it is—the death of Jesus Christ, the death of the Son of God, the gift of His love for us.

This is the witness of the Crucifix. It is why we, along with St. Paul, proclaim Christ crucified. This was how He showed His love—as He bore witness, giving all.

Its good to ask what our lives bear witness to as well. Sometimes we are keenly aware of the messages we are communicating in word and deed. Most of the time, we aren't. We don't know the impact we have on others. All the more reason to ensure that we draw closer to Christ—that we may learn from Him, and that we may live for the Father as did He. We need to be changed and transformed by His love, and the only way to do that is to enter into the mystery of the Cross.

These days are the holiest of the year—or at least, they can be—if we are willing to go where it is difficult and hard. And so, my brothers and sisters, let us with Christ set our face toward Jerusalem, and go with Him to Calvary.

School Highlights & Events

Our 1st graders had their field trip to the International District. They visited the Wing Luke Museum and had dim sum together at House of Hong. The other half of our 7th grade completed their afternoon retreat and service experience at St. James Cathedral. Thank you to parent, Patrick Barredo for helping to make this visit so meaningful for our 7th graders.

In 3rd grade this week, students were tested on North Central Regions states and their abbreviations. Students also learned about the types of work transportation engineers do and will begin learning about maglev trains and how the maglev transportation system works. This week also began the first round of oral biography reports that our 4th grade students have been working so hard on. This assignment was a challenging one that incorporated a variety of skills – research, writing, public speaking, and creativity (visual aid, costume).

Fifth-grade students began a unit in Engineering titled: Aerospace Engineering, Designing Parachutes. The unit introduces the field of aerospace engineering by guiding students to explore how aerospace engineers design and test technologies to be used in non-Earth environments. Hands-on activities, discussions, and readings are used to introduce students to the Engineering Design Process. Fifth-grade students are also in their 2nd week of Book Clubs, enjoying small group discussion on their reading. Students take turns leading group discussion.

Holy Rosary has a rolling admissions process with just a few spots still available in our Preschool 2s class. The Preschool 2s class is a drop-off class that meets on Mondays and Fridays from 8:30am-11:00am, students must be age 2.5 by August 31st. Monthly tuition is \$281 - application information can be found on our homepage (holyrosaryws.org).

At Holy Rosary School, tradition and innovation converge to provide a leading-edge education that is grounded in the Catholic faith. Students are engaged by enthusiastic teachers who provide hands-on curricula designed to spark creativity and encourage critical thinking. 
St. Vincent de Paul

her to the Roman authorities as a Christian, leading to her torture and execution. Because her eyes were gouged as part of her torture, she is patron of the blind and anyone with eye ailments. Her feast is on December 13.


