Christ Is Anything but Ordinary

We're about to dive headlong into week two of **Ordinary Time**, and we need to admit, after the hustle and bustle of the holidays, things are indeed looking more ... ordinary, at least in our spiritual lives.

The transcendent highs of the Christmas season are flatlining a bit and the vivid imagery of the Nativity scene has faded. The solemn anticipation of the Advent season is by now a distant memory.

Are you bored yet? Here's a secret: I think that Ordinary (numbered) Time can actually be quite extraordinary, if we're really living out our baptismal call.

In today's Gospel, Jesus point-blank asks Andrew, who is following him after hearing John the Baptist's testimony: **What are you looking for?** He's asking us the same question.

What are you looking for?

Why are you following me?

- Is it for the Christmas cookies and the Advent carols?
- Is it for the King's Cake on the Epiphany?
- Is it for the feeling we get on Christmas when we just know God has done a wondrous thing?

None of those things are bad, but they are not what Andrew was looking for, and they were not what Christ promised him when he said, **Come, and you will see.** Andrew was looking for the Messiah — the One who makes even Ordinary Time extraordinary. The One who can sanctify the longest and dullest of to-do lists, on the longest and dullest of days. The One whose peace can reign in our homes on January 25, not just December 25.

Remember what you are looking for.





Second Sunday in Ordinary Time



The stories of the call of Samuel and of the first disciples in John’s Gospel help us begin to understand the nature of God’s call. It is not a work order from a distant God to carry out a specific task, but an invitation to participate in what God is already doing. The journey begins with God’s intentions and activity. After the initial moment of call, God is shown to be actively leading these ordinary people to partner in God’s work. For ourselves, we might not experience a single or dramatic moment of call. God’s call can take many forms. But like Samuel, and like Jesus’ disciples, we are invited into a relationship of trust and friendship with God. We too are invited to employ the gifts God has given us, always in dialogue with our God, in our daily lives.

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Your Servant Is Listening

We hear of young Samuel today, dedicated to a life of service to God, under the guidance of Eli, a Temple priest. Twice, Samuel hears the call of God and says **Here I am** to Eli. At last Eli recognizes that it is God who is calling Samuel. When Samuel hears

God a third time, Samuel does not say **Here I am**, but **Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening**. We can see a subtle shift as Samuel moves away from announcing his intention to serve and more clearly opens himself to God’s voice. Samuel allows God to take the initiative, and attends first to God’s intentions rather than his own.

Samuel’s story helps us to remember that accepting God’s call is not only about a new chapter in our personal story. Our acceptance is, more profoundly, a new moment in God’s story. Even in our smallest **yes**, God celebrates our partnership in God’s great work. Through our openness and acceptance, God has new opportunities to bring all of us into loving unity with God.



Speak, Lord, We Are Listening



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
In today’s first reading God keeps calling out in the night to a sleeping boy. Neither the boy, Samuel, nor his teacher, Eli, understands who is calling. But God’s persistence convinces them. Samuel is then ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. **Speak, for your servant is listening** (1 Sm 3:10).

In the Gospel Jesus is out teaching. Various people notice him and begin to gather around. They soon become disciples and, like the young Samuel, are ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. **Speak**, they say, **we are listening**.

God’s voice is always with us, awake or asleep. It swirls around us like fog on a waterfront, enveloping us, gently urging us to wake up, to listen. Awareness of the voice comes first; then willingness to listen; then, in time, the decision to act, to live according to God’s word. Let’s ask today for the ability to keep our ears open so we don’t miss God’s voice.

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Our Deepest Desires



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In today’s Gospel, we hear Jesus’ first spoken words in the Gospel of John: **What are you looking for?** This penetrating question reverberates throughout John’s Gospel. The disciples who form Jesus’ first community, and many others who meet Jesus during his life, are drawn to him, seeking something they can’t

quite name. As Jesus called and formed his community of disciples, he probed their hearts and allowed them to probe his heart. They shared their deepest needs, hopes, and commitments.

Jesus’ words might be directed to us, here and now. Sometimes we struggle to name what we really want. In our faith journey, in prayer and in lived experience, we learn to share our dreams and also to open our hearts to know God’s dreams. In time, with lots of practice, with many successes and failures, we learn to trust God to shape and to fulfill our deepest desires.

Protecting God's Children Safe Environment for Children

To take reasonable measures to assure that Church personnel comply with all required certifications and background checks for the purpose of providing a safe environment for children.

Diocesan Database & Regulations for all Ministries

All parish staff and volunteers including: Faith Formation - Catechists, Class Aides, R.C.I.A. Team, Youth Ministry; Liturgical and Music Ministry - Adult Servers, Cantors, Choir, Eucharistic Ministers, Lectors, Ushers; Parish Organizations - Christian Mothers/Women's Guild, Holy Name Society, Knight's of Columbus, Ladies of Charity, Rosary Society; Fund Raising - Festival, Fish Fry, Fund-Raising Worker, etc. are required by the USCCB, the Diocese of Pittsburgh and Saints Joachim and Anne Parish to be cleared in the following ways:

1. Be registered on the Diocesan Data Base.
2. Sign the Code of Pastoral Conduct.
3. Be cleared by the Department of Public Welfare.
4. Be cleared by the Pennsylvania State Police.
5. Attend Protecting God's Children Seminar.

The **Protecting God's Children Seminar** (an online 3 hour seminar) is a requirement of the National Conference of Bishops, Diocesan and Parish for all adults 18 years of age or older who are involved in the public ministry (work) of the church.

