

Giving with Righteousness...and Wisdom!

This coming week we will pause for a moment of gratitude to God for all that He has given us. But the best form of gratitude is the way we use those gifts—for our good, and the good of others.

“Almsgiving with righteousness is better than wealth with wickedness. It is better to give alms than to store up gold, for almsgiving saves from death, and purges all sin. Those who give alms will enjoy a full life. (Tobit 12:8-9)

“Almsgiving saves from death.” That is a pretty good reason to give—but only if with righteousness. We can also do so in ways which are financially wise, as good stewards, and therefore allow us to be even more generous. There are ways to make donations go even further.

- Donate stock or mutual funds held for at least one year and realize special tax advantages, receiving a tax deduction for the full market value of the gift while avoiding capital gains tax on the appreciation.
- Apply for a matching gift if your company has no religious restrictions on matching donations. If they do, sometimes you can still match your giving to the parish as long as the matched funds go to our Outreach Ministries or our School, for example. It can't hurt to inquire—it can only help!
- Individuals over 70½ years old must take a minimum distribution every year from their IRA. If it is a traditional IRA (not a Roth IRA), the distribution is taxed as income. However, if you direct your traditional IRA to make a distribution directly to a non-profit (such as the church, the ACA, CTSAC, etc), that amount counts towards your minimum distribution and is not taxed as personal income. However, it can't be itemized, either.
- The new IRS tax law established new, higher standard deductions—\$12,400 for single filers, \$24,800 for married couples, and \$18,650 for heads of household. There are some other variations, such as for children, etc. If you plan on making some sizable donations over the next two years, you could consider doing so in a lump sum, or “bundling” them into one year if this will exceed the standard deduction and thus potentially providing tax savings. If you do so, it is helpful to the various groups to do keep fiscal years in mind if possible for consistency.

For example, if you are bundling in 2020, making any 2021 donations before December 31, 2020. Although your donation would be credited to 2020 for tax purposes, we can post it in our financials as 2020 and/or 2021 according to your wishes. While normally individuals may only deduct up to 60% of their Adjusted Gross Income, the CARES Act changed it to 100% of AGI for 2020, excluding DAFs, stock and mutual fund gifts.

- For those who take the standard deduction and therefore do not receive tax credit for their donations, the CARES Act also included a special \$300 charitable contribution deduction for 2020.
 - A Donor Advised Fund (DAF) is an irrevocable charity fund that you can set up with certain banks or financial firms to facilitate and provide flexibility in your charitable giving. Generally you fund the charity account with a lump sum that will be donations paid over years. You get the tax deduction the year that you fund the charity account, increasing the likelihood of exceeding the standard deduction in that year and potentially providing additional tax savings. The flexibility is that you can invest the funds while in the charity account, and distribute the funds for donations at your discretion over any length of time and to multiple charities.
 - 529 college savings plans can also now be used for private elementary and high school expenses, as well as homeschooling. Instead of paying Catholic school tuition directly, funds can be put into a qualified tuition plan for the benefit of a particular person, reducing your taxable income. The funds are invested at your discretion depending upon your personal risk preference, with an allowable distribution of up to \$10,000 per year for education expenses, including tuition, books, curriculum, etc.

Gospel Reflection for The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ

In the *Judgement of Nations* (Matthew 25.31-46), Matthew recounts a story Jesus told to his disciples in which He attempts to impress upon them the correlation between treating their fellow man with respect and showing respect to God. ‘Amen, I

say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me.’ Likewise, Matthew tells us that Jesus also made it clear that neglecting to treat those around us with kindness, will be admonished.

When I read this story two things immediately stick out. The first is that by equating our treatment of others to our treatment of God, Jesus tells us that God and man are not discrete entities, instead we are connected with each other. In this way it reminds me of a parent watching their children interact: even though the parent may not appear to be involved, they are deeply affected by the care (or lack thereof) that their children show each other.

My second takeaway from this story is who is meant to perform the judging. Jesus specifically tells his disciples that the ‘*Son of Man*’ will do the judging. I think that this is an extremely important point that as people we continue to neglect (or in some cases intentionally ignore). It is not our role to judge, rather our role is much simpler: treat those around us with dignity and respect. To me the interesting part is that many will agree with that notion, *Leave the judgement to God* is a popular colloquialism after all, however how often do we actually do this? Different way of life than us? Bad. Different political party? Bad. 49ers fans? Okay, well, that is bad, but you get the point.
