

### The Journey of Faith with

### Fr. Matthew Oakland

### All Saints Day—November 1st

Growing up, I remember very few of my Halloween costumes. I was a pilot one year—and fashioned an airplane out of a box. I was Clifford one year—the big red dog. I remember being Frankenstein and wearing my dad's sports coat. Now, All Hallow's Eve consists of dinner with some friends, and then we watch "It's The Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown" and Mel Brooks' "Young Frankenstein."

What takes place in our society on the eve of All Saints Days has little to do with the saints. In the Church, we usually use the term to refer to those 12,000+ individuals officially declared to be in Heaven. Every day of the year, there are 10-20 saints or groups of saints who were canonized or martyred together that are celebrated on that day. But everyone in Heaven is a saint whether they are formally canonized and declared to be known there by the Church, or not. So on November 1st, we set aside a day to honor everyone in Heaven who are models of holiness for us, and intercessors along our own journey to Heaven. They are all so different—married and ordained, religious and single, young and old, men and women, boys and girls of every generation. Doctors and nurses, teachers and architects, artists and farmers, parents and widows. This feast gives us hope that others have gone before, and we can follow after.

The early version of Trick or Treating involved going door to door for "soul cakes" which are fluffy buns used in exchange for prayers for deceased loved ones. This year, besides what have become the secular festivities, make November 1st a true Feast in your home—as it is in the Church, as we celebrate the saints. Our fourth graders will dress up like a chosen saint and spend some time telling their stories this weekend and in the days ahead. Read up on some of the saints, and find inspiration in these holy people—as we strive to be holy ourselves. Perhaps have everyone at the table tell the story of their favorite saint. Or in an act of charity, donate some of your candy to some of the local dentists who pass it onto others, in particular to those who send them in care packages to overseas military personnel.

### All Souls Day— November 2nd

The truth is that when we die, we are not perfect. And death does not make us perfect. And "northing imperfect can



enter Heaven." (Revelation 21:27) Thankfully, a mud room exists—a place where we are on our way, and almost there, where we can clean up a bit before entering into the House of the Lord. This is Purgatory. Many of the saints even note how the soul freely chooses Purgatory, knowing it isn't ready for communion with Christ.

On November 2nd, we pray for those who have died. For those awaiting the final glory of Heaven, who are in the mud room still being purified, we can help and assist them by our prayers. The beauty of the Church is that we are united—those in Heaven, those in Purgatory, and those on earth. During the month of November, we pray for the dead. We do so in a special way on November 2nd.

During the month of November it is a good time to visit cemeteries and pray for those who have died. The Church often uses Psalm 130 in praying for the dead. Whenever I am up at Holyrood I stop by the mausoleum where the bishops are buried and say a prayer for them. I had some friends who had a miscarriage, and we buried the baby in the Holy Innocents section at Holyrood for the little ones who have died. It is heartbreaking to see the names, and the dates—with so few days, weeks, months or years. I always stop by Faustina's grave and say a prayer for her and her parents, as well. There are many souls who are forgotten, whom no one is praying for. It is good to pray for them; hence you can visit a cemetery and pray for those who have died without knowing many people buried there.

### **WEEKLY REFLECTION**

### THE LIFE OF THE SAINTS

Happy All Saints Day!

This week we celebrate All Saints Day, which is a holy day that is dedicated to all the saints in Heaven! This means that we celebrate *everyone* in Heaven, not just canonized saints! However, we especially are encouraged to look to the lives of canonized saints as they are an incredible model of how to live as faithful children of God. As Catholics, we are all called to be saints by God and He has laid out a path for each of us to achieve sainthood!

We are all called to be saints. But how exactly do we begin to undertake this seemingly daunting task? Lucky for us, we have the lives of many saints as a model to guide us. It is important to understand that sainthood is not a state of being that is reserved for the most holy or most faithful Catholics. Anyone and everyone can be a saint! In fact, all of the greatest saints were once ordinary people, who like us struggled with many things such as sin, temptation, and worldly affairs. In this sense, a saint is an



ordinary person who is made extraordinary by God, through the acceptance of His grace into their lives. Therefore, looking to them as an example is an excellent way to start striving for sainthood. St. Joan of Arc, a peasant girl of only nineteen years of age, led a French army into many battles, igniting the cause of driving the English out of French territory. When asked by many why she would leave the comforts of her home and risk her life, Joan responded "must I go and must I do this thing, for my Lord wills that I do so." After many victorious battles, St. Joan of Arc was eventually captured by the British and burned at the stake because she refused to renounce the Lord and the mission He gave her. St. Maximillian Kolbe was visited by the Virgin Mary who presented him two crowns: a white crown that meant he should persevere in purity, and a red crown meaning that he would become a martyr. When asked if he would accept either of these crowns, St. Maximillian Kolbe said "I would accept both." St. Maximillian Kolbe was eventually arrested by the German Gestapo for hiding Jews in his monastery during WWII, and taken to Auschwitz. During his time there he prayed with the other prisoners, and later, laid his life down for a man with a family, taking his place to be executed.

Sometimes looking at the life of such heroic saints can make us feel like we could never live up to them. But when we really reflect on their lives, it becomes very clear; the simplicity of their heroic actions. God had simply asked these saints to carry out His will, which is exactly what they did! Most of us will not be called to this type of heroism in our lives, but that does not mean we should not strive to lay down our lives for Christ in the ways that God calls us to. God will ask us to carry out His will having full knowledge of our own human capabilities and limitations, for he knows us better than anyone. He will challenge us, but He will never abandon us in our trials.

In this way, we strive for sainthood on earth: by saying "yes" to God every day and accepting his will, which is far better than anything we could have come up with ourselves. Finally, we ask for the intercession of all the saints in heaven to help us run the race to eternal life.


