

What is wrong with us?

Another weekend. More news of mass shootings—of lives violently ended, of families and friends left with holes in their lives. Grief and sorrow are shared around the nation and beyond—as friends and relatives contact loved ones in those towns most affected, as the violence strikes closer to home, as it feels real for us all.

Mass shootings tend to get our attention, as they should. Its hard not to pay attention when 22 people were killed in El Paso and 10 were killed in Dayton. And then you add in the dozens of physically wounded and countless emotionally afflicted. And that is just this weekend's mass

shootings. I still remember where I was when I heard the news of Columbine. I was sitting in my own high school seat, and I remember trying to think of which nearby town Columbine High School was in—it felt very close.



We also try to solve the problem. How can we not? We look at who and what is to blame. Rallies are held. Conversations happen, locally and nationally, as we talk about policies and procedures, and sometimes even pass legislation. These can be good things. Background checks help ensure that those obtaining new guns don't have a violent history, a restraining order, etc. Policies and procedures can be helpful—but they aren't nearly enough. And sometimes, they are more of a distraction.

In 2016, according to the FBI, 374 people were killed with a rifle—including 49 at the Orlando Pulse Night Club. That same year, 472 people were killed with a blunt object, like a club or hammer; 656 were killed with personal weapons such as fists or feet; 1,604 were killed with knives or other cutting instruments; and 7,105 were killed with a handgun. [The FBI report also identified 3,077 by firearms—type not specified, as well as 903 other weapons or weapons not stated. While some of these are very likely rifles, statistically speaking when comparing known handgun vs rifle numbers, it is likely a very small portion—about 5%, putting rifles at fewer deaths than those with hands/fists/feet/etc.] I'm not saying we should or shouldn't ban rifles. I am saying that I don't think that lowering casualties at a mass shooting should be our main goal. I think we are missing the forest for the trees.

Here in Seattle, the Transportation Department has a Vision Zero goal. And whether you like their individual choices or not, eliminating all traffic deaths is a laudable goal. It doesn't seem like we have that same sort of goal in with regard to violent deaths. Some states have already passed such laws—yet violent deaths persist.

Yes, it is complicated. Yes, there are two main branches of motivations—anger and mental illness. Yes, even a single action/actor usually has multiple influences/motives. But why aren't we thinking bigger? Why aren't we acknowledging the full spectrum of the problem? Why don't the rest of the violent deaths haunt us and spur us to action the way the mass shootings do?

What would a Vision Zero look like in terms of addressing violent death due to anger? How do we address the violence, hatred, disrespect, belittling, and dismissiveness which can be found in countless human hearts in our nation to varying degrees, and yes, on some lips and with some hands? How do we strike at the very heart of the matter?

What would Vision Zero look like in terms of addressing mental illness? Not just taking away one tool for suicide or homicide in the event that a friend, family member or police officer raises a red flag. But truly, really, addressing the reality of mental illness that is prevalent in society—before it gets to that? How do we strike at the very heart of the matter?

Guns are a problem. But so are knives and human hands. What each of these has in common is the broken or corrupted human heart. Yes, lets talk about guns—because that is an easier answer/solution in some ways. It's a starting place. But nothing will really change until we go deeper, and are more honest. Because truth be told—violence rages within us all. That is the very nature of sin—violence against God, against one another, against ourselves and our human dignity. Evil in general leads to brokenness in the world. And until we acknowledge and address that—all efforts will ultimately fail. If sin and evil are what are truly wrong—can any policy or procedure really fix it? They can help—but ultimately, there is only one Savior. It isn't merely a pious answer. Jesus has a lot to teach us about love, about respect, about caring for one another, about caring for the least of these, about addressing injustice, about helping the poor, about treating others who are different than us or have different opinions/beliefs. So to what/whom will you look for salvation?





Two dates: Saturday, September 7th at 9am or Wednesday, September 11th at 6pm. Both will be held in the School Hall. Register beforehand to make sure you receive credit for the course. Holy Rosary has a rolling admissions process with just two spots still available in our Preschool 2s class. The Preschool 2s class is a drop-off class that meets on Mondays and Fridays from 8:30am-11:00am, students must be age 2.5 by August 31st. Time for **Altar Server** training! This is for **new** and **continuing** altar servers. Training is required in order to serve. Girls and boys in grades 5 thru High School can serve the holy people of God during Mass. **Altar Servers** assist the whole church in praying. They carry the crucifix, candles and books at Mass. They prepare the altar so that bread and wine can become the Body and Blood of Christ! The priests and the other ministers who help us celebrate the Mass rely on the altar servers so that we can all receive Christ by hearing the Word of God and receiving the Eucharist. Servers are trained after school or in the evening. Current altar servers receive follow-up training. Older altar servers can become MC's (Master of Ceremonies) and lead the other servers at Mass!

Holy Rosary School is Hiring