Feast of Faith: The Greeting

At several points during the liturgy, the presider greets us with the words, **The Lord be with you.** These simple words are not like the greetings that we exchange all day long—our **good mornings**, our **hellos** and **how are you**. This liturgical greeting has roots deep in the Old Testament. In the book of Ruth, the words **the Lord be with you** are spoken by Boaz to the harvesters who are laboring in his fields (2:4); in the book of Judges, an angel speaks similar words to Gideon (6:12), where they are words of promise: for soon Gideon will lead his oppressed people to victory and freedom. For us, the words become a greeting of peace, a prayer that the Lord will indeed be with us, and a reminder of his promise to be with us always, to the end of the world (Matthew 28:20). Our response—**And also with you**, soon to be “**And with your spirit**—returns to the presider this prayer for the Lord's presence. As we know from the scriptures, a prayer for the Lord's presence is no small thing, for when God comes in our midst, God brings healing, grace, and challenge. God's presence transforms us.

1 Samuel 3:3b-10, 19;

1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20; John 1:35-42

Lifestyles of the brave and mobile—Media coverage is thick concerning the lifestyles of the rich and famous. The lives of the truly heroic, on the other hand—faithful spouses, conscientious parents, the working poor, folks who turn their lives around after addiction or costly misdirection—are mostly hidden from view. Faithful discipleship requires effort, quiet persistence, and most of all, movement in the spirit. Followers don't stand still, unchangeable in opinions or behaviors. Growth is required. The terms of the deal are as follows: **Come —and see. Rabbi . . . where are you staying? He said to them, Come and you will see.**

Monday, Jan 18; Weekday

Hebrews 5:1-10; Mark 2:18-22

Abide your time this week—For more than 100 years, Christians around the world have been observing annually the **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity** (Jan. 18-25). For Catholics, this week is an opportunity to also ponder the **Decree on Ecumenism from Vatican II**. Is your diocese or parish participating in this healing effort? For resources, visit the **World Council of Churches at Week of Prayer for Christian Unity**. As you pray, call to mind this year's theme: **Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit. Can the wedding guests fast while the bridegroom is with them?**

Tuesday, Jan 19; Weekday

Hebrews 6:10-20; Mark 2:23-28

Pray the pope's prayer for peace—Exactly 60 years ago tomorrow, John F. Kennedy gave an inaugural address that quoted Romans 12:12, reminding citizens to be **rejoicing in hope, patient in tribulation**. One year later, Pope John XXIII became a secret intermediary between Kennedy and Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev, speaking a message of peace to the entire world during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Haunted by the experience, he penned his final encyclical, **Pacem in Terris**, stressing the church's Christian duty to address international issues of peace and human rights—speaking to all persons of **good will**, not only Catholics. Pray for peace and the perseverance of hope. **Hold fast to the hope that lies before us.**

Wednesday, Jan 20; Fabian, pope & martyr

Hebrews 7:1-3, 15-17; Mark 3:1-6

Be open to the Spirit of surprise—In the year 236, Fabian left his farm and headed to Rome. He wanted to be in town for the election of a new pope. The furthest thing from his mind, or anyone's mind, was that he would be elected. Legend holds that as clergy discussed worthy candidates, a dove landed on the head of bystander Fabian. Thinking it was a sign from the Holy Spirit, the crowd elected Fabian by acclamation. A kind and capable administrator, he had the respect of both the faith community and three different emperors in a period of rare

peace. Although that peace eventually ended and persecution cost him his life, Fabian's legacy endures. Be open to unexpected visitations of the Holy Spirit! **Come up here before us.**

Thursday, Jan 21; Agnes, virgin & martyr

Hebrews 7:25—8:6; Mark 3:7-12

Draw inspiration from women of faith—Today we honor both Saint Agnes, virgin and martyr, and, in some places, Our Lady of Altagracia, protectress of the Dominican Republic. The devotion to both grew from grassroots popularity; that is, ordinary Christians were moved by their stories and lifted them up for veneration. Saint Agnes was executed for her faith in the fourth century. Our Lady of Altagracia is an image of Mary in the Dominican Republic that, according to legend, kept mysteriously moving to an orange grove until a church was built there. Centuries later memories of both women continue to inspire the faithful. Take a moment to reflect on women of faith who inspire you. **Jesus is always able to save those who approach God through him.**

Friday, Jan 22; Weekday

Hebrews 8:6-13; Mark 3:13-19

Embracing your inner apostle—How many apostles did Jesus call? If you said 12, well, you are sort of correct. Indeed, Jesus appointed 12 followers to be his close companions, to learn from him, and to preach the Good News. But it doesn't stop at 12. Jesus continues to call forth apostles in the church. We have bishops who continue the mission via the tradition of apostolic succession. We also have every single person in the church, including you! **The whole church is apostolic, in that she remains . . . in communion of faith and life with her origin: and in that she is 'sent out' into the whole world,** says the **Catechism of the Catholic Church**. How will you respond to your call to apostleship? **Jesus went up the mountain and summoned those whom he wanted and they came to him.**

Saturday, Jan 23; Marianne Cope, religious

Hebrews 9:2-3, 11-14; Mark 3:20-21

Remarkable, two times over—Imagine leaving all that is familiar to minister in a far-off land. Now imagine doing it twice! German-born Marianne Cope came to the United States as a young woman and, as a member of the Sisters of St. Francis of Syracuse, New York, became a founding leader of St. Joseph's Hospital in the city, one of the first general hospitals in the country. Then in 1883 she relocated with six other sisters to Hawai'i to care for persons suffering leprosy and to help develop the medical infrastructure of the island chain. Pray today for an ounce of the courage and sacrifice she modeled for us all. **Jesus came with his disciples into the house.**


