

### The Journey of Faith with Father Oakland

Earthly definitions of justice always fail—because they are shaded by the fallenness of humanity. This was true in the so called "Enlightenment," and is still true today.

This weekend we commemorate Martin Luther King, Jr, who asked that he and others like him be treated justly. At our nation's foundation, slaves were codified as less than a person—3/5ths of one to be exact. These Black people were property to be bought or sold and used at will. In 1776 they didn't even have the right to not be killed by their 'owners,' something outlawed decades later, with exceptions and hurdles.

It would be 86 years from our foundation before slavery was abolished. A little over 100 years later, despite great ideals, human understanding and application still failed to deliver equality and justice for all when it came to the African American community (and others). Hence the non-violent movement Martin Luther King, Jr. and others led to bring about change, and the fuller realization that we are all brothers and sisters. Their successes are unquestionable, coming at great human cost, as is the fact that equality and justice are still lacking in our nation. Our notions of justice—in law, in practice and in the way we treat others—are still flawed.

Despite progress at the state level, this past summer the federal government resumed the practice of carrying out the death penalty after a 17 year hiatus. Since then, 13 individuals have been executed by the federal government, including one this morning. While there is no question that some people commit atrocious crimes, there are valid questions to ask. Since 1970, <u>173 people</u> on death row have been exonerated as innocent, most of which included official misconduct, known perjury and/ or false accusations. It isn't a question of if innocent individuals have been executed by our justice system. but how many?

There are also those who are threatened with the death penalty and accept a plea deal to preserve their life. In 2019 alone, 19 such individuals were freed after being found to be innocent. While we would like to believe that our laws, their application, representation and the process are all fair and just and blind like Lady Liberty herself, that is unfortunately not true.

But even the state execution of guilty individuals should trouble us as well. It is not a question of the severity of the crime, but of the right of the state to take someone's life, especially when we have the ability to defend our society from them without doing so. Nothing can make

up for what they have done. But that doesn't give the state the moral right to take life guilty or innocent. As the Catechism now states. "Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not

lost even after the



commission of very serious crimes... Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person." (2267)

17 years ago this week I myself was at the US Capitol to join a non-violent protest with hundreds of thousands of others. The March for Life happens at capitols and in major cities throughout the nation near the anniversary of the Supreme Court decision which legalized the taking of children's lives in the womb. But their dignity, value and worth is not dependent upon if they are wanted, if they are the right gender, or if they don't have any 'defects' - but only upon the fact they exist, a life within a life. A month after conception, the heart beats!

I will not pretend that there are complexities and challenges. Almost 10 years ago, Catholic Community Services started a program called Prepares to better assist and accompany pregnant and parenting women, men and families who lack a support network through the child's fifth birthday. Similarly, their adoption services find new families for those children whom parent/s feel they aren't able to care for and raise.

Because as Pope Francis noted recently in his booklength interview Let Us Dream, "Abortion is a grave injustice. It can never be a legitimate expression of autonomy and power. If our autonomy requires the death of others, then that autonomy of ours is nothing more than an iron cage. I often ask myself two questions: Is it right to eliminate a human life in order to solve a problem? And is it right to hire a hitman in order to solve a problem?"

When speaking about abortion, he often notes that it is not a religious question/problem—it is human one. That is true of each of these questions and the many others—Do we as individuals and as a nation uphold the dignity of all people? No matter the race, no matter their actions, no matter the stage of life or vulnerability— dignity from beginning to end? When will we realize justice and equality for all?
