

### Corpus Christi

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. At every single Mass, through the prayers of the priest and the power of the Holy Spirit, the bread and wine are changed and transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. The Eucharist is the abiding presence of God in the world, as well as the nourishment we need to draw closer to Him and live in Him.

As the Easter season has drawn to a close, our Easter candle has returned to the Baptismal Font. If you look closely at the candle,

you will see the usual signs: the Cross, with the year, topped by an A and an O. In the Greek Alphabet, the first letter is the Alpha, and the last is the Omega. Jesus is the beginning and the end, so the A and the O are symbols of Christ.

Above the cross on our Paschal Candle the artist included a Pelican this year. A Pelican is another symbol of Christ, and of the Eucharist. The Pelican was believed to wound itself in order to feed its young. So too, Christ has offered His life, and His body, for us on the Cross, and feeds us in the Eucharist. On your way into Church next Sunday, take a closer look at our new Easter Candle.

### Clergy Sexual Abuse Legal Updates

This past November, the US Bishops met for their usual fall meeting and discussed some proposals to strengthen the Dallas Charter, enacted in 2002, for the Protection of Children and Young People. Recent allegations in the news, in particular with Theodore McCarrick, recently removed from the College of Cardinals, showed some weak aspects of the law with regard to bishop accountability. The Vatican asked the bishops not to proceed, in part because of a universal gathering in Rome in February on the same topic, and in part because not all of the proposals had been vetted with current universal church law.

After the meeting in February, Pope Francis issued a new set of laws entitled *Vos estis lux mundi* (You are the light of the world). The new laws:

- Mandate that every diocese have in place a public and accessible reporting mechanism for abuse or cover ups.
- Mandate priests and bishops to report all accusations of abuse or cover up by a cleric or religious. It also mandates dioceses notify the Vatican, and that the Vatican must respond within 30 days with any particular guidance regarding the investigation. Investigations must be completed within 90 days. At present, an investigation takes place first, and if it is found to be credible, only then does the bishop petition the Vatican for action—removal from the clerical state or permanent prayer and penance.
- Mandate that Vatican offices that receive an allegation (depending on who the allegation is against it would go to a different department to oversee) notify all other concerned offices, as well as the Secretariat of State.
- Create a process for handling allegations against bishops, which will be handled in the regional metropolitan archdiocese; unless it is in the archdiocese itself, in which case it will be handled by the senior suffragen diocese.
- Create new statutes, including the cover up of abuse by a bishop or priest, whether by negligence, incompetence or malice, including cover ups that interfere with or avoid civil investigations or canonical investigations. Also, it elevates the severity of sexual acts coerced through abuse of authority, regardless of the victims age, whereas previous emphasis was just on minors.
- Make clear that church investigations are separate from criminal investigations, and a mandate is still in force to follow applicable civil laws, particularly those concerning any reporting obligations to the civil authorities.

The effects of these new laws will likely be felt most outside of Western countries, who have had much of the above in place. However, there are some new additions, as well as new force behind some previous laws. As such, last week, when the US Bishops gathered for their annual spring meeting, they adopted additional local implementations of these new laws, many of which were in consideration at their November meeting, including:

- A new, independent national hotline for accusations of abuse or cover up by a bishop.
- Pope Francis' new laws allow for the inclusion of lay experts in the investigation. The US Bishop's norms mandate the inclusion of lay experts in the investigation.
- New accountability measures for retired bishops who have resigned or been removed from office due to "grave acts of commission or omission." At present, some of these bishops are restricted from public ministry, and others are not. This document gives the local bishop the authority to restrict their ministry, as well as an avenue for a petition to Rome for a wider prohibition, as well as the authority of the Conference President to restrict such bishops from their annual meetings.



# A weekly tip on Caring for Our Common Home

During warm summer months, consider installing blackout curtains on windows that face the sun. Typically used to keep rooms dark during the day, the light-colored backing on these curtains is more effective at reflecting light and so can decrease your home's heat gain by as much as one-third. For best results, draw the curtains before the sun shines directly on a window.

# Saint of the Week

Every week, we highlight a particular saint. This week, we remember St. John the Baptist. Most saints' feasts are on the day of their death, because that is when they entered Heaven; but we also celebrate the birthday (or "nativity") of



exactly two saints: the Blessed Virgin Mary and John the Baptist. This is because our Blessed Mother was purified from Original Sin at the moment of her conception and John the Baptist was purified in a similar way when he was six months in the womb, when Mary – herself newly pregnant with Jesus – visited his mother Elizabeth. (Read the first chapter of the Gospel of Luke for the whole story.) We celebrate the Nativity of John the Baptist on June 24.


